






Meteorology Summary

Statewide Overview, Next 24 Hours:

The stalled front across Central Florida from yesterday will begin to slowly lift northward through today, bringing a chance of isolated to scattered showers to the Big Bend and the northern parts of the Peninsula. However, warmer air will also make a return to the state as highs climb into the middle to upper 60s in North Florida with middle 70s to near 80 in the Peninsula. Gusty easterly winds will also continue for much of the Peninsula today.

As the front continues to slowly move northward and weaken, temperatures overnight will remain mild and muggy. Lows will only settle in the middle to upper 50s for much of North Florida with middle to upper 60s in the Peninsula. Winds will subside tonight, and, when combined with the warm, humid air in place, areas of fog could develop overnight across the state. Winds may remain just high enough to prevent widespread dense fog, but some patchy dense fog is possible where winds become nearly calm.






Coastal Hazards / Hydrology

Rip Currents: Moderate to strong easterly winds around 10-15 mph will result in a moderate rip current risk all Panhandle beaches. Strong easterly winds around 10-20 mph will result in a high rip current risk for Northeast Florida beaches from Nassau to Flagler County, and a moderate risk for all other Atlantic Coast beaches. Wave heights will be 2-4' along the Gulf Coast. Along the East Coast, wave heights will range from 4-6'. A low risk is expected at all other Florida beaches. Remember, always swim within sight of a lifeguard. Rip currents can still occur on low risk days!

Lake Okeechobee average elevation is 12.70 feet, which is 1.90 feet <u>below</u> normal for this time of year.

Hydrology: River Flood Warnings remain in effect for the Santa Fe River at Fort White and at Three Rivers Estates. At Fort White, the river is forecast to fall below flood stage by Tuesday. The Santa Fe River at Three Rivers Estates will remain nearly steady in minor flood stage over the next several days. The Ocklawaha River at Rodman Dam remains in moderate flood stage. Several other rivers throughout North Florida are in action stage today, but are falling. Forecasted rain through this weekend will be light and will not create additional river rises. Drought & Fire Weather


Fire Weather: Breezy winds across much of the peninsula will elevate the wildfire danger today. However, relative humidity levels statewide will remain above critical levels, and soil moisture remains abundant. Thus, there is a **low wildfire threat** for much of the state today, with a **moderate threat** in South Florida. A <u>County Burn Ban</u> remains in effect for the 5 counties that are in effect year-round.


<u>The Keetch-Byram Drought Index</u> average for Florida is 115 (+7) on a scale from 0 (very moist) to 800 (very dry). There are <u>zero</u> Florida counties with a KBDI above 500.

Space Weather: The sun remains spotless with little to no threat of significant solar flares. Geomagnetic storming is not expected today. A large coronal hole will rotate onto the sun's earth-facing disk this week. However, the space weather threat to Florida is very low today.
