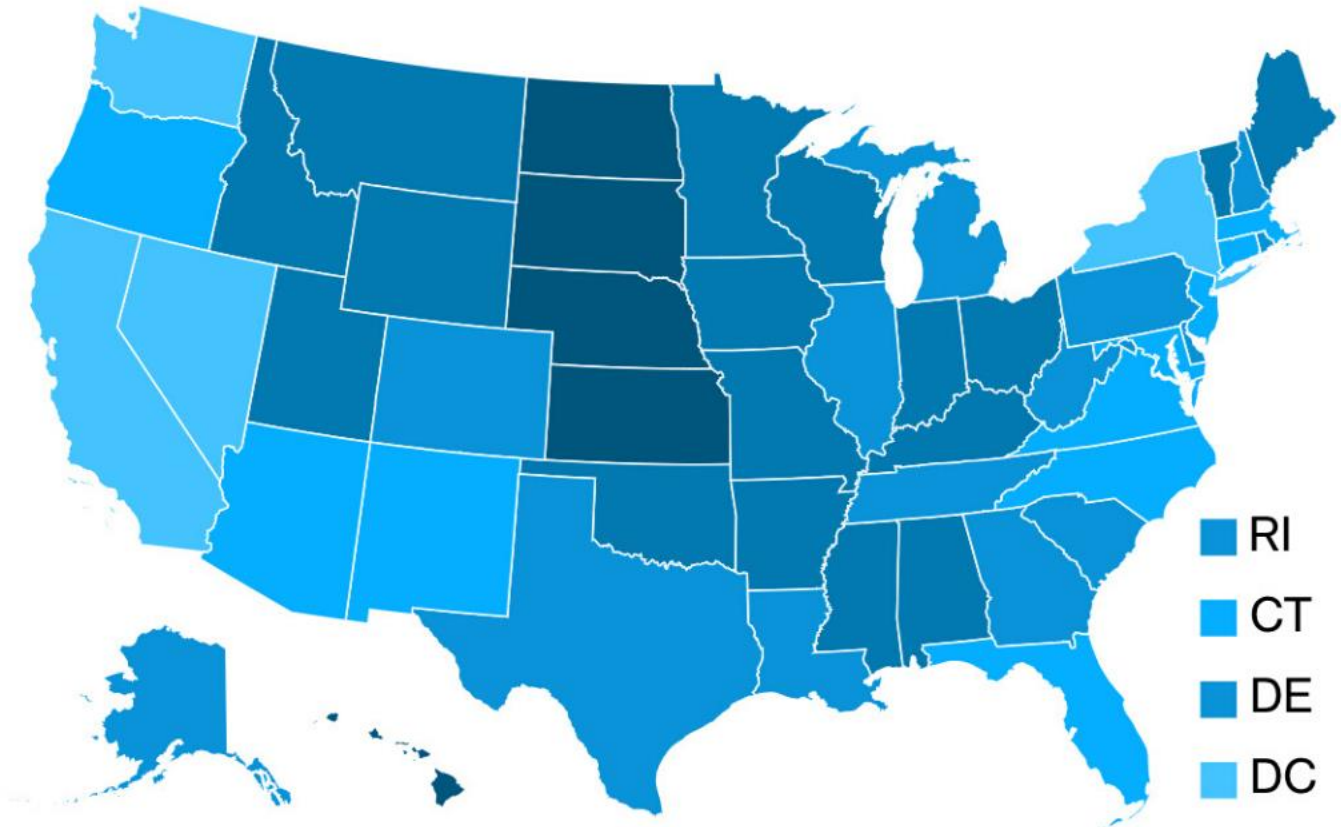

