In March 2024, the Defense Department's Military Personnel Drug Abuse Testing Program raised the codeine cutoff rate from 2,000 to 4,000 nanograms per milliliter to mitigate false positive results for military service members. Families across the country have been increasingly struggling with the soaring cost of child care and monthslong waitlists after more than 100,000 workers left the industry and more than 16,000 child care centers permanently closed during the pandemic.

ARTICLE: Columnist: We Broke Our Promise to Take Care of Gold Star Families

SYNOPSIS: Current law on military spouse survivor benefits does not adequately provide for survivors who remarry or represent the societal norms of today. According to longtime policy, if a Gold Star or surviving spouse remarries before age 55, they will lose their survivor's benefits—including the Survivor Benefit Plan, Dependency and Indemnity Compensation payments, Tricare health coverage and access to VA home loans. The policy was designed in an era when women did not have careers and relied solely on their husbands for financial sustenance. The Love Lives On Act, introduced in 2022, would rectify this huge economic loss for surviving military spouses by allowing them to keep some benefits upon remarriage, regardless of their age.

ARTICLE: 'Gambling Addiction on Steroids': Fears of Betting Crisis at Heart of US Military

SYNOPSIS: While problems such as substance abuse and sexual harassment have been widely acknowledged and addressed in the U.S. military, the issue of problematic gambling has taken more of a back seat. Indeed, it's only since 2019 that the Defense Department has mandated annual screenings for gambling disorder as part of service members' general health assessment, along with doing random spot surveys of active-duty Soldiers. Yet this widespread problem within the military services can be traced back decades.

SYNOPSIS: A reward has been set for information that leads to the arrest and conviction of the individual behind the murder of Pfc. Katia Duenas-Aguilar. She was found dead May 18 in her off-base residence just outside of the installation in Clarksville, Tennessee. The Soldier's mother, Carmen Aguilar, and the League of United Latin American Citizens are offering the \$55,000 reward.

SYNOPSIS: The Army inspector general's noncommissioned officer of the year for 2019 is facing a general court-martial on charges related to sex crimes, according to court documents. Master Sgt. Christopher Dehn is set to be arraigned June 5 at Joint Base Lewis-McChord in Washington state on four counts of sexual assault, two counts of sexual harassment, and other charges related to obstructing justice and failure to obey orders and regulations.
