


Meteorology Summary

Statewide Overview, Next 24 Hours:

A cold front moved through North Florida yesterday and Central Florida overnight. This morning, the cold front is moving through South Florida with some isolated showers. By this afternoon, it will be dry and sunny statewide with breezy northwest winds. Winds will be sustained at 10-20 mph with gusts to 30 mph.

Despite the sunshine, temperatures will only make it into the upper 50s and lower 60s in North and Central Florida. While temperatures will reach the 70s to lower 80s in South Florida, temperatures will be falling later this afternoon as cooler and drier air moves in.

A cool, clear, and dry night is expected. Temperatures will fall below freezing across inland areas in North Florida tonight with patchy frost developing as winds die down after midnight. Coastal areas of North Florida and all of Central and South Florida will remain above freezing.





Coastal Hazards & Hydrology


Rip Currents: Breezy northwest winds have built wave heights to 5-7' at West Coast beaches. A High Surf Advisory and a high risk of rip currents is expected today from Pinellas to Lee County. A moderate risk is forecast for Panhandle beaches and Atlantic beaches from Nassau to Martin County. A high risk is also forecast from Palm Beach to Miami-Dade County. Wave heights will be 2-4' at Panhandle and Atlantic beaches. Remember, always swim within sight of a lifeguard. Never swim alone. Double red flags mean the beach is closed!

Marine Hazards: Red Tide has been observed at moderate to high levels in Charlotte, Lee, and Collier County with low concentrations offshore Mainland Monroe County. Northerly winds have pushed the tidal bloom south and out of Sarasota. Respiratory irritation is possible at area beaches, especially from Charlotte to Collier County.

Coastal Flooding: Tides are running around 1' above normal in the Big Bend and may cause nuisance flooding at high tide near the mouth of the Suwannee River. No other coastal flooding is expected.

Lake Okeechobee average elevation is 13.09 feet, which is 1.74 feet below normal for this time of year. Levels will continue to slowly fall.

Hydrology: All rivers and creeks are below flood stage. River flooding is not forecast. For more information on specific rivers, please visit the Southeast River Forecast Center here.






Drought & Fire Weather


Fire Weather: Soil moisture has increased slightly from the recent rainfall, but pockets of dry fuels still exist in North Florida and Southwest Florida. Relative humidity will be above critical levels today but winds will be breezy (10-20 mph, gusting to 30 mph). Little to no rainfall fell from the cold front yesterday. With the ongoing drought conditions and breezy winds, a **low to locally moderate wildfire threat** is forecast statewide.

There are currently 17 <u>active wildfires</u> across the state burning a total of 76.5 acres. All but one fire in Lee County are 100% contained. A <u>County Burn Ban</u> is in effect for Duval, Orange, Hillsborough, Pinellas, and Sarasota (prohibited year-round).

The Keetch-Byram Drought Index average for Florida is 346 (+5) on a scale from 0 (very moist) to 800 (very dry). However, the Caloosahatchee District areal average is 511. There are 6 Florida counties with an average KBDI at or above 500 (Lee, Hendry, Collier, Miami-Dade, and Monroe).




