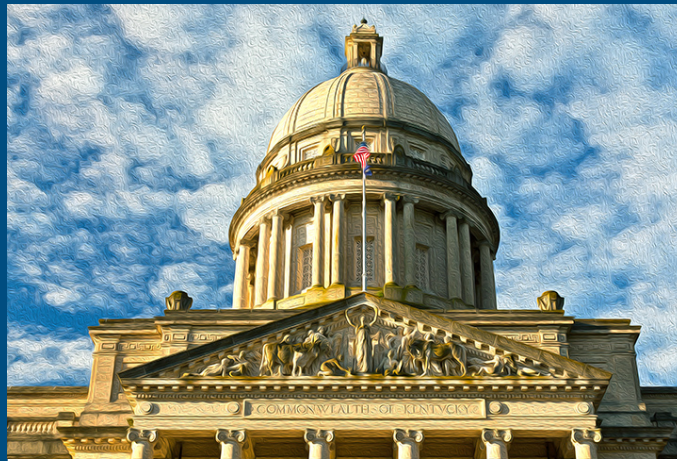
ELECTION INTEGRITY TASK FORCE

Through the implementation of Electronic Poll Books, Kentucky voters can now have more confidence in their voting experience.

E-Poll Books increase security by:

- ✓ Monitors voter activity while maintaining privacy
- ✓ Prevents voter fraud
- ✓ Allows for oversight of Election Day activity
- ✓ Provides instant and direct support for clerks and law enforcement
- ✓ Saves Kentucky time and money



CIVIC EDUCATION

The **MOST IMPORTANT** thing anyone can do to protect our democracy is to get educated and stay involved. Secretary Grimes created the first-ever Civic Health Index for Kentucky.
