Founded in 1972 by a group of architects, the original name of the organization was "The Louisville Community Design Center" and its goal was to function as a medium for civic engagement that would empower citizens to improve the quality of life in their neighborhoods.

Today, CFN supports the community at large using a three-tiered approach of learning, organizing, and planning. CFN supports a resident-engaged democratic process that fosters participatory decision-making and improves the neighborhood's quality of life.