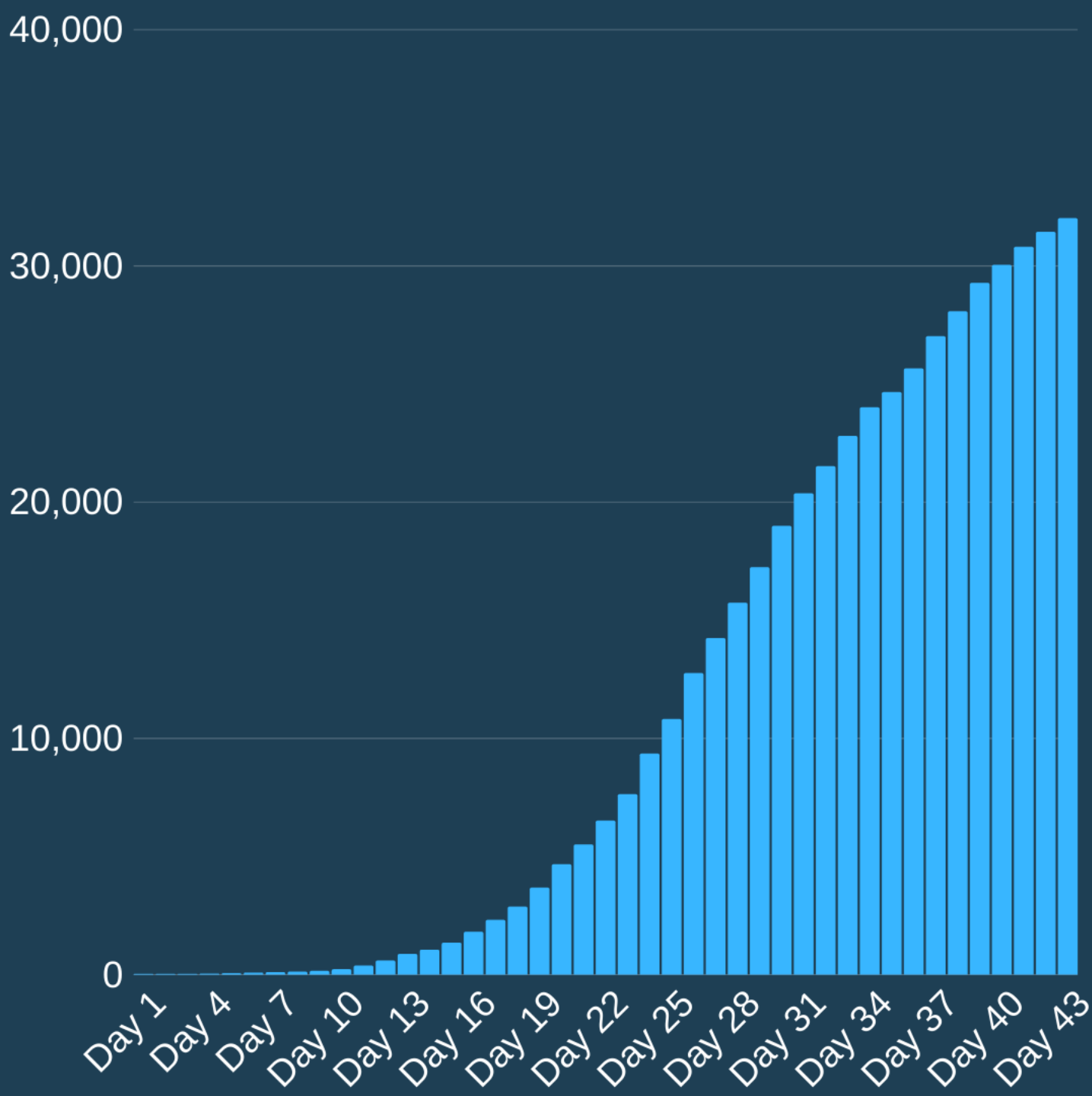
SINCE FRIDAY:

