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#### DNA Capacity Enhancement Backlog Reduction (CEBR)

Funds for this request are partially included in the Fiscal Year 2018-19 Operational Plan for the Sheriff's Department. If approved, this request will result in current year estimated costs of \$305,592 and revenue of \$278,225. The funding sources are grant revenue from the U.S. Department of Justice (\$278,225) and the Sheriff's Department General Purpose Revenue (\$27,367). The grant revenue recovers Sheriff's Department direct costs but does not reimburse all costs associated with administrative overhead and support estimated at \$27,367. There will be no change in net General Fund cost and no additional staff years.

#### Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation (OHMVR)

Funds for this request are partially included in the Fiscal Year 2018-19 Operational Plan for the Sheriff's Department. If approved, this request will result in current year estimated costs of \$68,737 and revenue of \$55,326. The funding sources are grant revenue from the California Department of Parks and Recreation (\$55,326) and Sheriff's Department General Purpose Revenue (\$13,411). The revenue recovers Sheriff's Department direct costs but does not reimburse all costs associated with administrative overhead and support estimated at \$13,411. There is a minimum 25 percent match (\$18,811) requirement for this grant that will be exceeded by in-kind salaries and benefits. There will be no change in net General Fund cost and no additional staff years.

#### Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP)

Funds for this request are partially included in the Fiscal Year 2018-19 Operational Plan for the Sheriff's Department. If approved, this request will result in current year estimated costs of \$521,595 and revenue of \$403,000. The funding sources are grant revenue from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration passed through the California Office of Traffic Safety (\$403,000) and the Sheriff's Department's General Purpose Revenue (\$118,595). The revenue recovers Sheriff's Department direct costs but does not reimburse all costs associated with administrative overhead and support estimated at \$118,595. There will be no change in net General Fund cost and no additional staff years.

3. SUBJECT: JURISDICTIONAL CHANGES TO COUNTY SERVICE AREA NO. 135 AND RELATED PROPERTY TAX EXCHANGE; PROPERTY TAX EXCHANGE RELATIVE TO ISLANDS 2, 3, AND 4 (DISTRICT: 2)

#### **OVERVIEW**

This letter concerns two jurisdictional changes to fire protection and emergency medical services in County Service Area 135 (CSA 135) and unserved territories within San Diego County. The first is the divestiture of fire protection and emergency medical services from portions of CSA 135 to the Alpine Fire Protection District (Alpine FPD). The second is the extension of fire protection and emergency medical services to three unserved areas in the Ramona, Poway, Lakeside, Spring Valley, Bonita, and Alpine areas.

With regard to the first jurisdictional change, on November 13, 2018 the Board of Supervisors (Board) is requested to adopted a resolution of intention to set a public hearing for the proposed divestiture to Alpine FPD. In today's action, If the resolution is approved, the Board is requested on January 8, 2019 to adopt a resolution for the divestiture and adopt a property tax exchange resolution for the proposed jurisdictional change to CSA 135.

With regard to the second jurisdictional change, on February 2, 2016 (1) the Board approved the submission of an application to the San Diego Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) to extend fire protection and emergency medical services to the three unserved areas - Islands 2, 3, and 4. In conjunction with the Board's LAFCO application, the Lakeside, San Miguel, and Bonita-Sunnyside Fire Protection Districts, as well as the Ramona Municipal Water District, agreed to annex territory within Islands 2, 3, and 4 that would be logically served by their respective districts. To complete this reorganization, the Board is requested on January 8, 2019 to adopt a property tax exchange resolution relative to these proposed jurisdictional changes.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

If approved, this request will result in transfers of Annual Tax Increment attributable to the County General Fund for all areas and districts involved in this property tax exchange (Attachment C). The percentage exchanged totals approximately \$68,847 annually in current and future property tax revenue received within CSA 135 and Islands 2, 3 and 4, to the Alpine, Lakeside, San Miguel, and Bonita-Sunnyside Fire Protection Districts, and the Ramona Municipal Water District. The estimated current revenue transferred to the Alpine FPD from CSA 135 is \$7,873, and an estimated \$18,062 in future revenue will be transferred from the County General Fund to the Alpine FPD, totaling an estimated \$25,935 annually. The estimated

