Douglas "Doug" Max Ferguson, 83, of Mount Vernon, Oregon, passed away peacefully at his home on October 19, 2025.

Doug was born on January 29, 1942, in Klamath Falls, Oregon, to Max and Irene Ferguson. His brother, Denny, joined the family in 1945. Doug was raised on the King Ranch outside Unity until the family moved to Dayville in 1955.

A proud graduate of Dayville High School, Class of 1960, Doug married his high school sweetheart, Sharon Wyllie, that same year. Together, they raised four children: Lindy, Mitch, Mollee, and Amber. The family also welcomed Brenda Randall (Woodward) into their home as a loving part of the family during her middle school years.

Doug's lifelong career in engineering and surveying began with the Oregon Department of Transportation in 1961. His professional journey spanned more than six decades and reflected his deep expertise and dedication to Oregon's communities.

His daughters, Mollee and Amber, were by his side in the office, learning from his example and dedication. The company's success was built not just on Doug's skill, but on the deep love, trust, and respect shared within his work and family circle.

Doug learned to fly while living in La Grande and bought his first Cessna in 1974. Over the years, he owned three planes and found great joy in sharing the sky with others. His love for aviation led him to serve as president of the Search and Rescue Air Team.

A lifelong outdoorsman, Doug was a passionate trapper, hunter, and guide. He led countless unforgettable sheep hunts on McClellan Mountain—a peak he admired daily from his porch on Moon Creek—as well as throughout the Steens Mountains. Never one to shy away from adventure, he even learned to scuba dive and became a licensed Scuba Diving Instructor and a rescue diver.

Doug cherished time with his children, grandchildren, and friends, sharing countless adventures in the mountains, on the water, and under the wide Northwestern sky. His stories—filled with flying, trapping, hunting, boating, and exploring—will be treasured for generations.

On June 25, 2011, Doug married Charlene, his devoted and loving wife of 14 years. Together, they enjoyed boating on the Columbia River, sharing stories, and spending time with friends. Charlene remained faithfully by Doug's side through his final days.

Doug is survived by his beloved wife, Charlene Ferguson, and the mother of their children, Sharon Ferguson; Lindy (Dwayne) Temple; Mitch (Rhonda) Ferguson; Mollee (Joey) Wood; and Amber (Francis-AKA-Buddy) Gast; ten grandchildren; twenty-five great-grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.
