Selecting learning



Aims

Neglect is an ongoing priority for Hounslow's Safeguarding Children Partnership. The 2.5 hour sessions promote awareness and understanding of our neglect strategy. The strategy aims to improve how we all work with families where parental quality of care is of concern and considered inadequate. The sessions will introduce our quality of care tool, enable people across all agencies to use it in practice and ensure that it is widely used

Neglect is a Hounslow priority for improvement following audits across all agencies, and several safeguarding practice reviews. We know neglectful parenting continues to present significant challenges for all workers and agencies trying to improve the quality of life for children whose needs are not adequately met by their family. It is difficult to do this work at all levels of concern, from early prevention to child protection.

Using Ofsted ratings in our most recent audit of 12 cases; 7 required improvement 3 were inadequate and only 2 were good. All Hounslow partners have committed to change this and the course is part of that effort. The day will be led by the independent consultant who undertook our audit work. She has already worked with us to improve at an organisational level. On this course she will use her unique insight to explore how individual practitioners can better collaborate and work together to improve work with families at all levels of concern from early help/prevention, child in need and child protection.

Learning outcomes. The course provides the opportunity to:-

Gain a more sophisticated appreciation of the varied nature and presentation of neglectful parenting

Improve professional grasp of factors that might underly lack of parental care

Explore the impact of neglect on different areas of a child's care including how neglect enables other forms of harm

Consider the use of our structured judgement Quality of Care tool to assist professional assessment

Think about how to motivate parents who may be resistant to change

Think about effective plans to help parents to make lasting change

Think about direct work with children and young people to improve their lives

Consider the dilemmas often involved in decision making in cases of neglect

Parental Substance Misuse Awareness and treatment

Parental substance misuse is one of three major areas of known risk to children's health development and welfare, the others being domestic abuse and mental ill health. This course is provided to develop essential learning from the introductory level for all frontline Social Care Health, Wellbeing and Education Practitioners, anyone whose work involves safeguarding children and young people and promoting their welfare.

Aims and outcomes

Substance Misuse and Safeguarding

This session is designed to provide professionals with the capacity to support young people in an informed and holistic manner. Understanding substance misuse and abuse, the risks involved and the capacity to engage young people in open and confidential conversations about drugs are essential abilities for professionals. Given the high prevalence rates of addiction among youth today, the importance of having an understanding is crucial.

Aims and outcomes

Impact of Various Substances

Increase knowledge of drugs (including alcohol), the effects on one's health, the law and recognising indicators of substance use

Prevalence of Substance Misuse

Discuss current trends and prevalence rates

Why Drugs/Alcohol?

Develop an insight about young people's motivation for using drugs including alcohol

Two day course. Youth Mental Health First Aid

There is concern at increasing mental health problems among children and young people and particularly since Covid. Non-mental health specialists are increasingly encountering young people in need of basic mental health support. This course aims to equip the non-specialist with the knowledge and skill to provide Mental Health First Aid to young people ensuring those who need it can access appropriate help quickly. After completing the two day course you will receive a certificate saying that you are a Youth Mental Health First Aider.

Aims and outcomes

Domestic Abuse and Violence, an Introduction.

Domestic abuse and violence is a fact of life for a high proportion of children living in families where there are safeguarding or child protection concerns (45-90% of families). Abusive and violent behaviour in intimate relationships is a complex and puzzling phenomenon both from the perpetrators and survivor point of view. There are many myths and huge stigma that can get in the way of professionals being able to effectively help women; mothers to make decisions that are in their own and their children's best interests.

This course offers professionals the opportunity to explore reflect and gain insight and understanding to be able to better connect with and help women who find themselves in violent and abusive relationships.

Criminal and sexual exploitation. Safeguarding young people.

In recent years several high profile prosecutions and enquiries such as Oxford and Rotherham exposed a lack of professional understanding about these forms of child abuse. As a result we saw that the children and young people targeted by abusive adults were often left unprotected by professionals. Often the abuse of the children escalated a result of the professional failure.

