Significant Activity – August 4-5



Significant Events: No significant activity

Tropical Activity:

- Atlantic Disturbance 1 Medium (40%); Disturbance 2 Low (30%)
- Eastern Pacific Tropical Depression Eleven-E
- Central Pacific No tropical cyclones expected next 48 hours
- Western Pacific No activity affecting U.S. interests

Significant Weather:

- Severe Thunderstorms Central Plains and Middle Mississippi Valley
- Flash Flooding Central Plains and Middle Mississippi Valley
- Elevated Fire Weather ID, UT, and WY
- Isolated Dry Thunderstorms CA, OR, and NV
- Space weather:
 - Past 24 hours: None observed
 - Next 24 hours: Minor; geomagnetic storms reaching G1 level likely

Earthquake Activity: No significant activity

Declaration Activity: None

Tropical Outlook – Atlantic

Disturbance 1 (as of 8:00 a.m. EDT)

- Extending from the Cabo Verde Islands SW across the tropical Atlantic
- Forecast to move WNW at 15 mph
- Tropical depression could form early next week
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Medium (40%)
- Formation chance through 5 days: High (70%)

Disturbance 2 (as of 8:00 a.m. EDT)

- Located over central Caribbean Sea
- Moving WNW at 10-15 mph
- Conditions could become more favorable for tropical cyclone formation early next week
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Low (30%)
- Formation chance through 5 days: Medium (50%)

Current forecast indicates no threats to the U.S.







Tropical Outlook – Eastern Pacific



<u>Tropical Depression Eleven-E</u> (Advisory #4 as of 8:00 a.m. EDT)

- Located 40 miles NW of Socorro Island, Mexico
- Moving NW at 9 mph; maximum sustained winds at 35 mph
- Forecast to become a remnant low later today

Current forecast indicates no threats to the U.S.












National Weather Forecast








Severe Weather Outlook – Days 1-3









Precipitation Forecast













Hazards Outlook – Aug 7-11







