

### Meteorology Summary

#### Statewide Overview, Next 24 Hours:


The soggy weather pattern that brought flooding rains to the state over the last several days has finally ended. A more seasonable mid-August day is expected across the state.

#### North Florida:

Skies are cloudy this morning with isolated showers in the Panhandle. Some breaks in the clouds are expected by the afternoon and additional showers and thunderstorms will develop throughout the region. Rainfall totals around Pensacola could be 1-3" and may result in ponding of water on roadways in urban areas. Rain chances decrease after sunset. Patchy fog and/or low clouds may develop overnight.

#### Central & South Florida:


Skies are sunny this morning except across Southeast Florida where showers are already ongoing. Skies will gradually become partly cloudy over the course of the day with scattered thunderstorms developing this afternoon. The best chance of rain today will be along and west of the I-75 corridor, as any thunderstorms today will generally track to the west and northwest. Rain chances decrease after sunset, but some showers are still possible near the coast overnight in South Florida and the Kevs.





### Tropical Weather

**Tropics:** An area of low pressure along a front off the coast of the Mid-Atlantic is accelerating to the northeast over colder water of the North Atlantic. Development of this system is not expected. The National Hurricane Center gives this system a **10% (low) chance** of formation during the next 48 hours. Elsewhere, tropical development is not expected during the next 5 days due to unfavorable upper-level winds and/or dry air. ### Coastal Hazards & Hydrology

**Rip Currents:** Breezy onshore winds of 10-15 mph in the Panhandle and Southeast Florida will result in a **moderate risk of rip currents**. Wave heights are 1-3'. All other beaches have a low risk today. *Remember, always swim within sight of a lifeguard. Never swim alone. Rip currents can still occur on low risk days!* 

**Lake Okeechobee** average elevation is 13.06 feet, which is 0.99 feet below normal for this time of year. Due to recent rainfall, the lake level will continue to rise.

Hydrology & Flooding: River Flood Warnings are in effect for Cypress Creek at Worthington Gardens; Econfina River near Perry; Horse Creek near Arcadia; Myakka River at Myakka River State Park; Peace River at Bartow, Arcadia, and Zolfo Springs; Santa Fe River at O'Leno State Park; and the Steinhatchee River at Steinhatchee. Minor flooding is forecast at all locations except the Peace River at Arcadia where moderate flooding is ongoing. The Ocklawaha River at Rodman Dam and Fenholloway River at Foley is also in minor flood stage and several other rivers throughout the state are in action stage. Widespread rainfall totals today will be less than an inch. However, in a few isolated, heavier thunderstorms, a quick 1-3" is possible. Rainfall totals today are not forecast to impact river levels. There is no flash flood threat today.






### Drought & Fire Weather


**Fire Weather:** Much of the Peninsula has seen abundant rainfall, and the wildfire threat in those areas remains minimal. However, ongoing moderate to severe drought across inland parts of the Panhandle continues a **low wildfire threat**. Winds will be light (<10 mph) and relative humidity above critical levels. *Lightning may ignite new fires. Wind speed and direction may abruptly change near thunderstorms. Downed trees from Hurricane Michael continue to pose a hazardous fuel source.* 

There are currently 3 <u>active wildfires</u> across the state burning a total of 3.6 acres. 2 of these fires are 100% contained. A <u>County Burn</u> <u>Ban</u> is in effect for Duval, Orange, Hillsborough, Pinellas, and Sarasota (prohibited year-round).

<u>The Keetch-Byram Drought Index</u> average for Florida is 82 (-10) on a scale from 0 (very moist) to 800 (very dry). There are currently **0** Florida counties with an average KBDI at or above 500.


