


DOES YOUR CURRENT KITCHEN LAYOUT FUNCTION FOR YOUR NEEDS?

Alexander Macomb

War Hero of 1812 and Our County's Namesake


Living in Macomb County, you may have wondered where the name came from. The story begins back around 1770, when two brothers originally from County Antrim, Ireland, decided to leave New York and come to what was then Fort Detroit to go into business as real estate speculators and merchants—at a time when all of Belle Isle could be purchased for eight barrels of rum, three rolls of tobacco, six pounds of vermillion paint, and a wampum belt.

There one of the brothers, Alexander, married a woman named Mary Catharine Navarre, whose family originally came from France, and together they had a son, also named Alexander, in 1782. Growing up at the fort, Alexander was steeped in military life. According to George H. Richards, author of

Memoir of Alexander Macomb, "The chubby boy became a favorite with the soldiers of the garrison. He was dandled on the soldier's knee, fed at the soldier's mess—his eye was dazzled with the gorgeous pageantry of military parade, and his ear delighted with the rousing strains of martial music."

At the age of 14, says Richards, Alexander expressed a wish to join the military. His father, concerned that he should complete his studies before launching such a career path, insisted that Alexander improve his mind through additional study in mathematics, drawing, fencing, and riding. In his father's opinion, "When he had completed his studies and evinced a competent ability, he might think of [the military] as a profession; but if he were to launch into the world

with a mind uniformed and undisciplined, his course of instruction unfinished, it would be idle to expect the attainment of eminence in any pursuit."

However, like children have done for time immemorial, Alexander didn't take his father's advice entirely to heart. Without his family's knowledge, he joined the Army as Cornet of the Light Dragoons on January 10, 1799. This choice turned out to be the beginning of a notable military career.

In 1803, Alexander married his cousin Catherine, "a beautiful and highly accomplished young lady of sixteen," and carried on with his work in the Army. He was one of the first officers trained at West Point and helped to build the fortifications at Fort Gratiot. A few years later, in 1806, while serving as a Judge Advocate General (JAG) in the Army, Alexander wrote the first book on American procedures for martial law and courts-martial.

Despite these accomplishments, Alexander's greatest contributions were still ahead. In 1812, what some at the time called the "Second War of Independence" began, when the United States and the United Kingdom went to war. As Brigadier General in command of the Right Division of the Northern Army, Alexander was in command of defending the frontier of northern New York. With a battle looming at Plattsburgh, near Lake Champlain, and knowing that his forces were seriously outnumbered, Alexander spent the weeks before the battle moving trees

and creating fake roads in an attempt to lead British forces away from the three American forts in the area. Trapped by the maze he created, the British became easy targets for an American ambush.

Alexander's success in the battle was rewarded with the thanks of Congress and a Congressional Gold Medal for his "gallantry and good conduct," and he was promoted to Major General. Later, in 1828, Alexander was made Commanding General of the United States Army.

After the war, Alexander continued to contribute. He worked to increase pay for enlisted men to limit desertion, developed relief for widows and orphans of officers who died of wounds or disease, and spearheaded a system for officer retirement and replacement.

Not forgetting his training in drawing as a child. Alexander also maintained an interest in art. His watercolor and pencil painting, called Detroit as Seen from the Canadian Shore, resides at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

With his illustrious career in mind, it is no surprise that Louis Cass, Governor of Michigan Territory, named Macomb County for Alexander Macomb when it was formed on January 15, 1818-the third county to be created in the territory and encompassing what is now also Oakland, Lapeer, Genesee, and St. Clair counties as well. Says Richards, "It expressed their sentiments of friendship, gratitude for his military administration, and prayers for his future."

SERVING OUR COMMUNITY

Macomb County Clerk Anthony Forlini Shares the Services the Office Provides Our Community

November brings thoughts of Thanksgiving dinner, falling leaves, elections, and Veteran's Day. At the Macomb County Clerk's office, headed by County Clerk Anthony Forlini, two of these are of particular importance. With approximately 100 employees spread between three buildings, the County Clerk's office focuses on four major areas-Vital Records, Register of Deeds, Courts, and Elections.

"The one most folks are familiar with is elections," he says. "The county election department is responsible for the administrative side of the election process-it is the clerks in local municipalities that actually have the responsibility to run elections for all of us." This administrative work at the county includes receiving candidate and proposal filings, preparing, proofing, and distributing ballots to local clerks, tabulator programming, election result accumulation, recounts, recalls, and assisting local clerks, the public, and the County Board of Canvassers to "check and double check" all election processes. With new changes allowing for at least nine days of early voting, "We want to make it easy for clerks to do their jobs while protecting our election system."

"The most important thing we can do is to make sure we have free and fair elections that reflect the will of the American people," he says. "Voters need to stay informed, get to know the candidates and proposals and then go vote." Forlini values public awareness and transparency in the election process. "We are the only county clerk in the state to do a forensic audit of the election server, and though we found no election interference, we developed new security protocols that further strengthened our systems. Our job in this department is never done, as we make continued security improvements and updates in our election department."

