ARTICLE: 60 Junior ROTC Instructors Accused of Sexual Misconduct in Past Five Years, Investigation Finds

SYNOPSIS: Sixty instructors in the Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps have been accused of sexual misconduct against high school cadets in the last five years. Accusations against 58 of these instructors were substantiated by local law enforcement or school officials, according to the report from the House Oversight Committee's majority staff.

VIDEO: Four Soldiers in Alaska Died By Suicide in One Month Despite Surge in Mental Health Help

SYNOPSIS: In May, the Army sent more than 40 counselors and chaplains to Alaska after reports that Soldiers with suicidal issues had waited weeks for appointments with mental health providers. In 2021,

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17 Soldiers died by suicide, including eight over four months as winter descended on the state, daylight shortened and despair deepened.
