Significant Activity – June 7-8



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Significant Events:

- Flooding – Central U.S.

Tropical Activity:

- Atlantic: No activity affecting U.S. interests
- Eastern Pacific: No significant activity affecting U.S. interests
- Central Pacific: No significant activity affecting U.S. interests
- Western Pacific: No significant activity affecting U.S. interests

Significant Weather:

- Heavy rain and flash flooding possible – Southeast to Southern Appalachian Range
- Severe thunderstorms and flash flooding possible – Portions of the Central and Northern Plains

Declaration Activity:

- Major Disaster Declaration approved – FEMA-4440-DR-South Dakota

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Flooding – Central U.S.

Situation:

Major flood levels expected to continue across the Midwest and Gulf Coast regions for weeks; the Mississippi River is slowly rising and will crest next week. Recent heavy rainfall caused quick rises to rivers in southeast TX, AR, and LA, but significant additional rain is not expected in the Middle Mississippi and Arkansas River Basin areas over the weekend.

Lifeline Impacts:

Safety and Security

- Levee breaches/overtopping: IL, IA, MO, AR, OK, and LA
- LA: Morganza Control Structure opening delayed indefinitely

Food, Water & Sheltering:

- 25 (+1) shelters open / 348 (-49) occupants (*ARC Shelter report June 8*)
 - OH: 3 / 73 (-4)
 - AR: 7 (-1) / 145 (+3)
 - TX: 2 / 0
 - OK: 3 / 58 (-11)
 - LA: 1 / 5 (-11)
 - MO: 9 / 67 (-49)
- Mandatory & voluntary evacuations: IL, OK, KS, MO, AR, & OH
- AR: 27 wastewater treatment plants impacted; 3 inoperable, 2 threatened, 22 operable

Health & Medical

- Fatalities / Injuries:
 - OH: 1 / 7
 - AR: 1 / 0
 - KS: 3 / 56
 - OK: 6 / numerous
 - LA: 1 / 5
 - MO: 9 / 20

Transportation

- USCG closed portions of the Mississippi, Arkansas and Illinois Rivers
- Amtrak, Union Pacific and BNSF services suspended in some impacted areas; Freight cargo is being rerouted

Response:

State/Local

- Full Activation: KS and AR EOCs
- Partial Activation: OH and IL EOCs
- Monitoring: MO, LA, and OK EOCs
- National Guard activated: IL, IA, MO, KS, OK, and AR



 - IMAT: Deployed (supporting EM-3412-KS)

FEMA Headquarters

- NWC: Steady State, monitoring 24/7
- MERs: MEOV at OK EOC; 8 MCOVs in 5 OK counties




Lower Mississippi Flood Forecast



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



Declaration Approved



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FEMA-4440-DR-SD

- The President approved a Major Disaster Declaration June 7, 2019
- For severe winter storm, snowstorm and flooding from March 13 to April 26, 2019
- Provides:
 - Individual Assistance and Public Assistance for 12 counties, including Rosebud, Pine Ridge, and Cheyenne River Sioux Reservations
 - Public Assistance only for 58 counties, including Rosebud, Lake Traverse, and Cheyenne River Sioux Reservations
 - Hazard Mitigation statewide
- FCO is James R. Stephenson

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
