Naval Families Federation (NFF)

We say a fond farewell to Rebecca Lovell, who has been the PMK representative from NFF for the last 3 years, she is remaining with NFF, but has a new role. We welcome Jennie Laidler, who is a Family Advocate for NFF, she has 2 school aged children, and her husband serves in the RN, and she is a Veteran. Jennie has a keen understanding of Service life and is passionate about SPP pupils and their schools. To help schools and trusts to better understand the educational related challenges that Service children may face, and to help them thrive in education, the National Governance Association (NGA) has issued new guidance for school governing boards and trustees. The NGA created this guidance in collaboration with the Ministry of Defence – who provide statutory guidance for schools on the Armed Forces Covenant Duty – and the Service Children's Progression (SCiP) Alliance.

The guidance:

- Outlines the education-related disadvantages that can arise for Service children and the potential impact of parental deployment, separation, and family mobility.
- Explains the role of governing boards in allocating school funding to meet the needs of Service children and has questions for boards to ask and consider. · Explores how the SCiP Alliance's Thriving Lives Toolkit can be used as a self-assessment tool by schools to monitor and improve their practice and support for Service children.
- References the Armed Forces Covenant Duty, and which education functions of a school are in scope.

Wrap around Childcare (WAC)

Many of you will be aware of the WAC which offers funding for ages 4-11 to help fund before and after school clubs. This has now been integrated to JPA – which is accessed by the Serving Person. Should any parents have any questions on how to claim for the WAC, please ensure they aware of this.
