What is Project ECHO™

Project ECHO™ is an inter-professional practice network where education and related services professionals learn together through short, informational presentations on meeting the needs of students with complex needs, including sensory disabilities, and case-specific presentations. Case presentations allow participants to support a colleague through real-time problem solving, and the identification of possible strategies and solutions to support the individuals they serve.

"All Teach, All Learn" represents the heart of the ECHO model and means that **ALL** participants are welcomed to join the conversation, ask questions, share knowledge and experiences, and offer suggestions during each session.

ECHO Case Study Opportunity

The ECHO Hub Team, comprised of members from the statewide services and outreach team from the Ohio Deaf and Blind Education Services and the Ohio Center for Deafblind Education, invites personnel from Ohio local education agencies to bring cases involving children with complex needs and sensory disabilities to the team for review and discussion. The Hub team members serve as thought partners, engaging in problem-solving with local educators to identify strategies for supporting the child who is the subject of the case study. Each ECHO session involves a presentation by a Hub Team member, a presentation by the local team submitting the case study request that provides an overview of the child's strengths and needs, and joint problem-solving and strategy identification by all session participants. All cases are de-identified for the presentation and each presenting team receives an extensive report following the ECHO session.
