
FAMILY ELIGIBILITY



AFFORDABLE CARE

Accessible, affordable child care is necessary to support the workforce to provide economic viability for children, families, and the State of Ohio.

In a recent survey:

44% of parents say they have had to miss work, leave early, or lose focus because of challenges with child care.

49% of parents say they have cut back their work hours to care for their children.


61% of Ohio mothers with children five and younger who do not currently work full time say they would return to the workforce if they had access to high-quality, affordable child care.





CHILD CARE GOALS FOR 2026/2027 BUDGET

- 1. Children: Maintain support for children in families up to 200% of the FPL to make child care accessible and affordable.
- 2. Families: Streamline the application process to one front door through Ohio Benefits easing access.
- **3. Providers:** Streamline payments and increase to the 2024 market rate to stabilize the industry.
- 4. State: Meet federal compliance for the Child Care Development Block Grant and support families.

LEGACY JFS ABSOLUTE COMPLIANCE

The rules are very detailed and must be followed exactly to be considered compliant. Compliance is judged based on strict rule-following rather than actual results. This means providers are hyper-focused on meeting the rules which takes time, effort, and resources that could be spent on performance and quality. High- and low-performing providers are treated the same, and instead of offering guidance and technical assistance, the system enforces total compliance to the rules.

LEGACY DEW PRIMARILY TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

The rules are not overly detailed and are focused more on results rather than the process of achieving them. However, because the schools running the programs had to follow multiple state and federal requirements, they often deferred to the local boards of education. The monitoring process relied more on outside technical support.

THE DCY WAY SUBSTANTIAL COMPLIANCE

DCY will design its rules and monitoring protocol to:

- Give providers **outcome-based rules** that allow them to innovate without sacrificing the necessary guardrails to ensure children are safe.
- Make findings that identify a nexus between conditions and the *risk they pose to the health and safety of children in care*.
- **Promote reasonable and common-sense findings** based on the unique facts and circumstances identified during an inspection.
- **Direct more resources towards low-performing providers** by spending less time on high-performers, without sacrificing safety standards.



HIGH-LEVEL ROADMAP



Policy

- Rule Organization: Paragraph Levels and Legacy Rule Mapping;
 Chapter and Rule Organization.
- Stakeholder Engagement: ECE External Stakeholder Workgroups
- Rule Drafting & Reviews: Policy, Workgroup, Executive Leadership
- Forms: Rewrite and consolidate required forms.



Licensing

- **Strength-based Monitoring:** Develop a system that promotes strength of compliance determines level of reviews .
- **Field Guide:** Develop tool that promotes transparency with all stakeholders in approach to determining compliance.
- **Substantial Compliance Approach:** Record compliance based on threshold of review (many rules substantial; few rules absolute).



Training & TA

- Rule Integration Workgroups: Participate in rule integration meetings to understand policy, context, and timeline.
- **Training:** Develop or assist with the development of training materials (Examples: Webinars/Snippets).
- TA Materials: Develop learning aids.
- Ongoing TA: Develop a plan for the field to access ongoing TA.



Systems

- **Updates to OCLQS:** Facilitate and support software development lifecycle to align system to policy changes.
- External Systems: Confirm Necessary Updates to OPR.
- **Training:** Develop and Deliver Systems Training, Job Aids, etc.



- Family Child Care providers may use the following to meet the SUTQ curriculum requirement:
 - The Creative Curriculum Family Child Care, 3rd Edition
 - Any curriculum on the approved list for the age group(s) you are currently serving.
- When a state purchased curriculum is available for Family Child Care providers, there will be a separate online application.



DCY PROGRAM UPDATES







EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION GRANT



The Early Childhood Education (ECE) Grant is designed to provide high quality early learning experiences to preschoolers to enhance their learning and development prior to kindergarten entry. Participating grantee sites must be highly rated through Step Up To Quality and offer at least 12.5 hours of instruction per week.

ECE Grantees

- 546 early childhood education programs (grantees) are participating in the ECE grant.
- These grantees were awarded 29,213 slots/21,432 slots were filled through December 2024.
- 500 unfilled slots were redistributed to programs with more than 85% of their original slots filled.

Final Enrollment Survey

- Programs were asked for final enrollment numbers last week (3/21).
- Numbers will be matched to approved authorizations in Ohio Benefits.
- Final grant awards will be confirmed based on enrollment verification.

SFY 26 Eligibility

- Families not eligible for Publicly Funded Child Care, based on not having a qualifying activity, may be eligible for ECE.
 - No qualifying activity for one or both caregivers 0-200% FPL.
- Categorical eligibility includes:
 - Children on an IEP
 - Homeless
 - Foster and kinship
 - NEW Children exiting Part C (Early Intervention), not eligible for Part B (Preschool Special Education)
- NEW Eligible families 146-200% may chose between CCVP and ECE participation for their preschool child.



CHILD CARE CHOICE VOUCHER PROGRAM

The Child Care Choice Voucher Program launched April 29th and has authorized child care to families 146-200% FPL.

Grant Opportunity

- DCY launched a grant opportunity to support professional development for administrators and teachers in early care and education programs who complete at least 10 hours of training in the Science of Reading from a list of approved courses.
- Approximately \$5 million dollars have been made available through the Preschool Development Grant and CCDF Quality.



Eligibility

- Licensed and in good standing.
- Be open and serving children eligible for Publicly Funded Child Care (PFCC) and/or the Child Care Voucher Program (CCVP).
- Have a provider agreement for early care and education services (previously known as PFCC agreement) in place in Ohio Child Care Licensing and Quality System (OCLQS).



SCIENCE OF READING GRANT - TIMELINE

October

Announcement of opportunity.

November

Guidance letter get published with grant criteria, application process and link. Application window opened November 20, 2025.

January

Training must be completed by January 31, 2025, to be considered for the grant.

February

Application window closes Friday, February 14, 2025, or **until the funding as been exhausted.**

March

Final notices are completed.

April

Payments are issued.
