




Meteorology Summary

Statewide Overview, Next 24 Hours:

The weather is on repeat from the last several days. Dense fog this morning will generally dissipate by late morning, though some patchy fog cannot be ruled out near the Panhandle coast this afternoon. Partly to mostly sunny skies are expected statewide. The only chance for rain showers will be in South Florida (<10% chance), but these showers will not amount to much. Dense fog will redevelop again tonight across North Florida with patchy fog possible in Central Florida.

Highs this afternoon will be in the middle to upper 80s for much of the state. The exception will be right along the coast where highs will be in the upper 70s to lower 80s. Lows tonight will be in the 60s for much of the state with 70s in South Florida.





Coastal Hazards & Hydrology

Rip Currents: East winds at 10-15 mph and 2-4' waves will result in a moderate rip current risk for Atlantic beaches. Southwest winds of 5-10 mph and 1' waves will result in a moderate rip current risk for Walton through Gulf County beaches. All other beaches will have a low risk. Marine Hazards: Red Tide has not been observed above background levels. No respiratory irritation is expected.

Coastal Flooding: No coastal flooding is expected today.


Lake Okeechobee average elevation is 12.41 feet, which is 2.05 feet <u>below</u> normal for this time of year. This is 0.62 feet above the water shortage management level. A continued decline in the lake level is expected this week.

Hydrology: A **River Flood Warning** is in effect for the Apalachicola River at Blountstown, the Choctawhatchee River near Bruce-Ebro, and the Escambia River near Century.

The Apalachicola at Blountstown is slowly falling, but will likely remain in minor flood stage for the foreseeable future. The Apalachicola at Wewahithcka and Sumatra remains in moderate flood stage, but the river is slowly falling. The Chipola has backed up at Wewahitchka and Scott's Ferry, and minor flooding is expected to continue.

Both the Escambia and Choctawhatchee Rivers have crested just above minor flood stage, and both will fall below flood stage today.

The Alapaha River near Jennings has risen to minor flood stage. With major flooding ongoing in Statenville, GA, the Alapaha at Jennings will likely continue to rise. Moderate flooding is possible along the Alapaha later this weekend or early next week. For more information on specific rivers, please visit the Southeast River Forecast Center here.






Drought & Fire Weather


Fire Weather: East winds of 5-15 mph are expected across the Peninsula for much of today, except along the West Coast this afternoon as the sea breeze moves develops. Winds in the Panhandle will be out of the southwest at 5-10 mph. Relative humidity in Northeast Florida will be 30-40%, though relative humidity elsewhere will be 40-60%. This combined with little recent rainfall and ongoing drought conditions will lead to a **moderate wildfire threat** today statewide.

There are currently 32 <u>active wildfires</u> across the state burning a total of 599.5 acres. A <u>County Burn Ban</u> is in effect for Duval, Orange, Hillsborough, Pinellas, and Sarasota (prohibited year-round).

<u>The Keetch-Byram Drought Index</u> average for Florida is 293 (+8) on a scale from 0 (very moist) to 800 (very dry). There are <u>6</u> Florida counties with an average KBDI at or above 500. The areal averages for Caloosahatchee and Everglades Forestry Districts are above 500, and the areal averages for Myakka River and Okeechobee Forestry districts are over 450.
