Case Studies

The table above shows the amount of budget allocated under each priority:

- The Whiston Worrygoose Breakfast Club is an example of a project supporting support new & existing groups and working with local schools & Community Associations
- The removal of the MUGA from Greystones Road is an example of a project from working with partners to explore the possible removal of the MUGA from Greystones Road to an alternative site and/or to develop extra youth provision
- The contribution towards the fencing on Middlefield Drive is an example of working with partners to address social isolation and loneliness, especially amongst those aged 65+ years

The largest amount of budget was allocated to the priority concerned with working with partners to explore the possible removal of the MUGA from Greystones Road to an alternative site and/or to develop extra youth provision.

Removal of Greystones Road MUGA and the implementation of a children's cycle route

During 2019 Sitwell ward Councillors received numerous complaints relating to the multi-use games area (MUGA) on Greystones Road. There were reports of antisocial behaviour (ASB), noise, litter and the constant slamming of the gates there, and this was causing distress to the houses that overlook the MUGA. Along with officers from RMBC, ward councillors conducted door knocks around the area to establish residents' thoughts around the MUGA and if it was to be replaced, what they would like to see the space used for. The results of the consultation indicated that the MUGA wasn't being used for its intended purpose and there was a lack of children's facilities nearby. With this in mind and also not wanting to create another asset which would encourage group gatherings and noise, it was decided to remove the MUGA and implement a children's flat cycle route in its place where young children can learn to ride their bikes.

This project was completed in March 2020 and there has been a significant decrease in any ASB reports in the area where the MUGA once was. The children's cycle route is used daily and enjoyed by families and young children in the area.
