






Meteorology Summary


Statewide Overview, Next 24 Hours:

A Tornado Watch has been issued for portions of the Panhandle until 3:00 PM EDT/2:00 PM CDT.

Showers and thunderstorms ongoing in the Panhandle will continue to expand in areal coverage and intensity throughout the day. Thunderstorms may be strong to severe, with a couple tornadoes, isolated damaging wind gusts (50-70 mph), hail, and flooding downpours possible. The Storm Prediction Center (SPC) has introduced a **Slight Risk (level 2 of 5)** along the Panhandle, mainly west of the Apalachicola River, with a **Marginal Risk (level 1 of 5)** extending into the Big Bend. Given the recent heavy rainfall and training nature of this activity across Northwest Florida, the threat for **flash flooding** will continue throughout the day.

Rain chances are low across Central & South Florida today (20-30% chance of rain). During the afternoon, isolated showers and thunderstorms will develop with a better chance of rain across West Florida. High temperatures will reach the upper 80s to lower 90s with a few mid-90s along the I-75 corridor. The heat index may reach the upper 90s.

Rain chances will linger after sunset in the Peninsula, but diminish overnight. Warm and humid conditions are expected with lows in the 70s and some lower 80s in Southeast Florida and the Keys.






Tropical Weather

Tropical cyclone formation is *not expected* during the next 5 days in the Atlantic Basin.

Hurricane Season officially begins on June 1. The National Hurricane Center and NOAA will be releasing their season forecast later today.





Coastal Hazards & Hydrology

Rip Currents: Onshore winds will yield a **high risk of rip currents** along Panhandle and Southeast Florida beaches. **Moderate risk** conditions continue at all other Atlantic beaches. A low risk continues along the West Coast. For the latest Rip Current Outlook, visit www.weather.gov/beach.


Marine Hazards: Wave heights will be 3-5' in the Panhandle and 2-3' elsewhere. **High Surf Advisories** remain in effect along western Panhandle beaches. Red Tide has <u>not</u> been observed above background concentrations anywhere in the state over the last week. Blue-green algae blooms have been reported across inland, freshwater bodies of water according to FDEP.

Coastal Flooding: Tides are near normal and coastal flooding is not expected.

Flash Flooding: Additional rounds of heavy rain today will fall across already very saturated soil in the Panhandle. The Weather Prediction Center (WPC) is outlooking a Moderate Risk for Flash Flooding (level 3 of 4) for the western Panhandle, with a Slight Risk for Flash Flooding (level 2 of 4) extending to regions just west of the Apalachicola River. Multiple rounds of thunderstorms with heavy rainfall rates will be capable of producing widespread totals of 2-4", with locally higher amounts of 6-8". Any shower or thunderstorm that develops today may produce 2-4"/hour rainfall rates, leading to concerns for flash flooding. An increased concern for flooding can be expected in locations that saw significant rainfall totals over the past 48 hours, such as Gulf County.

Riverine Flooding: There are no active River Flood Warnings across the state. A few Panhandle rivers are forecast to rise into Action Stage (bank-full) over the next few days. All Florida rivers, creeks, and lakes remain below flood stage. For more details on specific river levels, please visit the River Forecast Center.

Lake Okeechobee's average elevation was 12.62 feet, which was within the operational band but 0.53 feet <u>below</u> normal for this time of year. Pulse releases continue down the Caloosahatchee.






Drought & Fire Weather


Fire Weather: Recent rainfall and continued daily rain chances continue a low wildfire threat statewide, with a locally higher threat over ongoing drought regions. Winds will be out of the south to southeast at 5-15 mph, with gusts reaching 15-25 mph at times. Relative humidity will remain above critical levels statewide, with relative humidity values dropping into the 40-50% range over the interior. Winds will be calm overnight, and humidity nears 100%. Dangerous smoke-fog could develop near any ongoing wildfires or burns tonight. Lightning could ignite new wildfires. Winds may be gusty and erratic near any thunderstorms. According to the Florida Forest Service, there are 39 active wildfires in the state, totaling approximately 895 acres.

A County Burn Ban is in effect for Collier and Hendry counties; with Duval, Hillsborough, Orange, Pinellas, and Sarasota banned year-round.

Drought: Rainfall totals in the Peninsula over the past week resulted in improving drought conditions, with minor reductions in the **severe and moderate drought** region around Lake Okeechobee. Short-term dryness and decreasing soil moisture levels continue Abnormally Dry (*emerging drought*) conditions along the Panhandle coastline and Big Bend. *Important Note:* this week's Drought Monitor does not take into affect rainfall totals over the past 48 hours, these rainfall totals will be reflected in next week's Monitor. Reduction and elimination of drought conditions can be expected over the next 7 days.


The Keetch-Byram Drought Index average for Florida is 312 (+6) on a scale from 0 (very wet) to 800 (very dry). There are 4 counties with an average KBDI over 500



Space Weather: Strong solar flares with brief high-frequency (HF) radio blackouts are possible today, especially from sunspot #3014 and #3017. There is a small chance for a more significant solar flare (X-class) and accompanying more impactful HF radio blackouts. Solar winds remain slightly enhanced and geomagnetic storming is not expected over the next few days. The space weather threat to Florida remains very low.
