



Storm Warning

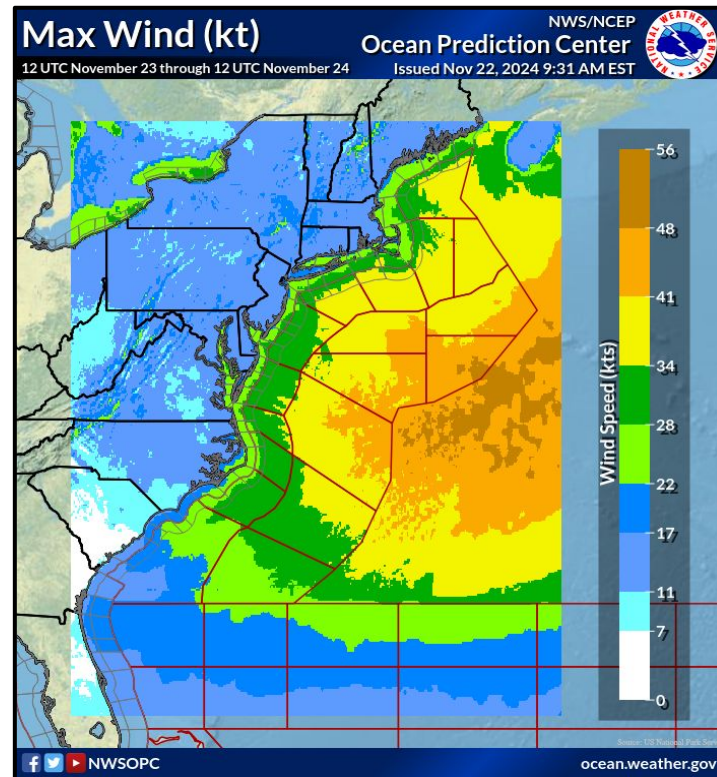
Saturday and Saturday Night (11/23 and early 11/24)

November 22, 2024
1515 UTC

CALL TO ACTION: Vessels planning to be in the area should execute avoidance plans.

KEY MESSAGES:

- Strong, broad low pressure will be centered near the eastern Gulf of Maine and Georges Bank early Saturday. Areas of gale-force conditions from about 31N to 33N between 74W and 77W by early this afternoon will gradually spread north and east later this afternoon and early tonight.
- Late tonight, widespread strong gales will be located toward Georges Bank, and offshore off the Delmarva peninsula and North Carolina.
- Early Saturday morning, an area of storm-force conditions will develop from about 34.5N to 37.5N between 66W and 70.5W.
- As gales then spread north offshore of the New England coast and into the Gulf of Maine, from Saturday afternoon through Saturday night, mariners can expect continued areas of storm-force sustained winds from about 34.5N to 39.5N east of 70W. Some wind gusts will be just shy of hurricane force.
- While any storm-force winds should move well out into the north Atlantic by Sunday morning, widespread gales will persist Sunday from offshore of the mid-Atlantic coast north.
- The west edge of gales will gradually shift east Sunday afternoon and Sunday night, pushing well out into the north Atlantic early Monday.

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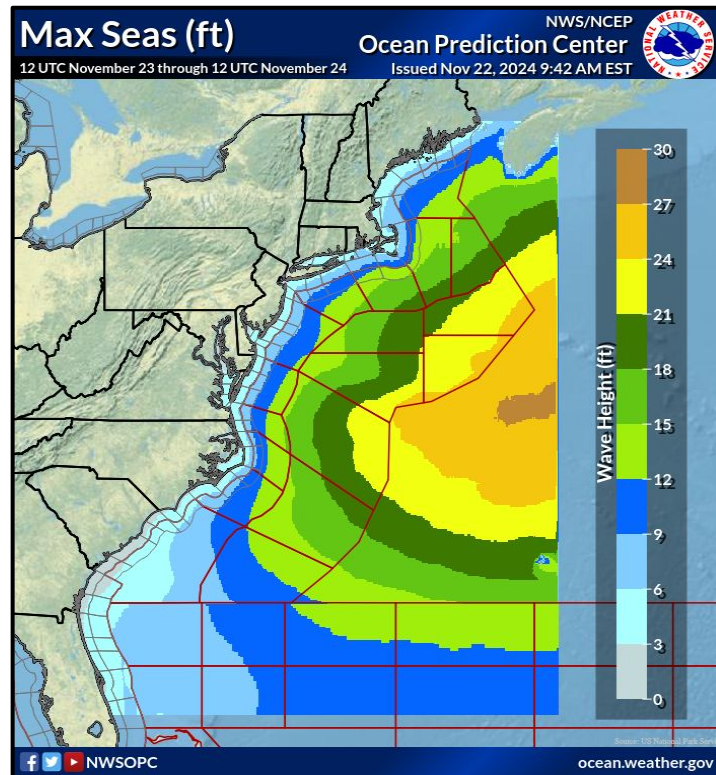

CALL TO ACTION: Vessels planning to be in the area should execute avoidance plans.

KEY MESSAGES:

- By late tonight, 12-foot and greater seas will be widespread south of 40N, with widespread seas around 20 feet from about 33.5N to 38.5N east of 72.5W.
- By Saturday afternoon, seas will be 25 to near 30 feet in the area of storm-force winds.
- By early Sunday morning, with widespread 12-foot and greater seas east of about 73W, seas of 25 to near 30 feet will be from about 36N to 40.5N east of 67W.
- The west edge of 12-foot and greater seas will only slowly shift east Sunday and Sunday night, finally pushing well out into the north Atlantic by Monday night.
- Winds and seas will be higher in and near any heavier showers or thunderstorms.
- Mariners planning any voyages should be prepared for a long-duration period of high winds and seas off of much of the U.S. east coast.
- Keep abreast of the latest in the tropics and high seas marine weather information at hurricanes.gov and ocean.weather.gov. The next briefing will be an update Saturday, November 23 by noon EST, or 1700 UTC.