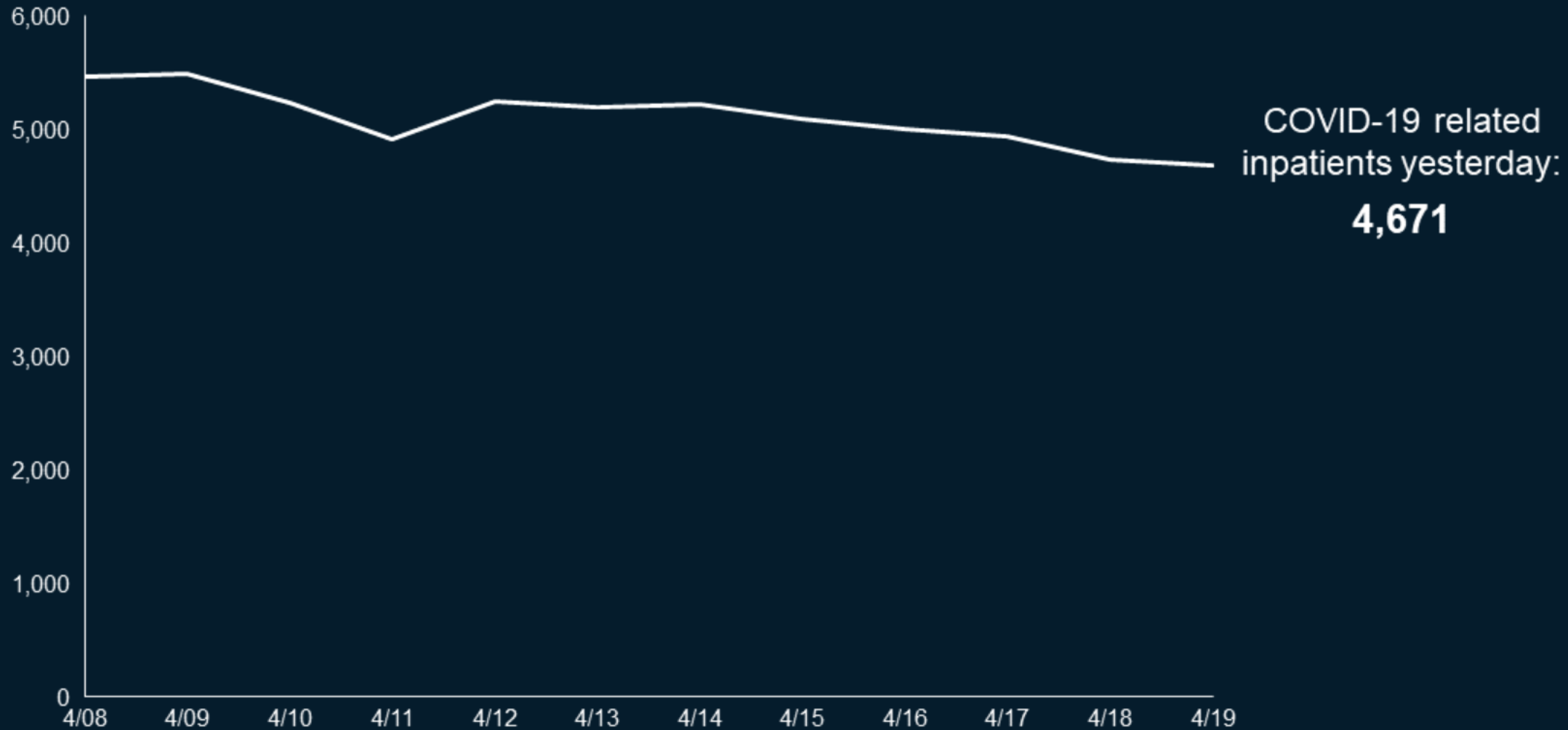

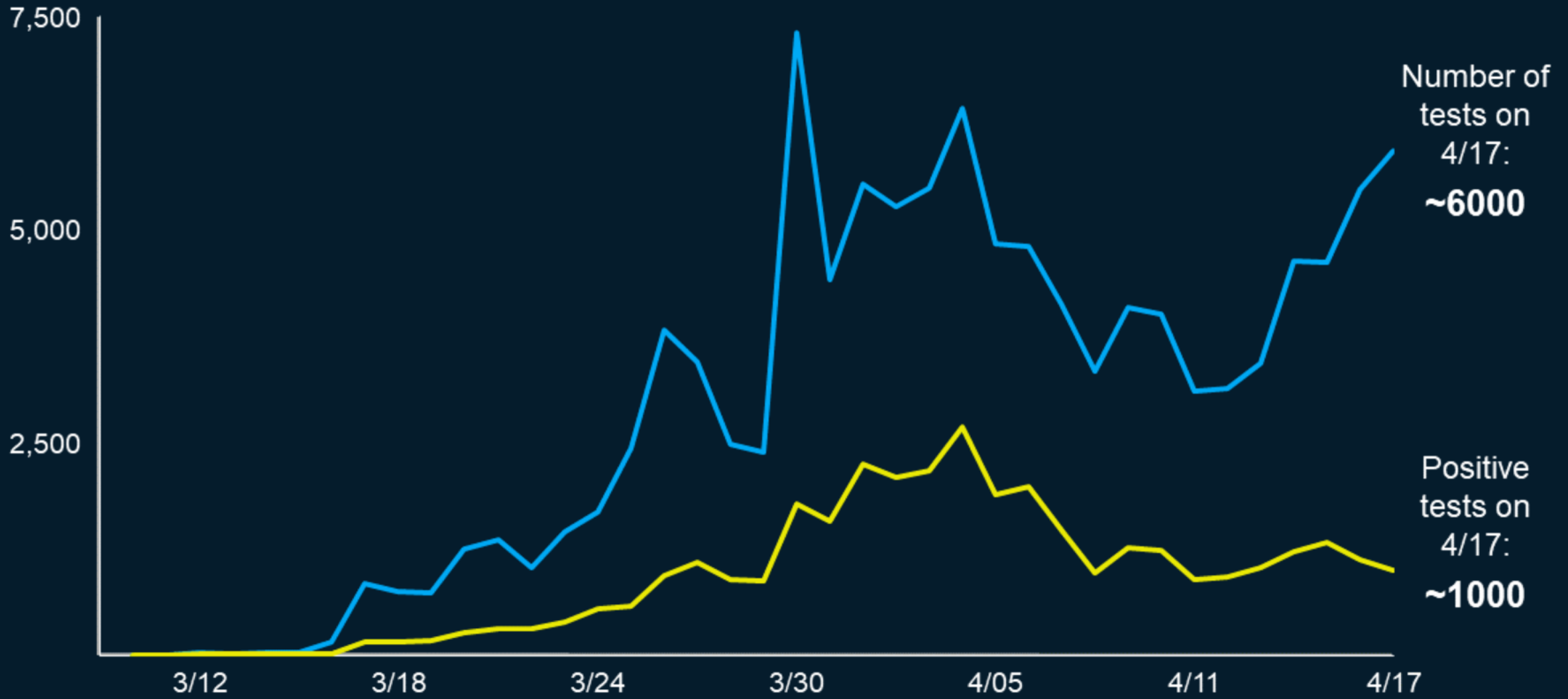

