Quest Science Center Receives \$450,000 Capital Grant from Alameda County Supervisor Haubert

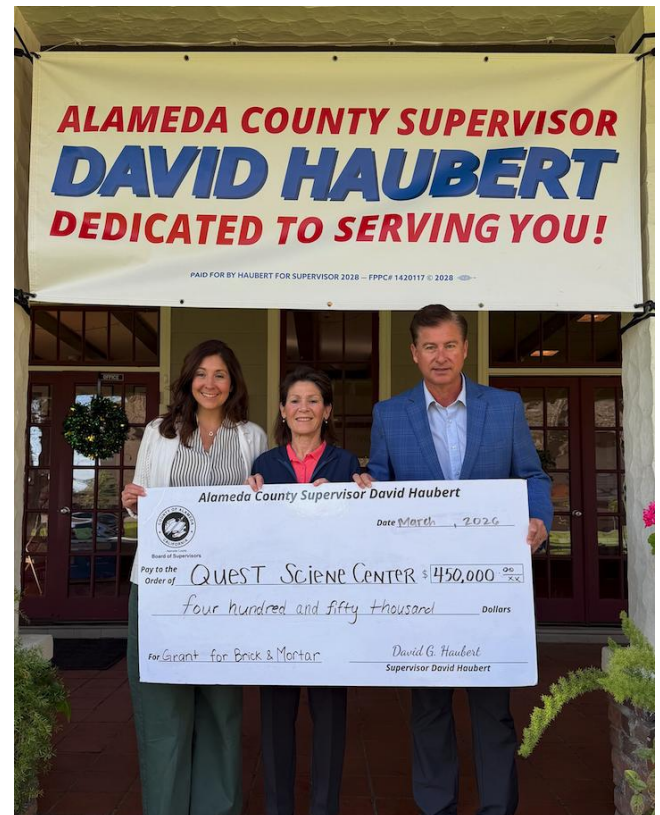
PLEASANTON, Calif. (April 1, 2026) — Alameda County District 1 Supervisor David Haubert is pleased to announce the awarding of a \$450,000 grant to Quest Science Center. This funding, awarded through an Alameda County capital fund to complete a \$500,000 pledge by previous Supervisor Scott Haggerty, marks an important milestone in the evolution of the Quest Science Center - from a mobile, community-based program serving approximately 20,000 people annually to a permanent destination to engage more than 100,000 residents and visitors each year.

Planned in partnership with the City of Livermore, the future center will provide hands-on, interactive experiences that connect people of all ages to the science and technology shaping the Tri-Valley region and beyond.



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The project to build a permanent Quest Science Center will serve 100,000 local residents and visitors per year - connecting our communities to the wide range of science and technology in our innovation region and our world, and inspiring the next generation of innovators and families of all backgrounds with fun and exciting hands-on, interactive experiences. “I can see the impact Quest has been having around the region over the past five years, and am enthused by the opportunity before us to expand that impact to a permanent location that will enable our future workforce, economic development, and quality of life,” said David Haubert, District 1 County Supervisor. “This support will help launch the initial seed round for Quest Science Center’s broader fundraising efforts. We are proud to partner with Quest Science Center and remain committed to advancing this project and supporting Quest’s long-term success.”



The grant builds on several years of program growth and community engagement by Quest Science Center and represents a significant step forward in bringing a permanent facility to life which has always been part of its vision.

"This support allows us to move into the next phase of realizing a long-envisioned community and regional resource," said Monya Lane, Board Chair of Quest Science Center. "We have seen



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firsthand the demand for accessible, engaging science experiences, and this investment helps accelerate our ability to serve the region in a deeper and more lasting way.”
