HUD special NOFO for unsheltered homelessness

HUD's policy priorities

\$322 million in Continuum of Care Program grants. Hennepin County can apply for up to ~\$13.5m in projects over a three-year period, for eligible services, projects and a community plan that:

- Reduces unsheltered homelessness
- Involves a broad array of stakeholders, including people with lived experience, and leverages healthcare and housing resources
- Advances equity
- Uses a housing-first approach

After the initial three years, funds become renewable annually through the regular CoC process.

Alignment with 2020-2025 strategy

Hennepin's 2020-2025 strategy focuses on making homelessness rare, brief and nonrecurring with a priority to reduce unsheltered homelessness, as encapsulated in the following fundamental principles:

- Unsheltered homelessness represents a serious health and safety risk and is not a dignified way to live
- The priority when working with people experiencing homelessness—in sheltered or unsheltered settings should be helping those individuals and households access housing as an urgent matter
- Housing ends homelessness. Everyone is housable.

Eligible components of community-based projects

- Permanent housing
- Rapid rehousing and permanent supportive housing
- Transitional housing and rapid rehousing hybrid
- Supportive services only