Understanding has grown as a result of these cases and we are more aware of how such abuse is organised and perpetuated and various systems are in place to co-ordinate better detection of offenders and improved protection of children and young people. There have also been developments in improved ways of working with and communicating with young people. This is important because many children who are entrapped into sexual or criminal exploitation have said nobody had ever told them how to recognise risky people or situations.

Aims

Hounslow Safeguarding Children Partnership has made familial child sexual abuse a priority and is developing a strategy to improve our work in this important area of child protection. In the UK we 'miss' most children who are sexually abused. According to the Office of the Children's Commissioner we identify only 1 in 8 children at risk. We asked Hounslow professionals what they need to help them to keep children safe. They told us they need training as a starting point. This course aims to equip professionals across the children's workforce with basic knowledge about familial sexual abuse and enhance confidence in our existing communication skills with children and young people.

Aims

Hounslow SCP made familial child sexual abuse a priority in 2021 and is responding to professional requests for training by providing this and related courses on neighbouring pages in this brochure. This course is particularly important because about 40% of children who are abused sexually in their family are abused by a sibling or other close relative such as cousin nephew, niece. Harmful sexual behaviour by young people particularly in the family is challenging to our conception of what sibling relationships are like and can be complex and an emotional concern to deal with. This course aims to equip professionals with increased awareness and understanding of the nature of harmful sexual behaviour in children and young people, improve assessment and intervention and enable better support to the children and young people involved and their parents/carers.

Intra-familial child sexual abuse

This one-day training course will equip professionals across health, education, social care and policing across **Hammersmith & Fulham and Hounslow** with an understanding of:

- the scale and nature of child sexual abuse
- the challenges, myths and obstacles which can limit identification and response
- who commits intra-familial child sexual abuse
- how sexual abuse takes place in families
- understanding the child’s experience – the impact of abuse, signs and indicators of abuse and the barriers to disclosing it
- children’s disclosures and your role as a professional.

The training will support you to improve your understanding of child sexual abuse within the family environment and help you to better identify signs and indicators and respond effectively to protect children.

Traffic light tool

Online course by Brook for Hounslow

Brook's nationally recognised Sexual Behaviours Traffic Light Tool training provides a highly visible, multi-agency response that helps professionals to identify, understand and respond appropriately to sexual behaviours in young people.

The tool and accompanying training provide professionals within and across organisations with a framework for identifying whether behaviour is part of healthy development or if there is cause for concern. It will also provide guidance on when to safeguard and/or signpost to internal or external support.

The training equips professionals to make consistent and informed decisions that neither pathologises nor criminalises young people. Participants will be trained to have robust and meaningful conversations around harmful sexual behaviour that causes concern and will be equipped to embed the tool within their practice.

Learning outcomes: by the end of the training participants will be able to

- Explain parts of the law which refer to sexual behaviour
- Know how our values relating to sexuality affect decision making
- Rate different scenarios as green, amber or red
- Use an action plan; created in the training, to support the integration of the toolkit into internal training

Pornography and Youth Produced Sexual Imagery

Online course by Brook for Hounslow

Brook is a UK based charity offering a wide variety of sexual health services to young people mainly under 25. They are experts in their field.

There is growing concern about the influence that freely available online pornography may have on the development of children and young people and on their relationships. The aim of these learning sessions with Brook is to enable participants to gain knowledge and skills about the influences and pressures young people face as they develop and explore their emerging sexuality.

The course aims to:-

- Overview the research and laws covering pornography and young people.
- Consider the impact of pornography on young people.
- Consider how to talk to young people about Pornography
- Overview the research and Laws surrounding Youth Produced Sexual Imagery
- Consider the impact of Youth Produced Sexual Imagery (YPSI) and Image Based Sexual Abuse (IBSA) on young people
- Consider how to talk to young people about YPSI and IBSA

Sessions are open to any Hounslow professionals working with children and young people.