COVID-19 related inpatients in hospital, current admitted patients by day

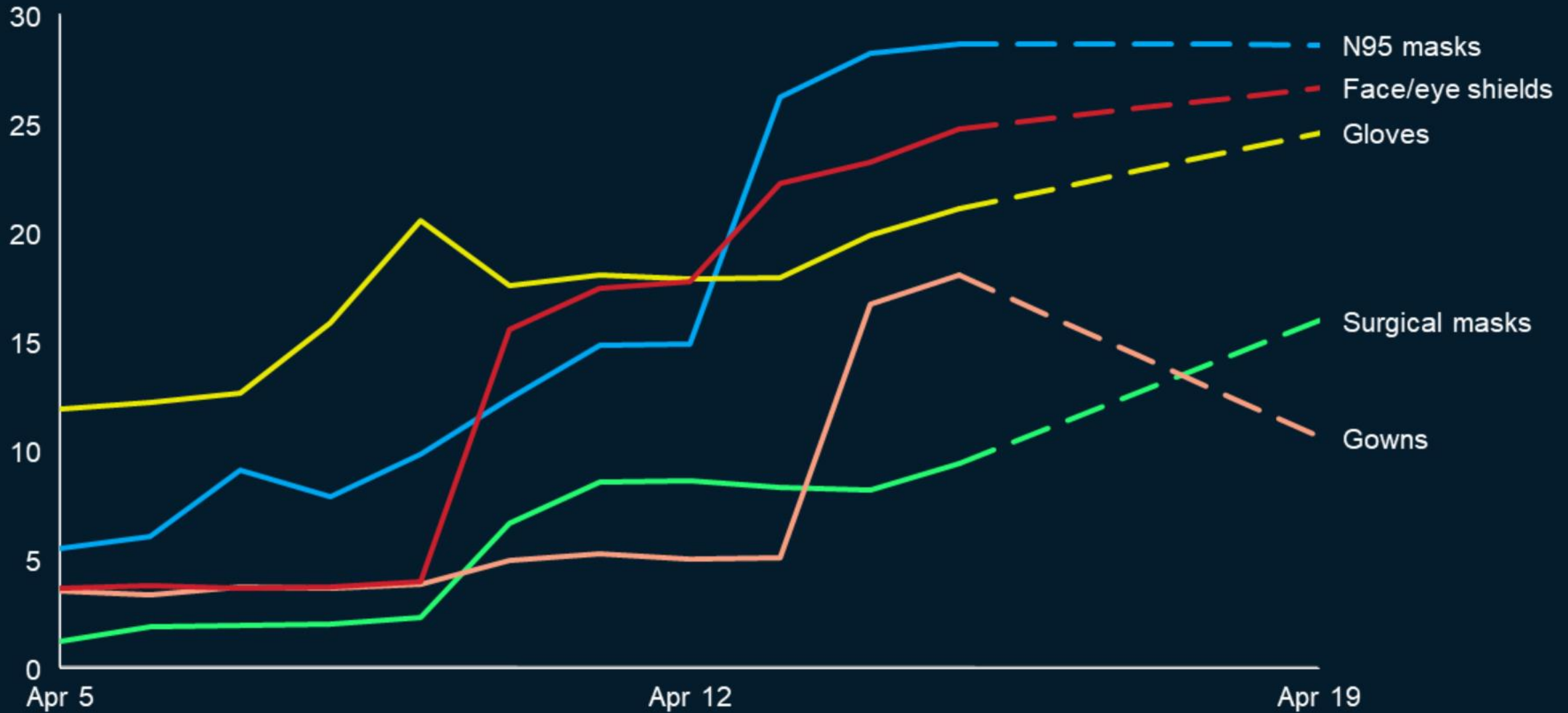

