The Wildlife Department recently partnered with Oklahoma State University to learn more about the bird community using shinnery oak at Packsaddle Wildlife Management Area, and how this unique plant could be restored in southwestern Oklahoma.

A TOUGH NUT TO CRACK

For decades, researchers have been uncertain if shinnery oak acorns could germinate in anything but the perfect conditions. But this is one of the first studies that has looked at restoration opportunities with this low-growing oak and gotten acorns to germinate.

Restoration opportunities will be most limited by soil conditions and water availability.
