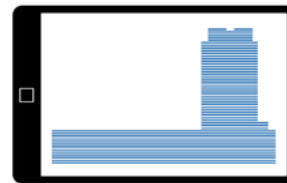

"How are the children?"

When it comes to school choice, the North Dakota Legislature has plenty of bills to choose from. Five proposals to establish education savings accounts for parents/guardians of students got hearings in House and Senate committees this week. All of these bills are mentioned in the table that's part of the Tablet, but we thought we'd create what we hope is a handy front-page summary of each one.

Generally speaking, Education Savings Accounts (ESAs) provide state funds to parents to use for their children's education expenses. They are often designed for parents who favor nonpublic school.

For the 2024-25 school year, the state aid payment to public school districts is \$11,072 per student. Gov. Kelly Armstrong's budget recommendations would raise this amount to \$11,293 per student for 2025-26, and to \$11,519 the following year. These are the base amounts; they are adjusted for each school district, based on a variety of factors that are set out in state law.

It is important to know these base per-student payment numbers because some ESA bills use them to determine the amount of money parents can get.

[HB1540](#) and [SB2303](#) would deposit an amount equal to 80 percent of the per-student payment to school districts (\$8,857 when you use this year's payment to calculate it) into an education savings account at the Bank of North Dakota, which a parent could use for nonpublic school tuition and fees, computer hardware, textbooks, and other education supplies.

[HB1590](#) says a parent may drop up to \$2,000 annually into a Bank of North Dakota "student education services account" for each of his or her children. The bank would match 50 cents of each dollar, up to \$1,000. The money could be used for education expenses, including career and technical education courses, as well as mental health assistance and "medical appointments necessary for an education benefit."

[HB1607](#) establishes "educational empowerment accounts" for parents to use in paying nonpublic school education expenses. Parents using the accounts would receive the entire per-student state aid payment to public schools (now \$11,072). They would get a debit card they could use to pay education expenses.

[SB2400](#) would provide education savings accounts for public, nonpublic and homeschooled students, which would be administered by the superintendent of public instruction or an administrator hired by her. Annual state payments into education savings accounts would vary among public school students (\$1,000), nonpublic school students (\$1,000 to \$4,000, depending on family income), and home-educated students (\$1,000).

When the Legislature has several bills that address the same subject, lawmakers typically choose one of them to shape a final package. None of these measures has received a House or Senate floor vote yet, but that will change as February rolls on.

The Legislature's website has the text of each bill (linked above) as well as access to extensive testimony, pro and con. If you choose, you can watch video of the hearings as well. These are invaluable resources for North Dakotans who want to educate themselves about this issue.
