




Top tips for climate action from Kingsham Primary School

Kingsham Primary School's climate action journey with the West Sussex Wastebusters Programme

Kingsham Primary School has excelled in the [West Sussex Wastebusters Programme](#) and Planet Protector Challenge, earning the Ambassador Award for their outstanding efforts. Here are their top tips for schools looking to achieve success in climate action and sustainability:

1. Start small – let it grow naturally

- You don't need to do everything at once. Begin with one or two manageable projects and build from there.
- Children's enthusiasm will drive initiatives forward – listen to their ideas and let them take ownership.

2. Involve the whole school community

- Encourage everyone to participate, from staff and pupils to parents and local businesses.
- Set up a recycling station at the front of the school so families can contribute.
- Use school communications like newsletters, blogs, or social media to spread awareness.

3. Empower pupils – let them lead the way

- Form a student-led eco-team (ours is called the Green Gang) to steer sustainability efforts and lead projects. Ideally 2 pupils per class.
- Allow children to choose their roles – some may prefer public speaking, while others might excel in creative tasks like making posters.
- Let pupils vote for eco-leaders – at Kingsham, older children give speeches, or picture drawing or any reason they would like to join, to apply for roles in the Green Gang.

4. Embed sustainability into school culture

- Reinforce sustainable habits in daily routines – for example, Kingsham pupils take turns monitoring energy use in classrooms.
- Use visual reminders, such as posters and stickers to encourage responsible actions (e.g: "Switch Off!" for lights and appliances).



- Get pupils involved in hands-on learning – Kingsham has an allotment, where students grow their own food using collected rainwater.

5. Use Wastebusters' Eco-Savings Account to track impact

- Monitor energy, waste, and water savings automatically with the Eco-Savings Account in the Wastebusters platform.
- Use the tracking tool to show pupils and staff the real-world impact of their actions, keeping motivation high.

6. Make sustainability fun and rewarding

- Host toy swaps, tombolas, and upcycling activities to raise funds and promote reuse.
- Use incentives like book vouchers, recycling rewards, and certificates to encourage participation.
- Kingsham doubled their recycling rewards (£230) by reaching Ambassador School status!

7. Connect to other school priorities and curriculum

- Link Planet Protector Challenge missions with Eco-Schools, Living Streets travel schemes, and other sustainability initiatives.
- Tie sustainability to the core curriculum – for example, using maths to calculate energy savings or English to write persuasive eco-campaigns.

8. Take advantage of free resources and support

- Use the Climate Action Planning Tool to automate and tailor your school's sustainability plan.
- Get free signage, posters, and stickers from the Planet Protector Challenge pack.
- Invite West Sussex County Council/Wastebusters to deliver a 'Recycle It Right' assembly – Kingsham's pupils found it incredibly engaging! Contact info@wastebuster.co.uk to book your assembly today!

9. Celebrate success and keep momentum going

- Track achievements using the Planet Protector Leaderboard to encourage friendly competition.
- Regularly highlight successes – share updates in school assemblies, newsletters, and online.
- Keep it fresh by introducing new challenges, like Kingsham's recent focus on biodiversity and sustainable transport.

10. Adapt and find creative workarounds

- Not every idea will be feasible, but modifying and scaling projects is always possible.
- Kingsham adapted their apple surplus by making pies instead of pressing juice, reducing waste and raising money.
- If a project seems too ambitious, start small and see how it can evolve over time.