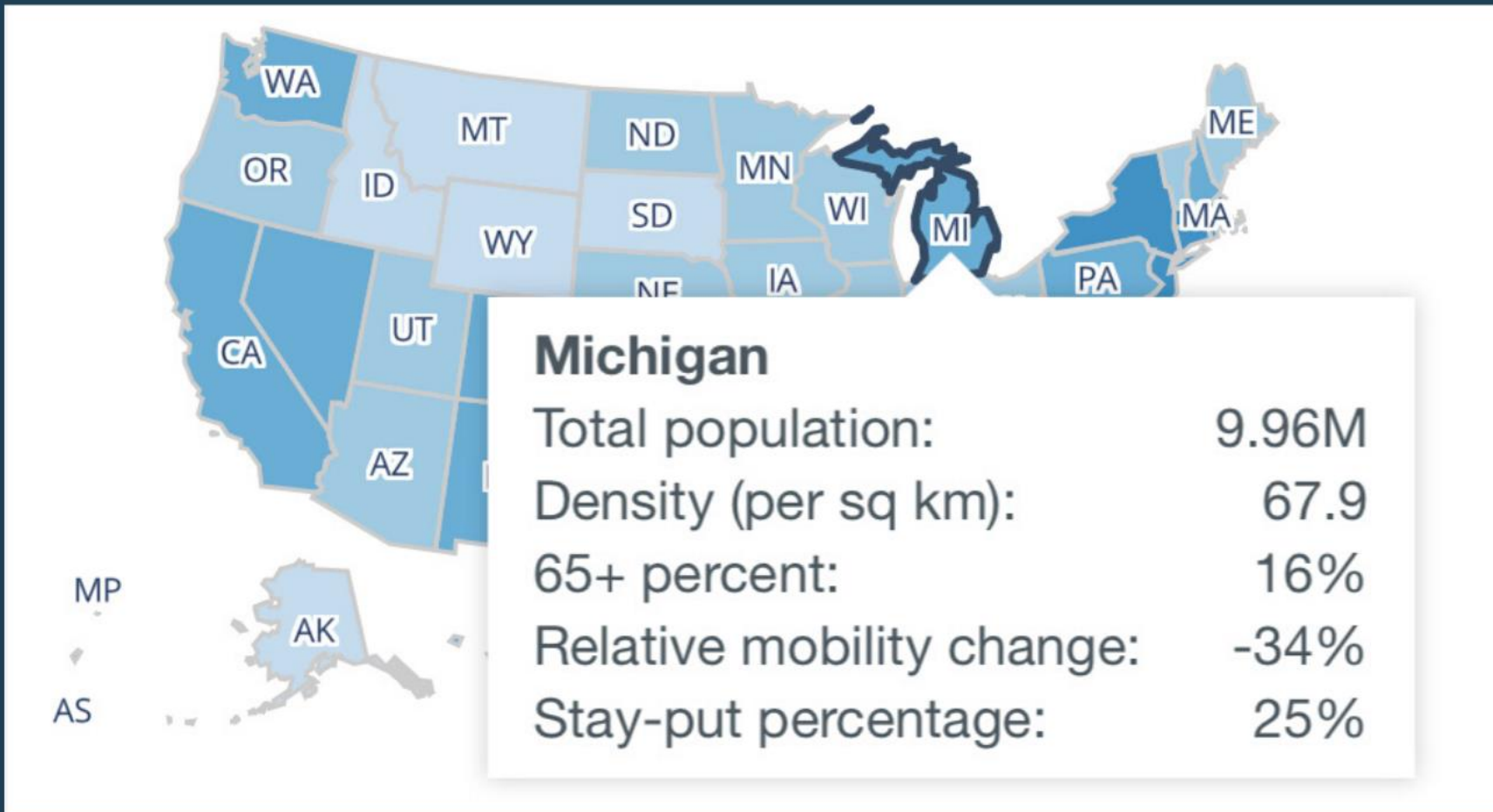
Number of COVID-19 tests and positive tests each day

