

The Sixth District Dedication Commander Jaron Hickman



Jaron Hickman currently serves as the commander of the Sixth District, which encompasses the Northeast (east of the Anacostia River) and Southeast quadrants of the city. He was promoted to commander by Chief of Police Pamela A. Smith in January 2024.

Commander Hickman began his career with the Metropolitan Police Department in September of 2001 when he was assigned to patrol in the Seventh District. During his time in the Seventh District, Hickman spent time in the Auto Theft Unit and as a Field Training Officer. In May 2008, he was transferred to the Crime Scene Investigations Division where he collected and processed evidence from crime scenes in the city. In 2010, Hickman was named Crime Scene Search Officer of the Year.

In September 2012, Jaron Hickman was promoted to sergeant and was assigned to the Sixth District as a field supervisor and was subsequently assigned to lead the Sixth District Crime Suppression Team. In 2015, Hickman was transferred to the Narcotics and Special Investigations Division to supervise the newly formed Criminal Interdiction Unit (CIU), focused on addressing robbery patterns throughout the city.


Four years later, in September 2016, Hickman returned to the Seventh District, this time as a lieutenant. During his second tenure at 7D, he led the Crime Suppression Team. In September 2017, Hickman was transferred to the Criminal Investigations Division where he led the Seventh District Detectives' Section and was tasked with ensuring proper case follow-up on criminal offenses. In January 2018, Hickman moved to the Sexual Assault Unit where he worked until he as assigned to the Homicide Branch in April 2021. There, he led two squads of detectives investigating murders that occurred in the city. Additionally, Hickman served as the MPD lead with the Capital Area Regional Fugitive Task Force (CARFTF) which was tasked with apprehending offenders in the DC region who were wanted for murder.

In October 2021, Hickman was promoted to captain and assigned to the Sixth District, a familiar place from his time there as a sergeant. As a captain, Hickman led patrol operations in Sector Two and oversaw three Patrol Service Areas in the Anacostia, Penn Branch, Dupont Park, Fairfax Village, Naylor Gardens, and Hillcrest areas of the city. In December 2021, Hickman was transferred to the Special Operations Division where he led the Critical Incident Response Branch. As part of his duties there, he oversaw the day-to-day operations of Emergency Response Team, the Explosive Ordnance Disposal Unit, the Domestic Security Operations Unit, and Canine Patrol Unit.

Jaron Hickman has received numerous awards and recognitions during his career. He is a graduate of the 21st Century Police Leadership Course. He is a United States Army veteran where he was honorably discharged in 2000 after four years of active service.

Hickman is a life-long Ward 8 resident where he continues to live in with his wife and two sons. He is a proud graduate of Ballou High School.

Sixth District Crime Statistics



Awareness: Crimes reported in the Sixth District have decreased by 116 incidents in the past month compared to the corresponding period of the previous year. The district has taken decisive measures to focus on reducing violent and property crimes. We are pleased to report a decrease in both property and violent crimes across the Sixth District. However, we continue to stress the importance of vigilance concerning your surroundings, irrespective of your travel distance or the perceived safety of a neighborhood. Additionally, we want to bring attention to the issue of robberies, specifically targeting individuals with high-end coats (Canada Goose, Moose Knuckle, and Montclair, to name a few). As part of our ongoing efforts, we urge the community to remain vigilant and take precautions against such incidents. Your safety is our top priority, and we encourage everyone to stay informed, be cautious, and report suspicious activities promptly. We continue to monitor property crimes such as Theft/Other (Package Thefts from porches), Burglaries, and Theft from Autos. When leaving your vehicle, ensure all items are removed from plain view, and remember to turn off your car and remove the key. Stay vigilant of your surroundings, avoiding poorly lit areas. To address package thefts, Amazon boxes have been strategically placed at both the main and substation locations—Annalia (5002 Hayes Street NE) & Joana (2701 Pennsylvania Avenue SE). Feel free to designate these spots for the secure pickup of your Amazon packages. If using another delivery service, ensure your parcel is left with a trusted individual or at a secure location. SAFETY AWARENESS

Private Security Camera Incentive Program

The Private Security Camera Incentive Program, encourages residents, businesses, non-profits and religious institutions to install security camera systems on their property and register them with the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD). There are two ways to participate.

The Private Security Camera Rebate Program

creates a rebate for participants who purchase, install, and register security camera systems on their home, business, non-profit, or religious institution.

The Private Security Camera Voucher Program

provides a private security camera system for eligible residents.

District residents—either owners or tenants—who receive public assistance may be eligible to have a camera system installed at their home.

ROBBERY PREVENTION TIPS

There has been an increase in street robberies within residential neighborhoods. Here are tips to stay safe:

- Always be aware of your surroundings
- Stay vigilant of activity around you and attentive to individuals approaching
- Walk purposely and with confidence
- Do not be distracted by activity such as talking on your cell phone, listening to music or reading while walking
- Travel with others, walk in well-traveled and well-lit areas
- · Avoid carrying large sums of cash in public
- If someone tries to rob you, give up your property and not your life
- Report the crime to the police immediately by calling 911 & try to describe the suspect(s) accurately by including their characteristics, clothing, and vehicles



Auto Theft Prevention









If you own a 2011-2021 Kia or Hyundai, your vehicle may be at risk of being stolen. Any Hyundai or Kia vehicle that operates with a metal or steel key is impacted by a system flaw that thieves are targeting. Any Hyundai or Kia vehicle that is a push-to-start, is not at risk. To avoid becoming a victim of auto theft, the Metropolitan Police Department encourages you to consider the following safety tips:

- Never leave your engine running or leave your vehicle unattended.
- Lock your car and take your keys with you.
- Park in a well-lit area or parking garage.
- Remove USB cables from vehicles while not in use.
- Consider purchasing a wheel lock or anti-theft device.
- Contact your dealership for potential software updates or recall notices.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT



Women in policing play an important role in making our communities a safe place to live and work.

However, nationally, women make up only 12% of sworn officers and 3% of police leadership.

MPD is proud to be a national leader in this area – women make up approximately 23% of our sworn workforce – but we believe we can still do more to increase the representation of women in our ranks. In an effort to further the recruitment, retention and promotion of women in policing, MPD signed the 30x30 pledge in November 2021. The 30×30 Initiative is a coalition of police leaders, researchers, and professional organizations who have joined together to advance the representation and experiences of women in policing agencies across the United States.

The ultimate goal of this national campaign is to increase the representation of women in police recruit classes to 30% by 2030, and to ensure police policies and culture intentionally support the success of women officers throughout their careers. (The 30×30 Initiative is based on the importance of achieving at least 30% representation to empower a group to influence an organization's culture. Domestic violence is a pattern of behavior used by someone to establish power and control over another person through fear and intimidation. It happens between people who are, or have been, in an intimate relationship. Domestic violence often includes the threat or actual use of violence. It happens when one person believes they are entitled to control another.

Domestic violence can take many forms. In many cases the behavior amounts to a criminal act. It is also a unique crime because there is usually a pattern of abuse over time, unlike, for example, when a robbery occurs one evening. Domestic violence tends to be repeated with more frequency and more severity.

Domestic violence can include emotional abuse, such as name-calling and put-downs, and economic abuse, when one person uses money and finances to control the other. Often an abusive partner may be sexually abusive, use or control the children, or threaten, isolate, or intimidate the other. All of these behaviors are used to maintain fear, intimidation and power.
