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Message from the Higher Education Program Manager

Dear Emergency Management Higher Education Academics & Friends,

A lot can happen in two weeks! Like many of you, the Higher Education Program (HiEd) team is now working full time from home. We are getting familiar with virtual tools to stay connected and productive. With all training at the National Emergency Training Center (NETC) suspended until May 10th we have determined that we need to move the Annual Emergency Management Higher Education Symposium to a virtual space to accommodate the rescheduling of critical training needs. HiEd is looking at this as a challenge to create successful virtual connections and an opportunity to allow our content to be shared more broadly.

HiEd will be working with the Symposium Planning Special Interest Group (SIG) to discern possible options. We understand that many of you blocked the time on your calendar and we want to take advantage of that if we can. We also realize that our community resides in multiple time zones. We are working to explore various courses of action to convene our community and share the outstanding submissions and work underway in the discipline. HiEd will provide updates and information in this newsletter and on our website. In our last newsletter, I shared that the 45th American Education Research Association (AERA) annual meeting had moved to a free virtual engagement. Since that posting, the AERA annual meeting has been cancelled. This is the first time the AERA meeting has been cancelled since World War II. The Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL) focus group has pivoted again to make the most of their time and will be sharing the outcome of their work virtually at our symposium.

I also reported in our last newsletter that the FEMA Region IX wildland urban interface academic collaboration event scheduled for April 22nd would be held virtually. Last week the decision was made to postpone as many practitioners were no longer able to attend. The planning committee is continuing to meet



to discuss options including a potential op-ed piece on the impact of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in relation to the wildfire threat.

Over the years, I have heard from faculty and students alike that there is a largely untapped workforce in emergency management academic programs across our nation. We continue to work with the Jobs & Internship SIG and others at FEMA to create strong pathways to emergency management careers. With this unprecedented global emergency, numerous organizations have positions available, whether volunteer or paid, for emergency management students and recent graduates, and this is expected to increase. The International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM) has updated their jobseekers board to make it easier for potential employers to find interested applicants like you. They strongly encourage you to upload your resume and qualifications to the IAEM jobs board at jobs.iaem.com. A Slack group has also been created where students and recent grads can network, get feedback on resumes, receive interview tips, and share job opportunities with each other. As the COVID-19 pandemic continues, they will explore additional trainings through Slack to assist you in your efforts to be a part of the emergency management community. FEMA has expanded capabilities for the <u>**Resilience Analysis and Planning Tool</u> (RAPT**). These capabilities include census tract data and additional infrastructure layers for all state, local, tribal and territorial jurisdictions across the nation. This update to the tool enables a better analysis of community resilience indicators. It also allows users to calculate the population of individuals with specific indicator characteristics in selected census tracts. It can be used to inform strategies for preparedness, response and recovery activities related to the coronavirus pandemic and other disasters.</u></u>

The free Geographic Information System web map tool allows users to combine layers of community resilience indicators, infrastructure locations and hazard data to visualize, prioritize and implement strategies to impact resilience, response and recovery. The updated tool also provides important census-tract level demographic information and infrastructure locations related to coronavirus pandemic planning and response efforts. This includes the location and size of infrastructure entities such as hospitals, nursing homes, urgent care facilities, public health departments, and pharmacies; population count and demographics of individuals within a containment zone (e.g. over age 65, disability, education); and visualization tools.



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Beginning Thursday, April 2, FEMA will hold a series of one-hour training webinars to provide additional background on the tool, demonstrate multiple capabilities and answer questions from users.
