

West Michigan Jobless Rates Increase in January

In January, the Grand Rapids-Wyoming and Muskegon metropolitan statistical areas both experienced seasonal unemployment rate increases of 0.5 and 0.6 percentage points, respectively. The Grand Rapids-Wyoming MSA jobless rate stood at 4.0 percent, consistent with January 2017. Meanwhile, the Muskegon area recorded an unemployment rate of 5.9 percent, down 0.3 percentage points over the year.



This trend is in line with that of Michigan overall, where the jobless rate rose 0.9 percentage points to 5.3 percent in January. In Michigan, the number of employed individuals fell by 79,000, while unemployment increased by 38,000.

The size of the labor force in the Grand Rapids-Wyoming MSA fell by 0.5 percent to 570,400 over the month. This occurred along with an increase in the number of unemployed individuals in the area (+2,600). Over the year, the size of the labor force was up by 5,400 workers, led by an increase of employed persons by the same number, yielding an unemployment rate in January 2018 that was equivalent to the previous year.

The Muskegon metropolitan area experienced similar trends during January. The size of the labor force declined by 400, while the number of employed diminished by 1.1 percent. Over the year, the size of the labor force, employment, and unemployment were relatively stable. The labor force added 200, split into an increase of 500

employed and a decline of 300 unemployed individuals. (Table 1)

In comparison to the other metropolitan statistical areas, Grand Rapids-Wyoming stands with the second lowest unemployment rate, behind only Ann Arbor by 0.4 percentage points. Muskegon moved from the third highest to the fourth highest metropolitan area in terms of the jobless rate in January. (Figure 1)

January Non-Metro Unemployment Rates Higher in January

West Michigan non-metro counties experienced seasonal jobless rate increases in January. These changes ranged from +0.6 percentage points in Lake County to +1.8 percentage points in Oceana County. Lake County, which typically records the highest jobless rate in the region every month, was surpassed by Oceana in January. Both of these counties recorded a jobless rate above 9 percent.

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Note: Labor force, employment, and unemployment data for all 12 months of 2017 have been recently revised. The size of the labor force declined in half of the West Michigan non-metro counties, with the net change in the region equal to a decline of 825 participants. This decrease in labor force participation was led by Allegan County (-375) and Mecosta County (-325). (Table 2)

Jobless rates rose sharply in Northwest Michigan over the month; the average increase was 1.2 percentage points. The largest changes were in Missaukee (+1.7 percentage points), Kalkaska (+1.6 percentage points), and Leelanau (+1.6 percentage points). Each of these counties had monthly employment declines (-2,125 in total) and unemployment advances (+1,525 in total). (Appendix 1)

Prosperity Region Seasonal Jobless Rates Rise in January

The unemployment rate in the West Michigan Prosperity Alliance increased by 0.6 percentage points in January to 4.6 percent. The number of employed individuals shrunk by 8,700, while unemployment rose seasonally by4,800. Over the year, the size of the labor force increased by 0.8 percent and the unemployment rate edged down by 0.1 percentage points. (Appendix 3)

Northwest Michigan's unemployment rate registered a higher January seasonal hike, adding 1.1 percentage points over the month. However, the unemployment rate fell 0.4 percentage points over the year. Seasonal declines in employment (-2,200) and the labor force (-600) were recorded in January, matched by an increase in the number of unemployed (+1,500).

West Michigan Payroll Jobs Decline in January

Grand Rapids-Wyoming Metropolitan Statistical Area

January nonfarm jobs in the Grand Rapids-Wyoming MSA were down by -10,500, bringing the total to 551,000. Since January 2017, total nonfarm employment rose 7,700 (+1.4 percent), outpacing growth in Michigan overall (+1.0 percent). Notable reductions in January occurred in the *Service providing* and *Goods producing* domains (-8,800 and -1,700 respectively). Jobs in these two sectors were above January 2017 levels. **(Table 3)**

- Large seasonal job cuts were recorded in each of the three largest industries by employment share. *Trade, transportation, and utilities* subtracted 2,400 jobs (-2.5 percent), *Educational and health services* recorded 1,600 fewer jobs (-1.7 percent), and *Professional and business services* declined by 3.1 percent (-2,500 jobs).
- The Professional and business services industry has not recorded a January decline this large since 2011.
- Over the year, jobs added outpaced jobs lost due to large additions in five industries. *Manufacturing* was the largest in the *Goods producing* domain, adding 1,800 jobs. *Health care and social assistance* added 2,900 jobs over the year, making it the largest in the *Service providing* domain.

Muskegon Metropolitan Statistical Area

The number of nonfarm jobs in the Muskegon area fell a seasonal 1.8 percent to 63,800 in January. This decline was the largest in January since 2015. The entire reduction occurred in the *Service providing* sector. Over the year, the Muskegon MSA added 800 jobs (+1.3 percent). **(Table 3)**

- *Trade, transportation, and utilities* subtracted 600 jobs, or 4.3 percent over the month. This industry is the second largest in the Muskegon metropolitan area, accounting for 20.1 percent of jobs in January.
- The only job advances between December and January were recorded in *Manufacturing* (+100) and *Professional and business services* (+100).


