<p>Healthy at Home Eviction Relief Fund</p> <p>teamkyhherf.ky.gov</p> <p>On September 4, 2020,, Gov. Beshear updated the state's executive order on evictions to reflect the U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention's moratorium on residential evictions through December 31, 2020.</p> <p>IMPORTANT NOTE: <u>In order for a homerenter to be eligible for eviction protection under the CDC guidelines, they must submit a declaration to their landlord.</u> The KY Equal Justice center has created an app for renters to create the declaration (free of charge) which can be found here: https://kyequaljustice.app.law/interview?i=do-cassemble.playground1%3AyKeHJW3qyBGY38kM.yml#page2</p>	<p>Kentuckians can visit the site to seek information on how to obtain a portion of \$15 million in federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act money. Details of the application of the funds include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Eligible landlords can be reimbursed for missed rent payments and receive some advance rent payments to keep tenants in their homes. • For eligible tenants, the program pays up to 90 percent of past-due rent and may also cover up to two months of future rent. • For approved applications, payments will be made directly to eligible landlords. • Kentuckians may submit applications beginning today, Tuesday, Sept. 8, 2020. <p>Please note: This fund is for all Kentucky counties outside of Jefferson County. Jefferson County has its own related federally-funded eviction prevention program. See next row.</p>
<p>Louisville Eviction Prevention COVID-19 Relief Fund</p> <p>https://louisvilleky.gov/government/development/louisville/eviction-prevention</p>	<p>Designed to prevent new eviction cases and aid low-to-moderate income households that are delinquent on rent payments as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Households earning at or below 60 percent of the area median income (\$45,840 annually for a family of four) are eligible to receive rental assistance.</p> <p>Fund will pay for up to three months of rent for households facing COVID-related delinquencies.</p> <p>The funds may only be used to pay rent, and all payments will made directly to the landlord. See website for further eligibility requirements.</p>

Healthy at Home Utility Relief Fund https://www.capky.org/covid-19-resources/ <p>Governor Andy Beshear signed an executive order designating \$15 million in federal COVID-19 relief funds for the Healthy at Home Utility Relief Fund. The fund will provide relief to Kentuckians affected by COVID-19 that need assistance with their water, wastewater, electric, or natural gas service. Kentucky's Community Action Network is partnering with Team Kentucky to distribute these funds statewide.</p>	<p>Households who have an income up to 200% of the Federal Poverty Line and have been economically impacted due to COVID-19 can apply and receive assistance for the minimum needed to alleviate the water and wastewater crisis up to \$500. Applicants can reapply until reaching the maximum benefit. Households can apply for electric and natural gas benefits once in a one month timeframe. The benefits each time are the minimum needed to alleviate crisis for up to \$200.</p> <p>All applicants will be required to supply the following documentation at time of application:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Most current utility bill

They do not have a central contact number, so ask constituent what school and school district they are in, age group (see below), and find contact information on website at "DFRYSC Database of Center Information."</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • FRCs – Family Resource Centers. Typically serve Pre-school to Grade 6 children through elementary schools. • YSCs – Youth Services Center. Typically serve middle and high schools. • FRYSCs – Centers that serve Pre-school to Grade 12. Typically in small school districts.
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
