This is an invitation to all you creative writing geniuses in Warwickshire to show us your talents, and help keep young people safer online.

Together for a better internet or Respect online or #BeCyberKind – these are the themes for Safer Internet Day 2019, which is on Tuesday 5 February.

To celebrate, we're running a competition for young creative writers.

We want you to give other young people advice on how to keep safer online. And by 'online', we mean when using smart phones, consoles, tablets and computers.

How do I enter the competition?

Using your amazing creative writing skills, tell other young people how they can keep themselves safer online.

Your advice can come in the form of a poem or rhyme, the words to a song or rap, a blog post or a short story.

Your entry must be inspired by either (or both) of Safer Internet Day 2019's important themes: **Together for a better internet** or **Respect online** or **#BeCyberKind**.

Your entry must be your own original work. It can be up to (but no more than) 200 words long.











What do I win?

If your piece of creative writing is picked as one of three top entries in your age category, you'll win:

- 1st prize £100 voucher / 2nd prize £50 voucher / 3rd prize £25 voucher
- A special behind-the-scenes police experience
- A tour of the Wasps RFC ground at the Ricoh Arena.

Winning entries will also be published on our websites (including Twitter and Facebook).

Who can enter?

So long as you live in and/or are educated in Warwickshire, you can enter the competition.

There are three age categories: 6 to 8, 9 to 11 and 12+.

Who is running this competition?

The important bits

Your entry must be up to, but no more than, 200 words.

You will need to write or type your entry on to a sheet of **A4** paper (unless you're entering online). If you're writing it by hand, please **write clearly**.

Remember to put your **name**, **age**, **address and school** on the **back** of your entry, so we know it is yours.
