#### **Message From The Director**

As we reflect on 2024, I am filled with both pride and gratitude for the incredible milestones we have reached. This past year was marked by uncertainty and challenges - but also by resilience, innovation, and growth.

In 2024, we achieved several key milestones:

- Directly served over 10,000 families, including 1,700 seniors and 700 children
- Invested more than \$1.4 million into community partners providing essential public services
- Successfully launched a lead reduction program prioritizing underserved communities in Kent County
- Provided over \$6.6 million in financial assistance to stabilize households
- Offered over 13,000 rides to seniors
- Distributed over 113,000 food boxes to individuals and families in need

These accomplishments are more than just numbers—they represent real lives changed, meaningful progress made, and a future built with intention and care. These successes are the result of collaboration among dozens of community partners, hundreds of volunteers, and the unwavering support of our board members and staff. 

#### **Walk For Warmth**

In February of 2024, we held our 36th annual Walk for Warmth. We were joined by nearly 70 residents to help spread awareness and raise funds to support households that struggle to pay their heating utility bills during the cold winter months. Because of the support of the community, we were able to assist 55 households keep warm.

## Rep. Carol Glanville Recognized at Community Action Legislative Day



On May 22, 2024, we attended Michigan
Community Action Legislative Day at the State
Capitol, where we presented Rep. Carol
Glanville with the Legislator of the Year award
in recognition of her dedication and support
for Community Action. Our team engaged
with legislators and heard from Governor
Gretchen Whitmer. Each year, MCA honors
volunteers, legislators, and community

partners during Legislative Day, providing an opportunity to discuss the impact of our programs across Michigan.

#### **KCLEAR Launches to Address Lead Hazards**

Our Community Development Division
launched a pilot of the KCLEAR program and
began accepting applications on October 1,
2024, offering free lead-paint evaluations for
Kent County homeowners (outside Grand
Rapids) in homes built before 1978. Financial
assistance is also available to income-eligible
households. KCLEAR, developed in partnership
with the Kent County Health Department, aims



to raise awareness of lead hazards and engage more certified lead abatement contractors.

#### **Senior Services Welcome Justice Harris Bolden**



In August 2024, our Senior Services Division welcomed MI Supreme Court Justice Harris Bolden. The Justice took the time to answer questions and even helped judge some artwork that our participants had recently created. This division also launched the Senior Emergency Needs Fund, providing financial support to qualifying seniors for housing, repairs, and essential expenses. Additionally,

the division partnered with Kids Food Basket to enhance meals prepared for our seniors by sourcing farm-fresh produce. Throughout the year our chef was able to incorporate 200 pounds of fresh corn, tomatoes, and potatoes into the meals.

#### **Self-Sufficiency Program Achieves Milestones**

Our Housing Commission's Family Self-Sufficiency Program enrolled 23 new households and celebrated 22 graduations, with an average of \$11,000 in earned escrow disbursed to them upon graduation. Family Self Sufficiency participants work toward achieving stable employment and housing.

#### **Jaycee Park Renovations Completed**

A \$2.1 million investment from Community

Action and the City of Kentwood funded

renovations at Jaycee Park, which officially

reopened on February 17, 2024. Visitors can

enjoy a variety of improvements, including new

trails, a disc golf course, a basketball court,

a playground, updated parking and security

features, two sets of restrooms, a community

space, and a drinking fountain.





#### **Demolition Project Clears Way for Park and Library**

On October 8, in partnership with Tyrone Township, we began the demolition of an abandoned building in Kent City. This project will make way for the development of a public park, green space, and the proposed new Kent City Library. The project received support through a \$300,000 CDBG grant, supplemented by matching funds from Tyrone Township.

#### **Emergency Services Division Expands Programs**



Our Emergency Services Division launched two programs to assist Kent County residents. In partnership with our Health Department, the Diaper Assistance Program launched to support up to 400 households. Additionally, a collaboration with the City of Grand Rapids Water led to the Water Utility Assistance Program, which provides financial support and plumbing repairs for eligible households.

The division also expanded the Energy Reduction Weatherization Program, increasing production by 34% and assisting more households than the previous year.
