Resource for Understanding Where is the Middle East?" The concept of a region called the "Middle East" is a relatively recent and unstable construction. Since the term was first coined at the beginning of the 20th century, it has been applied to different sets of countries and territories. These designations all represent different ways of conceptualizing what these territories have in common and how they relate to other parts of the world. This presentation uses maps to illustrate the lack of consensus among governments, international organizations, and scholars regarding how to define the Middle East or even whether to use that term and is a good way to have students begin thinking about the region.

<u>Featured Global Islam and the Arts Teacher Fellows Lesson: The</u> Impact of the Silk Road and Islam on World History

In this lesson written by Tinisha Shaw, Students will use technology to explore the social, cultural, religious, and economic impact of the Silk Road and other transcontinental trade routes between the Classical Era and Gunpowder Empires of World History. Students will focus on the great achievements of empires and kingdoms, the great scholars, and Islamic explorers during the time of great social, cultural, and economic expansion in Europe, Asia, and Africa. At the conclusion of the lesson, students will create an interactive travel journal to highlight the different experiences that travelers along the Silk Road and other transcontinental trade routes would have encountered.
