

Learning Disability Annual Health Check for ages 14 and over Information for families and carers









Annual Health Checks are offered to people with learning disabilities aged 14 and over.

Annual Health Checks are completed at your GP surgery.

It is a way to ensure health issues are diagnosed and addressed.



You must be on your GP's Learning Disability

Register to have an Annual Health Check.

The GP Learning Disability register is a list of names.

It tells the GP who to invite.

You can ask at your GP surgery if you are on the



When you are 16 years old or older

You will be supported to make more of your own choices and decisions about your health plans.




The Annual Health Check reviews your health.

This should include a physical examination.

It should last for a minimum of 30 minutes.

You may see more than one professional to complete the check.



- √ Blood pressure check
- √ Weight / Height / BMI calculation
- √ Check your ears
- ✓ Ask when you saw the dentist and had an eye test.
- ✓ Discuss Sexual Health and relationships
- ✓ Review of medication this may include prescription for new medication
- √ Referrals to other services (if needed)
- √ Talk about vaccines.
- ✓ Blood tests (if needed)



If you are scared of needles, talk to the GP.

You may be offered the nasal spray flu vaccine instead of an injection.
