Significant Activity – Oct 6-7



Significant Events: Hurricane Matthew

Tropical Activity:

- Atlantic Hurricane Matthew (Category 3); Tropical Storm Nicole; Disturbance 1 Low (near 0%)
- Eastern Pacific Tropical cyclone activity not expected during next 48 hours
- Central Pacific Disturbance 1 Low (20%)
- Western Pacific No tropical cyclone activity affecting U.S. interests

Significant Weather:

- Flash Flooding Southern/Central Plains and Middle Mississippi Valley
- Severe Thunderstorms Southern/Central Plains and Middle Mississippi Valley
- Rain and Snow Northern Intermountain, Rockies and Plains
- Critical Fire Weather CA
- Red Flag Warnings CA
- Space weather Past 24 hours none; next 24 hours none

Earthquake Activity: No significant activity

Emergency Declaration Request for Florida

Hurricane Matthew – State/Local Preparations



Florida:

- EOC: Full Activation / State of Emergency declared / Emergency Declaration requested
- Evacuations: Mandatory 2 Counties; Voluntary 4 Counties
- Shelters: 46 open with 3,015 occupants (ARC as of 6:12 a.m. EDT)
- 185 National Guard activated
- Significant higher traffic volume noted in west & northbound highways (DOT)

Georgia:

- EOC: Full Activation
- Evacuations: Mandatory City of Tybee Island (pop. 3,082); Voluntary 6 Counties
- Shelters: 6 open with 27 occupants (ARC as of 6:12 a.m. EDT)

South Carolina:

- EOC: Full Activation / State of Emergency declared /Emergency Declaration requested
- Evacuations: Mandatory Coastal communities (estimated pop. 1.5 million)
- Mandatory Medical evacuations in effect for 9 counties (most facilities hardened & requesting evacuation waivers)
- Shelters: 95 on standby; 32 open with 624 occupants (ARC as of 6:12 a.m. EDT)

North Carolina:

- EOC: Partial Activation / State of Emergency declared / Emergency Declaration requested
- Activated & pre-deployed Urban Search & Rescue/Swift Water Rescue Teams
- Coordination for EMS Ambulance Strike teams and EMS medical EVAC buses started
- Evacuations: Mandatory Cape Lookout National Seashore; Ocrakoke Island suspended mandatory evacuations
- Shelters: Identified and placed on standby
- 247 National Guard activated



- RRCC: Level II (dayshift only) / RWC: Enhanced Watch
- IMAT to VA (Hurricane Matthew)
- LNO deployed to Ft Bragg, NC (ISB) & VA SEOC
- Hurricane Liaison member deployed to National Hurricane Center
- Region III expected to demobilize today

Hurricane Matthew




Hurricane Matthew (CAT 3) (Advisory #33A as of 8:00 a.m. EDT)

- Located 215 miles SE of West Palm Beach, FL; moving NW at 12 mph
 - Expected near E coast of FL tomorrow night
- Maximum sustained winds 125 mph; Hurricane-Force Winds extend 40 miles; Tropical-Storm-Force winds extend 160 miles
- Strengthening expected today; forecast to be a CAT 4 as it approaches FL
- Hurricane Warnings from Golden Beach, FL to Altamaha, GA
- Hurricane Watch from Altamaha, GA to South Santee River, SC
- Tropical Storm Warning for much of the southern tip of FL

Hazards Affecting Land


- Combination of dangerous storm surge and tide will cause normally dry areas near the coast to be flooded
- Danger of life-threatening inundation during the next 36 hours along FL east coast from Deerfield Beach to Altamaha Sound
- Powerful swells causing life-threatening surf and rip current conditions expected for FL east coast



Rainfall Forecast – Day 1-3



- Matthew expected to produce total rainfall of 4 to 8 inches with isolated amounts up to 12 inches along coastal eastern FL, mainly today and Friday
- Heavy rain is expected to move north into coastal GA and SC, possibly NC, Friday into the weekend
- SC currently the most vulnerable for freshwater flooding due to the recent heavy rain event



Tropical Outlook – Atlantic


<u>Tropical Storm Nicole:</u> (Advisory 8, as of 5:00 a.m. EDT)

- Located about 400 miles S of Bermuda
- Moving NW at 9 mph; maximum sustained winds near 70 mph
- · Little change in strength during the next 48 hours
- Tropical storm force winds extend outward up to 70 miles
- · No threat to US territories at this time

Disturbance 1: (as of 8:00 a.m. EDT)


- Located several hundred miles E of Lesser Antilles
- Moving W through the Caribbean Sea
- · Development is expected to be slow
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Low (near 0%)
- Formation chance through 5 days: Low (10%)





Tropical Outlook – Eastern Pacific






Tropical Outlook – Central Pacific




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
- Located about 1,130 miles ESE of the Big Island of HI



Severe Weather Outlook – Days 1-3









Precipitation Forecast – Days 1-3








Florida
