VAMPIRE DEVICES: Save Money by Unplugging Energy Drains

Many residents are unaware of the hidden cost of “vampire devices”— electronics that continue to use energy even when turned off or in standby mode.

Devices like phone chargers, televisions, gaming consoles, and kitchen appliances can drain electricity as long as they are plugged in, slowly increasing your monthly utility bill.

According to a report from the National Resource Defense Council, Americans spend about \$19 billion per year on vampire energy costs. On average, that means about \$165 to \$440 per household depending on electricity rates and location.

To combat this, residents can take simple steps to save money:

1. Unplug devices when not in use, especially chargers and small electronics.

2. Use power strips to easily disconnect multiple devices at once.

3. Invest in smart plugs that allow you to schedule when devices are powered off.



County Unveils Sain Building Development Strategy

In October County Executive Ed Day, alongside nine members of the County Legislature and Clarkstown Supervisor George Hoehmann, announced a critical strategy to redevelop the Sain Building located at 18 New Hempstead Road, which has been vacant since 2017, into mixed-use commercial space and workforce housing.

Following the Legislature's action to declare this property surplus in November, the County's Division of Purchasing is now issuing a Request for Proposals or RFP for the redevelopment of this roughly 3.69-acre site.

“Rockland County is at a crossroads,” said County Executive Ed Day. “We’ve heard from seniors, families, business owners, and young adults about the challenges they face in finding affordable housing. This housing crisis is not just about homes—it’s about the future of our community. We must act decisively to ensure that Rockland remains a place where people can live, work, and thrive.”

This is in addition to the County's Housing Action Loan Opportunity, providing direct loans for creating or preserving workforce housing. Demand for the program has been high, with application requests totaling over \$29.7 million. The County is also launching a Countywide Housing Education Campaign to inform residents about the county's housing needs and dispel common myths about affordable housing.

2% Consecutive Tax Cut
ADOPTED FOR 2025 BUDGET

Rockland County Executive Ed Day's 2025 \$876.5 million budget was adopted by the Rockland County Legislature. Highlights of the budget include:

- A consecutive **2% reduction** in County Property Tax
- Launching a Behavioral Health Training Institute and OPWDD Navigator Program.
- \$1.3 million to the HEROES College Tuition Reimbursement Program for volunteer emergency responders.
- 21% funding increase to nonprofit contract agencies and 224 agencies.

A Message from County Executive Ed Day

The County of Rockland's new Highway Facility has been named Project of the Year by the Rockland County Chapter of the New York State Society of Professional Engineers and the New York

Metro Chapter of the American Public Works Association.

Both "Project of the Year" awards acknowledge the outstanding engineering of the facility for features including the Environmentally Sensitive Design that will lower the County's carbon footprint, the state-of-the-art repair capability, and nominal site acquisition costs.

The County's highway facility, located at 26 Scotland Hill Road, Chestnut Ridge, opened in Fall of 2023. The \$40 million - 114,500-square-foot facility, consisting of 7 buildings, is sprawled across 20 acres that was purchased for just \$1 from New York State Department of Transportation.

The facility also has a large-vehicle wash building that will increase the life expectancy of County vehicles by 20%, saving about \$190,000 a year and a shared use component during times of urgency.

The prior facility was constructed in 1935 and first flagged for needed upgrades in the 60's. But it wasn't until 2020, when the County Executive along with the Rockland County Legislature passed a bond resolution for the construction, that the new facility became reality.

- Able to store 10,000 tons of salt, doubling our current capacity.



- Generators and fuel capacity to maintain operations for two weeks without outside assistance.



- A green office building – including natural and recycled materials for construction and passive solar.

Warning Signs of Scammers

Scams are becoming increasingly common and more sophisticated as criminals target residents through phone calls, emails, texts, and social media. Criminals will pose as everything from government agencies and utility companies to even family members, all as an attempt to trick people into giving up personal information or money.



Warning signs include:

- Asking you to pay money or taxes upfront to receive a prize or a gift.
- Asking you to wire money, send cryptocurrency, send money by a payment app, a prepaid card or gift card.
- Creating a sense of urgency or emergency or reassuring you to "act now" or else the deal will go away.
- Threats of fines or arrest.

If something seems suspicious, hang up or delete the message, and report it to local authorities. Staying vigilant can help you avoid falling victim to scams and protect your hard-earned money.


