


Historic Indiana en Mein Chi Celebrating 50 Years of Preservation







The year 2020 marked a milestone for the Indiana Division of Historic Preservation & Archaeology (DHPA). The division celebrated its 50th anniversary and listed Indiana's 2,000th entry in the National Register of Historic Places. One of the DHPA's federally mandated duties as the state historic preservation office for Indiana is listing properties in the Register, which is the national list of sites that are important to our state's history.

To commemorate these achievements, the DHPA partnered with the Indiana Plein Air Painting Association (IPAPA) to create a series of paintings depicting a handful of Indiana's listed sites. This poster features a few of these works. 