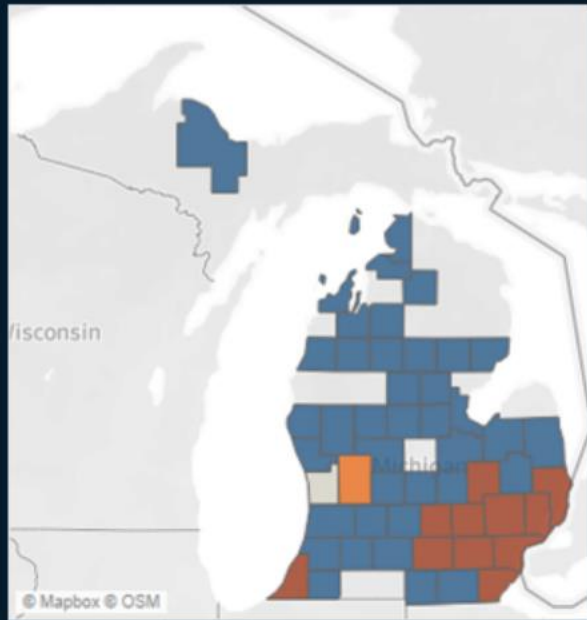
This map is based on insights developed by the Covid-19 Mobility Data Network, coordinated by [Direct Relief](#) and researchers from the [Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health](#), using aggregated data through [Facebook's Data for Good](#) program.

The bump in coronavirus cases is most pronounced in [states without stay at home orders](#). Oklahoma saw a 53% increase in cases over the past week, according to data [compiled by Johns Hopkins University](#). Over same time, cases jumped 60% in Arkansas, 74% in Nebraska, and 82% in Iowa. South Dakota saw a whopping 205% spike.