The analysis provided by the SDCERA actuary notes that enrolling new members in Safety Tier D instead of the current Safety Tier C would result in a 0.66% reduction of Normal Cost rates for both the employer and the member. The Normal Cost rate under Safety Tier D would be 14.22%, down from 14.88% under the current Safety Tier C.

Because data for new employees who will enroll in Safety Tier D is not yet available, the SDCERA actuary arrived at these rates by looking at the data profiles of all current active Tier C safety members and used the same actuarial assumptions and methodologies as in the June 30, 2018 valuation for current Tier C safety members.

The unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) rates are unaffected at this time by the establishment of the new Safety Tier D benefit plan.

This action: 1) amends the Compensation Ordinance by amending compensation for one (1) job code/classification in the classified service; 2) amending the salary range for four (4) job codes/classifications in the unclassified service; 3) designating one (1) job code/classification as "Terminal"; 4) deleting two (2) job codes/classifications in the classified service; and 5) adding, amending, or repealing various sections of the Compensation Ordinance.

The estimated future revenues transferred to the Lakeside, San Miguel, and Bonita-Sunnyside Fire Protection Districts, CSA 135, and Ramona Municipal Water District from ad valorem property taxes within Islands 2, 3, and 4 is \$42,912. The funding sources are revenue funds within CSA 135 and General Purpose Revenue from ad valorem property taxes within Islands 2, 3, and 4. These revenues are being transferred to the respective agency that will incur the cost of providing fire protection services. There will be no change in net General Fund cost and no additional staff years.

#### **BACKGROUND**

#### Alpine Fire Protection District Reorganization

The Alpine Fire Protection District (Alpine FPD) submitted an application to San Diego County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) to annex six areas within its sphere of influence, five of which currently fall within County Service Area No. 135 (CSA 135). Prior to LAFCO processing this proposed reorganization, the Board of Supervisors (Board) must agree to divest the territory currently within CSA 135 slated for annexation into the Alpine FPD.

The proposed Alpine FPD reorganization consists of Alpine FPD's annexation of six areas totaling 6,778 acres, identified as Areas A-F (Attachment C). Areas A, B, C, D, and E are located within CSA 135 service area, and Area F is outside CSA 135 service area. The proposed reorganization will transfer responsibilities for structural fire protection and emergency medical services for Areas A, B, C, D, E, and F to the Alpine FPD.

To complete the proposed reorganization and ensure the continuity of fire protection and emergency medical services in the Alpine FPD, the Board, as the legislative body of CSA 135, must initiate proceedings for the divestiture of fire and emergency medical services in territories within CSA 135. On November 13, 2018, Today's request is for the Board to-approved the resolution of intention (Attachment A) to set a public hearing. In today's action, If the Board approves the resolution, the Board is requested on January 8, 2019 to adopt a resolution for the divestiture of fire and emergency medical services from portions of CSA 135 to Alpine FPD (Attachment B).

In addition, prior to LAFCO processing the proposed reorganization, the Board must also adopt a resolution to determine an equitable exchange of property tax revenues. Since the reorganization area will be served by the Alpine FPD, the request is for the Board to adopt a resolution (Attachment C) transferring 5% of future property tax revenue from County General Funds to

Alpine FPD for Areas A, B, C, D, E, and F. In accordance with Board Policy B-45, the proposed property tax exchange maintains an equitable balance between the transfers of cost and the transfers of revenue by allocating funding to the Alpine FPD.

