



Today's Weather Map






Meteorology Summary

Statewide Overview, Next 24 Hours:

Yesterday's cold front has moved offshore, leaving abundant sunshine across the state. However, despite the ample sunshine, temperatures will struggle to warm up much this afternoon. Highs will be in the middle to upper 50s in North Florida, lower to middle 60s in Central Florida, and upper 60s in South Florida. Some breezy northerly winds will help it feel a bit cooler.

Winds will begin settling tonight, which will allow temperatures to cool efficiently with clear skies and dry air in place. Widespread frost and freeze conditions are expected across North Florida tonight with lows in the lower to middle 30s. Lows in Central Florida will be in the upper 30s to middle 40s with upper 40s to lower 50s in South Florida.






Coastal Hazards / Hydrology

Rip Currents: Breezy winds out of the north at 10-15 mph will result in a **high rip current risk** along the West Coast from Pinellas to Lee County and a **moderate risk** in the Panhandle from Walton to Franklin County. *Remember, always swim within sight of a lifeguard. Rip currents can still occur on low risk days!*

Lake Okeechobee average elevation is 12.52 feet, which is 2.22 feet <u>below</u> normal for this time of year. The top of the water short management level is 12.11 feet this time of year.

Hydrology: Minor to moderate river and creek flooding is expected to continue across some of North Florida during the next several days. **River Flood Warnings** are in effect for the Apalachicola, lower Choctawhatchee, Escambia, lower Santa Fe, and lower Suwannee Rivers. **Moderate flooding** is ongoing along the lower Santa Fe River at Three Rivers Estates. All rivers are falling. The Escambia River will drop below flood stage today and the Choctawhatchee tomorrow, but all other rivers will remain in flood stage into this weekend. Rainfall amounts through this weekend are forecast to be light enough to prevent any additional river rises. 




Drought & Fire Weather


Fire Weather: In the wake of yesterday's cold front, winds remain breezy across the state. However, soil moisture is high from recent heavy rainfall in North Florida. Relative humidity will fall to near critical levels this afternoon. Drought regions are most susceptible to fire. Thus, a **high wildfire threat** is forecast in South Florida today with a **moderate threat** elsewhere. A <u>County Burn Ban</u> remains in effect for Gulf County and 5 other counties that are in effect year-round.


<u>The Keetch-Byram Drought Index</u> average for Florida is 199 (+5) on a scale from 0 (very moist) to 800 (very dry). There are currently <u>7</u> Florida counties with a KBDI above 500, all in Southeast Florida.

Space Weather: The sun is currently spotless and the risk for a significant solar flare is zero. Solar winds are calm and will remain that way through the end of the week. Geomagnetic storming is not forecast. The space weather threat to Florida is very low.
