Significant Activity – May 18-19



Significant Events: Severe Weather – Central U.S.

Significant Weather:

- Severe thunderstorms possible Southern Plains to Ohio and Tennessee valleys
- Flash flooding possible Southern Plains to Middle Mississippi Valley
- Rain and thunderstorms Northern Intermountain to Northern Rockies; Plains to Mid-Atlantic; Southeast; Northeast
- Rain and snow Southern Rockies to Northern Plains
- Red Flag Warnings NM
- Elevated Fire Weather NM & TX
- Space Weather:
 - Past 24 hours: None observed
 - Next 24 hours: Minor with G1 geomagnetic storms predicted

Tropical Activity: No activity affecting U.S. interests

Earthquake Activity: No significant activity

Declaration Activity:

- Major Disaster Declaration approved Idaho
- Amendment No. 1 to FEMA-4308-DR-CA





Situation

- On May 16 severe thunderstorms with tornadoes, large hail and high winds stretched from the Southern Plains to the Great Lakes
- ENHANCED risk of severe weather continues today across parts of Southern and Central Plains

Impacts

- Oklahoma
 - Approx. 70 homes damaged or destroyed
 - One confirmed fatality; multiple injuries
 - Minimal power outages
- Wisconsin
 - Approx. 50 homes damaged or destroyed
 - One confirmed fatality; 25 injuries
 - Minimal power outages
- Kansas
 - No fatalities; 2 injuries
 - Downed trees and power lines across several counties
 - Minimal power outages
- Michigan
 - 14.5k customers without power (As of 7:30 am EDT. Customer outage data is provided by the Department of Energy's EAGLE-I system. Comprehensive National coverage of all electrical service providers is not available.)

State/Local Response


- WI EOC returned to Normal Operations
 - Governor declared State of Emergency for 3 counties
- OK EOC at Monitoring (severe weather)
- KS EOC at Partial Activation (severe weather)
- · Damage assessments ongoing
- Shelters (ARC Midnight Shelter Count 5:21 a.m. EDT):
 - AR 1 shelter open with 28 occupants
 - WI 2 shelters open with 2 occupants
 - KS 1 shelter open with no occupants


FEMA Response

- Region IV RWC returned to Watch/Steady State
- Region V RWC remains at Watch/Steady State
- Region VI RWC at Enhanced Watch (day shift only)
 - LNO deployed to OK EOC
- Region VII RWC at Enhanced Watch (day shift only)
 - 2 LNOs deployed to KS EOC
- NWC at Enhanced Watch (24/7)
- ISB Team on Alert
- US&R coordinating contingency plans in preparation for a possible assistance request
- No additional requests for FEMA assistance




Severe Weather Outlook – Days 1-3






Precipitation Forecast / Flash Flood Risk









Significant River Flood Outlook






Hazards Outlook – May 21-25





U.S. Drought Monitor








FEMA-4313-DR-ID

 - Hazard Mitigation statewide
