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KEY DATES FOR 2024–25 REPORTING

The 2024–25 School Year Reporting Timeline

On September 3, 2025, School Performance Grades, school identifications, end-of-grade (EOG) and end-of-course (EOC) test results, the Cohort Graduation Rate (CGR), and other data for the 2024-25 school year will be presented to the State Board of Education (SBE). Once finalized, a list of all reported data and data available to public school units (PSUs) for local use will be provided to accountability directors or testing coordinators. The timeline, including required due dates for districts and charter schools to review and finalize all data, are provided in the following chart:

¹ It is the responsibility of all PSUs to keep data provided in preliminary audit files and internal reports embargoed. The data is not official until presented to the State Board of Education. The Office of Accountability and Testing provides these data early for local quality control checks and to assist PSUs with planning for the upcoming school year.

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Exit Code Documentation Monitoring

Randomly selected schools will participate in an electronic monitoring process to affirm the removal of students from the four-year and five-year CGR denominators. This will require collecting all documentation from PSUs electronically. PSUs will be notified of schools selected for monitoring in July, and the monitoring process will occur between July 21 and August 1, 2025.

Standard Setting and Delayed Scores

On July 6, 2023, the SBE adopted new general and Extended Content Standards for science in grades K–12. New content standards require the development of new tests aligned to those content standards. Thus, in the 2023–24 school year, new EOG, EOC, and NCEXTEND1 test items were developed, and the new science tests were implemented in the 2024–25 school year.

As with any new test, once all administrations are completed, an externally facilitated standard setting process is conducted. In this process, panels of North Carolina teachers draft a recommendation for presentation to the SBE for the approval of academic achievement standards (Levels 5, 4, 3, and Not Proficient for EOGs and EOCs and Levels 4, 3, and Not Proficient for NCEXTEND1). The standard setting workshop will be held in July. On August 6–7, 2025, the SBE will review the recommended academic achievement standards for the EOG, EOC, and NCEXTEND1 science tests. After SBE approval, the academic achievement standards will be applied to the 2024–25 science tests and the Individual Student Reports will be available for dissemination. No data on the science tests will be available prior to the SBE's adoption of the academic achievement levels.

ACT Composite Score Change

Effective with students entering in the fall of 2026, the University of North Carolina (UNC) Board of Governors has set an ACT composite score of 17 as a minimum eligibility requirement where applicable. The changes and the timeline for how the ACT composite score is used and reported can be found in the Testing News Network (TNN) message *ACT Minimum Composite Change Timeline* posted on March 17, 2025.

Exit Criteria for English Learners Change

Pending the U.S. Department of Education's approval, the following change to the English Learner exit composite score will be implemented for the 2024–25 school year.

• The overall composite score to exit EL status changed from 4.8 to 4.5.

Waiver Granted by the USED – Hurricane Helene

For all schools affected by Hurricane Helene, the loss of instructional days (number) due to Hurricane Helene will be noted on data reports, accountability reports, and the NC Report Card.

For schools providing end-of-course fall testing, a waiver was granted by the U.S. Department of Education (USED) due to the of loss of instructional days because of

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Hurricane Helene. Under this waiver, fall tests are excluded from the school performance grade and long-term goal calculations. In addition, participation adjustments were applied if schools were unable to test at least 95% of their students in the fall. Thirteen schools opted into this waiver.

More information about accountability and reporting relating to items in this memo will be provided to PSU's accountability and testing coordinators. Regional accountability office staff are available to support PSUs in completing all data collection and review processes.
