Union County Emergency Management Urges Residents to Take Steps to Prepare for Winter Weather

Union County Emergency Management urges residents of Union County to update their emergency plans and stock their emergency supplies kits.

"With predictions of more precipitation this winter because of El Nino, Union County residents should take the time to plan for winter now," said Emergency Manager Donald Moye. "North Carolina winters are unpredictable. Earlier this year, much of the state had saw some form of frozen precipitation whether it was snow, sleet or ice. Union County residents shouldn't take any chances. It's better to prepare for the worse than to be surprised and facing a dangerous situation."

Moye adds that making an emergency plan, practicing it, having an emergency supplies kit and staying informed to changing weather conditions will keep residents and their loved ones safe. He encourages people to listen carefully to their National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration weather radio, local radio and television stations for storm watches or warnings.

"When winter weather warnings are issued, be prepared for possible power outages or roads made impassable by snow or ice," he said.

Moye reminds residents to practice the following winter safety tips:

- Keep alternative heating sources prepared. If you have a fireplace, store a good supply of dry, seasoned wood. Keep fire extinguishers on hand, and make sure your family knows how to use them.
- Properly vent kerosene heaters and keep any electric generators OUTSIDE and away from any open windows or doors to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Also, do not burn charcoal indoors. Carbon monoxide poisoning can result from charcoal fumes indoors.
- · Keep fresh batteries on hand to use with flashlights and weather radios.
- · Always keep at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food in your home.

- Wear multiple layers of thin clothing instead of a single layer of thick clothing to stay warm. You will be warmer and, as the temperature changes, you can easily remove layers to remain comfort able.
- If you must travel during a winter storm, store an emergency kit in your vehicle that includes: blankets, a battery-powered radio with extra batteries, a first aid kit, a flashlight with extra batteries, battery booster cables and flares, a tire repair kit and pump, a road map, a sack of cat litter (for tire traction), a tow rope, bottled water and non-perishable high-energy foods such as granola bars, extra clothing to keep dry, and a windshield scraper and brush.

As a reminder, if driving on snow-or ice-covered roadways, reduce your speed. Driving at the regular speed limit will reduce your ability to control the car if you begin to slide. Leave plenty of room between you and other vehicles. If conditions worsen and you can no longer drive safely, pull off the highway. Stay calm and remain in your vehicle. Do not set out on foot unless you can see a building close by where you know you can take shelter.

Heating Assistance Available Through LIEAP

The Union County Department of Human Services, Division of Social Services (DSS), began accepting applications on Tuesday, Dec. 1 for citizens interested in receiving assistance with their heating costs during the cold-weather months. Applications will be taken until Dec. 31 at 1212 W. Roosevelt Boulevard in Monroe, Monday-Friday from 8 a.m. – 5 p.m.

Potential recipients of a one-time benefit from the Low Income Energy
Assistance Program (LIEAP) must be 60 years old or older or disabled and
receiving services from the Division of Aging and Adult Services. These
include home-delivered meals or nutrition site meals from Union County Nutrition for the Elderly or
In-Home Aide services provided through DSS or the Council on Aging.

Households without a member in the specified target groups listed above may apply to receive benefits beginning Jan. 4, 2016. This is a first-come, first-served program in which funds are distributed until they are gone. Certain income and reserve criteria also apply.

Those applying should bring the following information, for all household members, to the interview - Social Security numbers, birthdates, citizenship status, daycare expense receipts, legally-ordered child support paid to someone outside your household, income information and proof of income for all household members for the month prior to the month of application (paycheck stubs or income statements showing funds received during the month) and receipt, bill, or statement from the power, gas, or fuel oil company for your primary heat-source, in the name of someone in the household, and showing an account number.

If approved, an assistance payment will be made directly to the heating provider. For more information in English or Spanish, contact DSS at 704-296-4300.

Help with Affordable Care Act Available at Monroe Library

It's Open Enrollment time for those insured under the Affordable Care Act and, once again, the Monroe Library is hosting a trained navigator to help local residents through the process.

Our navigator this year is Julian Cernuda and he comes to us through our continuing partnership (three years now!) with Legal Services of the Southern Piedmont. Julian is uniquely qualified for the job of navigating folks through the process. He's extremely knowledgeable, bilingual, enthusiastic and very personable. He'll be at the Monroe Library every Monday from 1 p.m. - 7 p.m. through the enrollment period which ends Jan. 31.

If the first two weeks are any indication, Julian will be a very busy man; he has already completed 15 appointments in the time allotted for eight! That's operating at 187 percent of capacity. He handles walk-ins as he has time, but it's best that our patrons make reservations through the appointment hotline at 855-733-3711 or online at www.gcaconnector.org.