All of this is a big job, and Forlini had a lot to do to improve things when he started as County Clerk. "We were months behind on records and filings, voicemail was used often, and employees weren't cross trained, which slowed down service during vacations and illness. Concealed Pistol License (CPL) appointments were as far out as three months and you had to go to a different building to get fingerprinted." All that has changed, Forlini says. With improvements to cross-training, the implementation of new technology, and other changes, "We have all

but eliminated wait times for all services." Deeds are now registered within 24-48 hours, the Vital Records Department provides service within minutes, concealed weapons permits are processed the same day, and fingerprints can be done without a trip to the Sheriff's Department. "I believe we owe the taxpayers a service," he continues. "They do not owe us a job. Every resident deserves friendly, efficient service and that is our goal.

With Veteran's Day on the horizon, Forlini is eager to remind veterans how their office can help. "One of the ways we honor our veterans at the Clerk's office is to make sure they and their families have access to proof and verification that they served in the military-a form called a DD214." This form, critical for the proof of service needed for special home loans, Social Security benefits, membership in veteran's organizations, or to honor a loved one with a military burial, says Forlini, can be retained for free forever at the Clerk's office. "You never know when you are going to need access to this document," he adds. "Let us keep it safe for you."

The Macomb County Clerk's office is looking out for jurors as well, with free parking now being offered downtown. "Parking was not provided for our jurors, and that was a problem for me," he explains. "I love Mount Clemens and our existing parking by parking meter created some bad will, with jurors leaving Mount Clemens as soon as jury service was over." By providing free parking, Forlini hopes jurors will feel free to take the time to try a great local restaurant or some of the other "cool places Downtown Mount Clemens has to offer."

As someone who has lived in Macomb County his entire life, serving first as Harrison Township Supervisor and State Representative before his election as County Clerk in 2020, Forlini feels a strong commitment to the area his office serves. Married to his high school sweetheart, Diane, for 38 years and a proud father and grandfather, he was knighted by the President of Italy in 2016 for charitable works between the two countries and is focused on providing the community the best service possible. "We believe that honesty is the best policy. We believe that concern for your neighbor is more important than a political belief. We believe that we are problem solvers. We aim to show this every day."
































FOR A NEW

Many people have not heard of Michigan Works! Agencies. Those that have, often mistake it as just the Unemployment Insurance Office or an organization you visit if you want tuition funds. Michigan Works offers a wide variety of job search support for job seekers and connecting them with employers in our community.

Tyeisha was a young mother, unemployed and struggling to find work in the post-pandemic economy. Wanting to become a Certified Nurse Assistant, she reached out to Michigan Works for guidance. Tyeisha enrolled in the Young Professionals Program, and working with a Career Development Facilitator, got the assistance she needed to identify an appropriate training opportunity at Michigan Healthcare Academy in Mount Clemens.

With the help of grant funding, Tyeisha enrolled in a Nursing Assistant program in April, and completed her training a few months later. Support services through the Michigan Works Young Professionals Program assisted Tyeisha with the cost of the state exam, and when she didn't pass the first time around, her Career Development Facilitator helped her come up with a game plan to pass the second time around. Once Tyeisha was ready to start

looking for a job, her facilitator was by her side as she updated her resume and began her job search. In a few weeks, Tyeisha was hired as a full-time Certified Nursing Assistant, and Michigan Works even helped Tyeisha get the necessary scrubs and nursing shoes she needed to start off right. As for her new job, Tyeisha says it is "everything I hoped it would be."

At Macomb/St. Clair Michigan Works, Tyeisha is just one of many success stories. By providing job search assistance, career and training resources, and both online and in-person events on topics such as resume development, interviewing skills, and more, Michigan Works lives its mission to "connect and support employers and job seekers to strengthen our economy and community." According to Justin Al-Igoe, Executive Director of Macomb/St. Clair Michigan Works Workforce Development Board, support is available across many fields, including emerging ones such as careers related to the growth in electric vehicles. "Additional career growth in areas like electricians, engineers, and even urban planners is expected," says Justin. "Construction is expected to grow as the infrastructure, such as public charging stations, will be needed. Several new certifications, such as battery technician and related training, are developed or in the process of being developed."


Training for a new career in the automotive industry helped Gabriel, who came to Michigan Works after losing his job with a mortgage company during the pandemic. Frustrated by finding only entry-level positions in retail and delivery driving, Gabriel reached out for help to make a change. He found he qualified for tuition assistance from the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, the Michigan Learning and Education Advancement Program, and an Industry Infinity grant, and enrolled at Macomb Community College in the Controls Technician program. Gabriel completed his certificate and began his new career shortly afterward working as an Automation Technician at a starting wage of \$27.50 per hour. "I was able to start a new career in manufacturing that would not have been possible without the assistance of Michigan Works," he says.

Of course, Macomb-St. Clair Michigan Works isn't just for job seekers-it also assists employers with finding the people they need. When Niagara Bottling was building a new plant in Shelby Township, they reached out Michigan Works Business Services. Michigan Works assisted the company with understanding the local labor market to set competitive wages, helped with posting available positions, and partnered with Niagara for a hiring fair at the Clinton Township Michigan Works Service Center, which resulted in the largest turn out Macomb-St. Clair Michigan Works has had for any job fair-over 1000 candidates for positions ranging from Warehouse Associate to Production Supervisor. The team at Niagara Bottling was pleased with the results. "We were able to find multiple well-qualified candidates for even our salary roles-Production Supervisor and Warehouse Supervisor. We were even able to find multiple great candidates for the higher-skilled QA Technician and Maintenance Tech roles, which we were having a difficult time finding candidates for."