#### Islands 2, 3, and 4

On February 2, 2016 (1) the Board approved the submission of an application to LAFCO for the extension of fire and emergency medical services to three unserved areas – Islands 2, 3, and 4 - in the Ramona, Poway, Lakeside, Spring Valley, Bonita, and Alpine areas. These islands are not presently located within an authorized fire protection provider's jurisdiction.

In conjunction with the Board's LAFCO application for the reorganization of Islands 2, 3, and 4, the Lakeside, San Miguel, and Bonita-Sunnyside Fire Protection Districts, as well as the Ramona Municipal Water District, also agreed to annex territory within Islands 2, 3, and 4 that would be logically served by their respective districts. Prior to LAFCO processing these proposed reorganizations, the Board must first adopt a resolution determining an equitable exchange of property tax revenues relative to multiple jurisdictional changes.

The reorganization of Islands 2, 3, and 4 involves several components:

#### Island 2

In Island 2, two areas totaling 17.26 acres, identified as Areas A-B, will be annexed to the Ramona Municipal Water District. Three areas totaling 892.27 acres, identified as Areas C, D, and E, will be annexed to the Lakeside Fire Protection District. Three areas totaling 11,382.57 acres, identified as Areas F, G, and H, will be annexed to CSA 135 (Attachment C).

#### Island 3

In Island 3, two areas totaling 2,382.03 acres, identified as Areas A-B, will be annexed to the Lakeside Fire Protection District. Three areas totaling 627 acres, identified as Areas C, D, and E, will be annexed to the San Miguel Consolidated Fire Protection District. One area totaling 325.66 acres, identified as Area F, will be annexed to CSA 135. (Attachment C).

#### Island 4

In Island 4, one area totaling 67.04 acres, identified as Area A, will be annexed to the San Miguel Consolidated Fire Protection District. Three areas totaling 274.07 acres, identified as Areas B, C, and D, will be annexed to the Bonita-Sunnyside Fire Protection District. One area totaling 4,893.46, identified as Area E, will be annexed to CSA 135 (Attachment C).

#### ENVIRONMENTAL STATEMENT

The proposed actions do not qualify as a project pursuant to CEQA Section 15378(b)(4). The proposed action involves government fiscal activities which do not involve any commitment to any specific project which may result in a potentially significant physical impact to the environment. Dear Governor Brown:

As the Chairwoman of the San Diego County Board of Supervisors I am writing you about the impending humanitarian crisis at the border.

It is our understanding from Customs and Border Protection that 2,800 immigrants from Central America are staged in Tijuana, awaiting processing for asylum claims at ports of entry within San Diego County. Furthermore, an additional 2,000 immigrants have arrived in the past several days to weeks and an additional 5,000 immigrants could be headed toward Tijuana with hopes of entering the United States through San Diego County.

According to Customs and Border Protection, single males and unaccompanied juveniles are prioritized for detention and sent to other parts of the country while family groups are simply dropped off in downtown San Diego when charitable shelter beds are unavailable. Our local non-governmental organizations have reached shelter capacity while thousands of immigrants are arriving at our border and Customs and Border Protection is processing 60-100 people across the border per day. Those numbers could double in the coming days to weeks and this does not even include the immigrants who enter our country illegally between ports of entry.

I am writing to call upon the state to provide food, short and long-term housing, travel assistance, medical care and case management to the flood of asylum seekers and illegal immigrants who are making their way to San Diego County.

Customs and Border Protection also stated there is no way to verify that immigrants claiming to be family units are actually blood relatives. Family units are dropped off on a regular basis by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) at a bus station in downtown San Diego. According to Customs and Border Protection it is widely known among the immigrants that single males are detained while "families" are set free in the community. I am concerned about child trafficking and the implications for public safety as the criminal backgrounds of these individuals in their countries of origin is unknown to both federal and local law enforcement.

I call upon members of Congress to fix this abhorrently broken immigration system that is resulting in the crisis at hand and the state to bear the responsibility of providing basic necessities to migrants it has publicly welcomed. This is not a short-term issue. Customs and Border Protection has informed us that thousands more Central American immigrants are headed for the United States. Thus, immediate and long-term actions are needed by both state and federal policymakers to remedy this situation.

