National Experts Joining Us for the Superintendent's Forum:

Mary Ruth Coleman, Ph.D. is a Senior Scientist, Emeritus, at the FPG Child Development Institute, at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where she directs Project U-STAR~PLUS (Using Science, Talents and Abilities to Recognize Students – Promoting Learning in Underrepresented Students). Her projects have included: ACCESS (Achievement in Content and Curriculum for Every Student's Success), a National Significance Project funded by OSEP and applications of Rtl for young children through the Recognition & Response Project sponsored by the Tremaine Foundation. Dr. Coleman has numerous publications including the 14th Edition of the seminal textbook, "Educating Exceptional Children" by Samuel A. Kirk, James J. Gallagher, Mary Ruth Coleman (2015). She has served three terms on the Board of Directors for the Association for Gifted (TAG), one of which she was President; three terms on the Board of the National Association for Gifted Children (NAGC); and two terms on the Board of Directors for the international Council for Exceptional Children (CEC). She was president of the CEC in 2007.

Jonathan Plucker, Ph.D. is the Julian C. Stanley Endowed Professor of Talent Development at Johns Hopkins University, where he works in the Center for Talented Youth and School of Education. He received his Ph.D. in educational psychology from the University of Virginia. His research examines educational psychology, education policy, and talent development, with over 200 publications to his credit and over \$40 million in external funding to support his work. Recent books include Excellence Gaps in Education with Scott Peters (Harvard Ed Press) and Creativity and Innovation (Prufrock). He has worked with administrators, teachers, and parents in several states and other countries. He frequently works with the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation on studies of state-level policies that promote excellence and reduce excellence gaps. Professor Plucker is the recipient of the 2012 Arnheim Award for Outstanding Achievement from APA and 2013 Distinguished Scholar Award from the National Association for Gifted Children. He is president-elect of NAGC.

Julia Link Roberts, Ph.D. is the Mahurin Professor of Gifted Studies at Western Kentucky University and the Executive Director of The Center for Gifted Studies and The Gatton Academy of Mathematics and Science in Kentucky. Dr. Roberts is the president of the World Council for Gifted and Talented Children; current past-president of The Association for the Gifted, a division of the Council for Exceptional Children; chair of the Kentucky Advisory Council for Gifted and Talented Children; and board member of the Kentucky Association for Gifted Education. She has been honored as a Distinguished Professor at WKU and has received the Acorn Award as the outstanding professor at a Kentucky four-year university. Her most recent publication is Introduction to Gifted Education for which she was co-editor. Dr. Roberts writes and presents on advocacy, assessment, differentiation, curriculum, and various topics in gifted education. She directs programming for children, young people, and educators in the summer and throughout the school year.