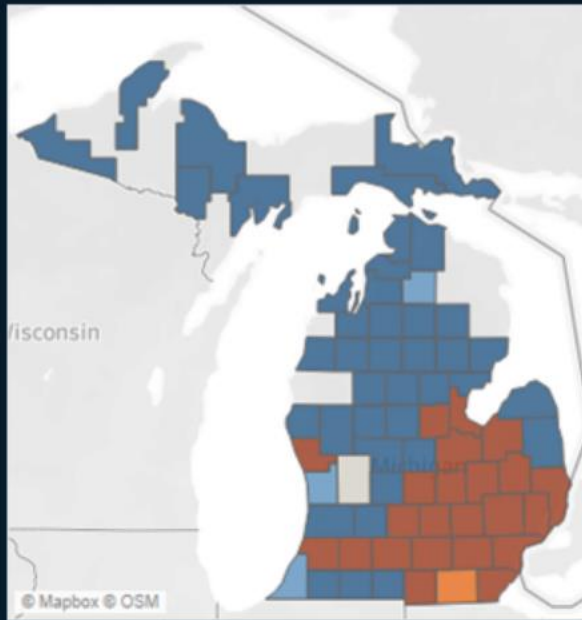
Doubling time of case growth across Michigan over the last 3 weeks

(Blue/Grey = slower spread, Red/Orange = faster spread)

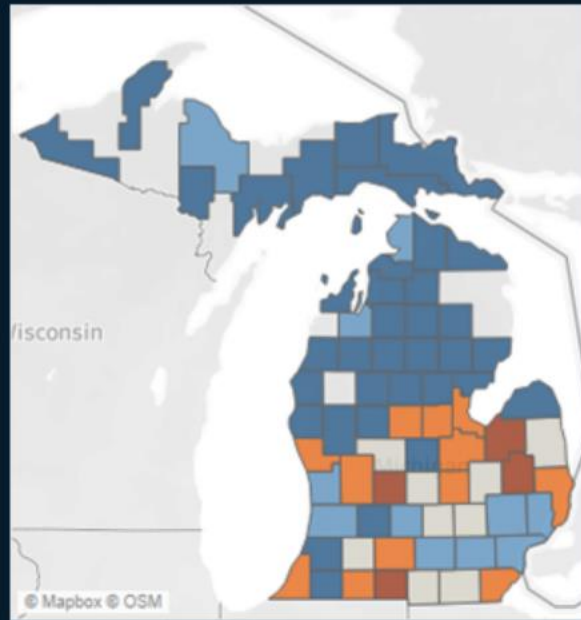

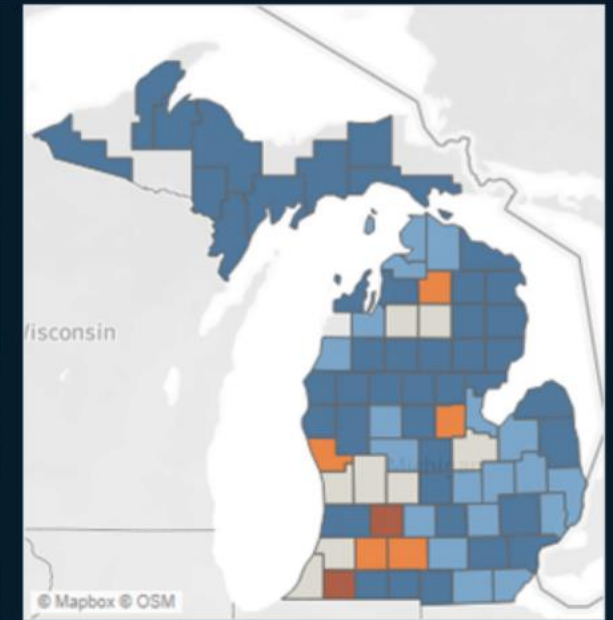

Potential Workplace Controls

Controls will be tailored to particular sectors

Controlling access

- Symptom diaries
- Temperature checks
- Limits on visitors

Physical distancing

- Minimizing number of workers who need to be present
- Close common areas, limit meeting size
- Reconfiguring the workspace to limit contact

Improved sanitation and hygiene

- Frequent disinfection and cleaning
- Creating handwashing stations as needed
- Limiting use of shared tools / machinery

Protective equipment

- Cloth face coverings for all workers
- Gloves for personal contact, handling shared items
- Face shields as necessary

Testing, tracing, and isolating

- Rapid testing at large workplaces for employees
- Worksite contact tracing for any positive cases
- Supporting employees who stay home when they are sick or have had close contact with someone who is sick
