





American Sign Language Course

PURPOSE: This course introduces the basics of American Sign Language (ASL) and is designed for adult learners who are looking for meaningful and conversational ASL that is readily applicable to their daily routines. ASL Instructor, Virginia Maze, will offer group classes once a week. During these group sessions, the instructor will present a vocabulary lesson, information about the Deaf Community and Deaf Culture, and resources for additional practice. Participants will be able to ask questions during class and make suggestions for lesson topics. Each class builds on the previous lesson.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- To learn appropriate introductions
- To utilize proper greetings
- To acquire vocabulary
- To examine ASL grammar
- To understand appropriate interactions with individuals who are deaf or deaf-blind
- To examine the role of facial expressions and non-manual signs