Two years ago the state opened and staffed an armory that served as a temporary shelter for Haitian immigrants who were similarly dropped off by ICE in downtown San Diego. Please let us know at your earliest convenience of the state's plans for sheltering the thousands of Central American immigrants who will be released in San Diego County over the coming weeks and months.

Thank you for your immediate attention to this matter.

Over the last several weeks, the federal government have been releasing families from Central America seeking asylum into the San Diego region. As of this week, there are an additional 5,000 individuals who await the processing of asylum claims at the U.S. ports of entry bordering San Diego County.

The County and local cities have been assisting non-governmental organizations (NGOs) that have been working to address asylum seekers' immediate needs for temporary shelter. However, NGOs have stated that they are overstretched and do not have expertise in managing shelter operations.

Two years ago, the State opened and staffed two of the several armories in the San Diego region to serve as temporary shelter for Haitian immigrants who were similarly dropped off by the federal government. Today, we are writing to request the State to temporarily shelter these Central American immigrants who will continue to be released locally over the coming weeks and months. To ensure appropriate shelter operations, we also ask for a contracted entity be hired to oversee this function to supplement the work of local NGOs.

The San Diego region is ready to work with the State on this matter and we thank you for your immediate attention.

Dear Mayor Faulconer, Mayor Morrison, Mayor Salas, and Chairwoman Gaspar,

Governor Brown asked me to respond to your request for the State's assistance in sheltering Central American families seeking asylum in the United States. Please understand that we share your concern and have been, and will continue to be, engaged in addressing the needs of these families.

I understand the importance of identifying appropriate shelters to house the incoming families, and I would like to share with you what the State has been doing to provide assistance to the local NGOs that are supporting the migrant families.

Over roughly the last forty-five days, the State has been supporting the NGOs who have been managing the ongoing sheltering operations, and we continue to remain in close coordination with them on their day-to-day operations, as well as providing technical services and training. This support has included personnel from the California Department of Social Services (DSS), who have been on the ground at the shelters providing staffing capacity.

DSS has also assisted with the movement of the shelter operations from the Salvation Army shelter site to the La Quinta shelter site. In this process, DSS secured additional tents, via the California Conservation Corps (CCC), for expansion of the La Quinta shelter. These tents will provide immediate enhancement for intake processing and donations management. The State has also assisted in facilitating arrangements at a nearby church to provide overflow sheltering space as necessary and we have coordinated with the American Red Cross (ARC) to provide comfort kits and on-site shelter management expertise.

Additionally, through the California Office of Emergency Service (Cal OES) - Office of Public/Private and Non-Governmental Coordination, we have been able to facilitate philanthropic contributions to bolster local NGO financial resources that will ensure necessary wrap-around services. Cal OES continues to remain engaged in these efforts to leverage additional funding sources where possible.

Lastly, Cal OES continues to work closely with the respective NGOs, Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), on real-time information sharing, particularly related to any fluctuations in the numbers of families being admitted into the United States and transferred to shelters. Should ICE or CBP unexpectedly increase the numbers of families, or in some way alter the existing process, the State can rapidly respond as necessary with appropriate resources.

It is important we maximize appropriate shelters to temporarily house the incoming families. Unfortunately, the use of the National City armory is not suitable. The site currently houses an Emergency Response Force and associated critical supplies, including ammunition. To shift this armory away from its mission and instead to house families could impede the timely mobilization and deployment of the existing Emergency Response Force. We will, however, continue to review any other options to support existing shelters or help identify additional shelter capacity, as appropriate.

Again, thank you for your letter to Governor Brown regarding support to migrant families. We certainly understand the complexities associated with this long-term situation. In the meantime, please do not hesitate to contact me directly should you have any additional questions or concerns.
