# Four Year Rolling Plan

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### What is the Four-Year Rolling Plan?

• Outlines steps the student will take in high school in preparation for life after graduation

- The Four-Year Plan covers all four years of high school, and the first full year after graduation
  - Courses in high school
  - General plans for after high school and connections to high school courses and activities

# How Does the Four-Year Plan Benefit the Students?


- Initiates the conversation about the connection between high school and plans for after high school
- Gives students a sense of what to expect after high school
  - Preparation requirements for their intended career
  - High school coursework required to be ready for college coursework, career opportunities, or military opportunities being pursued
- Documents conversations the student has about his/her future

### Is the Four-Year Rolling Plan mandatory?

- Not required for graduation
- REQUIRED for a student to be considered Choice Ready
- REQUIRED for the new North Dakota Scholarship!
  - <u>3-year overlap</u> that includes current juniors and seniors
  - This year's sophomores and beyond will need the plan for the scholarship

### Four-Year Rolling Plan in Choice Ready

- The Four-Year Rolling Plan is REQUIRED in order for a student to be considered Choice Ready
  - Required in all three areas
    - Post-Secondary Ready
    - Workforce Ready
    - Military Ready





#### Choice Ready Checklist and RUReady.ND.gov

RUReady.ND.gov includes a curriculum called **North Dakota Choice Ready** that will help with data collection of Choice Ready elements and Four-Year Rolling Plan activities for Choice Ready reporting.

The North Dakota Choice Ready curriculum in RUReady.ND.gov has 2 parts:

- Activities for students to complete that would fulfill Choice Ready elements that aren't <u>auto-populated</u> (from PowerSchool) in the Choice Ready Report.
- The Four-Year Rolling Plan which includes an assignment that walks students through an activity called Career Plans that is completed every year starting in grade 8.
  - a. Completion of the Career Plans activities would fulfill the Four-Year Rolling Plan recommended activities and provide you with a date of completion.

#### Adopting/Assigning the North Dakota Choice Ready Curriculum in RUReady.ND.gov

The RUReady.ND.gov Choice Ready curriculum must be assigned to students in grades 8-12 by an RUReady.ND.gov Professional Center user with Site Administrator level privileges.

Once assigned, students will see the curriculum when they are signed into their accounts. They will see their progress and can follow well-outlined steps that will guide them towards completion of the curriculum.

All professional users can track student completion and pull reports that provide data they can use for Choice Ready reporting.

A new **Work-based Learning (WBL)** module has been added to RUReady.ND.gov that can be part of the North Dakota Choice Ready Curriculum or used as a stand-alone curriculum. This new curriculum provides work-based learning opportunities to students.



The Four-Year Rolling Plan is required for students to graduate from high school 'Choice Ready'. This checklist is intended to serve as a guide for schools to assist students in creating their Four-Year Rolling Plan. Students create the plan prior to beginning high school starting in grade 8, then review and adjust the plan each year during high school. Each student's plan will be different, as it is intended to cater to that student's specific goals and interests. See resources below.

#### Meetings with Students

- The Four-Year Plan will be different for each student
  - Must meet with each student to review and complete
  - It does **NOT** have to be the counselor that meets with the student
    - Any staff member that is familiar with Choice Ready and is suited to discuss the student's needs can meet with the student
- Students should talk to their school counselor or principal with questions about the four-year plan, making changes, etc.

### Courses while in High School

- All required high school graduation courses
- Electives the student may have interest in
  - CTE Courses and careers they can lead to



- Dual credit courses
  - A good way to discuss with the student the purpose of each dual credit course
    - Get generals out of the way?
    - Complete a course that will be a part of the student's major?

#### Other High School Information

• Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and how they may prepare the student to be college, career, or military ready

• Standardized test scores or GPA needed to enter college or the course of study in the career field that the student is pursuing

• Scholarship opportunities that the student is interested in

### Plans for After High School

• What is the student's career goal? (Start with that!)

- What post-secondary or vocational training is required to enter that career field?
  - Colleges/universities considering?
  - What major/minor course of study?

## Plans for After High School (Cont.)

- Try to make connections between high school coursework and plans for after high school
  - CTE coursework and potential careers
    - CTE Career Clusters and Plans of Study
  - High school coursework that align with college admissions requirements
  - Purpose of dual credit courses
    - Fulfilling a student's college major?
    - Get generals out of the way?

### Plans for After High School (Cont.)

- Connections between high school coursework and post-secondary plans
  - Work-based learning opportunities while in high school and the connection to career fields the student is pursuing
  - How current employment while in high school may connect to the student's future career goals

### Plans for After High School (Cont.)

- Will be less specific than the high school portion
  - Might not list colleges courses individually
  - We have less control once they leave high school
  - Goal is to give guidance to students and help prepare them for whatever their post-secondary plans are

#### Students with Disabilities

• Make sure that the courses and future plans from the student's transition IEP align with the four-year plan

• The student's special education case-manager should collaborate with the person working with the student on his/her four-year plan

#### When should the four-year plan be completed?

Begins in middle school

- Review the plan each year
  - 8<sup>th</sup> grade= complete 9<sup>th</sup> grade plan
  - 9th grade= complete 10th grade plan
  - 10<sup>th</sup> grade= complete 11<sup>th</sup> grade plan
  - 11<sup>th</sup> grade= complete 12<sup>th</sup> grade plan



### What format does the plan need to be?

- Any format that you want
- RU Ready ND
  - Individual Career Academic Plan
  - Career Plan Builder
- Blank Template on the DPI Website



#### Does the plan need to be submitted to DPI?

• No, the plan itself does not need to be submitted to DPI

• You must document the <u>date</u> the plan was created with each individual student

### Reporting the Four-Year Rolling Plan

In Choice Ready report

• Enter the date of the student meeting each year for each student

• The only information that DPI needs is that the plan was completed
