Language and Communication skills: Blackpool Better Start

Through a "no wrong door" policy, Blackpool Better Starts aims to identify speech, language and communication needs (SLC) in children early and support parents and carers to address these by accessing the services they need. Training is provided for all health visitors to use the WellComm Assessment, a speech and language toolkit for screening and intervention in the early years. All children in Blackpool are now offered screening at 9 – 12 months, 24 months and 36 month checks. Children with SLC needs are now being identified and referred for support earlier, which has increased referrals to NHS speech therapy services.

CALL FOR EXAMPLES

During the SEND and Alternative Provision Green Paper consultation period, the Council for Disabled Children (CDC) led a number of face-to-face workshops and virtual events with parent and carers, health, social care, education and the voluntary and community sector to understand their views on the reforms.

Anecdotal feedback suggests that in some cases, there are already positive examples of the reforms taking place across the country to improve outcomes for children and young people but that these are not widely known.

In their role as Strategic Reform partner to the DfE, the Council for Disabled Children, are putting out a call for examples in relation to the following 4 themes:

- 1) Example of good joint working between education, health and care
- 2) Example of strong early intervention including good wraparound support from health and care for pupils on SEN support
- 3) Example of effective management of the EHCP process, leading to high quality EHC plans and improved outcomes for children and families
- 4) Example of effective preparation for adulthood including progression in HE/FE/employment
- 5) Example of inclusive education

Family and its protective effect: Part 1 of the Independent Family Review – Children's Commissioner

The first part of the <u>Independent Family Review</u>, published by the children's commissioner, Dame Rachel de Souza, warns that young people who experience domestic violence between parents at age three are likely to showcase 30 per cent more anti-social behaviour than average by age 14.

The report describes how domestic abuse can also destabilise a young person's life, often forcing them to move home frequently for their safety, disrupting their <u>education</u> and friendships.

de Souza focuses on the "protective effect" of the family and uses the report to highlight the realities of modern family life, urging government to put parents and children at the centre of policy-making.
