NOAA Releases 2023 Atlantic Hurricane Season Outlook Last week, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) forecasters predicted nearnormal hurricane activity in the Atlantic this year. The season runs from June 1 to Nov. 30. It is expected to be less active than recent years, due to competing factors — some that suppress storm development and some that fuel it — driving this year's overall forecast for a near-normal season. NOAA is forecasting a range of 12 to 17 total named storms (named storms are those with winds of 39 mph or higher). Of those, 5 to 9 could become hurricanes (winds of 74 mph or higher), including 1 to 4 major hurricanes (cat 3, 4 or 5; with winds of 111 mph or higher). NOAA's outlook is for overall seasonal activity and is not a landfall forecast. In addition to the Atlantic seasonal outlook, NOAA also issues seasonal hurricane outlooks for the eastern Pacific and central Pacific hurricane basins. NOAA's Climate Prediction Center will update the 2023 Atlantic seasonal outlook in early August, just prior to the historical peak of the season.

- Not much tarping has been done; flooding hampering recovery efforts.

THE SALVATION ARMY | The Salvation Army Eastern Territory

• Feeding started May 30th; capacity will be increased as as they replace items and supplies that were lost during the storm.

AMERICAN RED CROSS | ARC | Help Those Affected by Disasters

- Providing assistance with four PODs and supporting three congregate shelters.
- Providing 1,200 meals per day and delivering emergency relief supplies to about 3000 households.
- Working alongside village mayors to provide the following emergency assistance: tarps, flashlights, coolers, clean-up kits.
- Working to launch financial support for survivors by June 10th.
- Expect to complete 85% of disaster assessments June 7th.

TEAM RUBICON | Team Rubicon | Built To Serve (teamrubiconusa.org)

 A recon team met with mayors and fire officials across three different villages: Inajaran, Umatac, and Agat. Unmet needs within those villages appear to be saw work and tarping. The team has connected with the chair of Hawaii VOAD, The Salvation Army, and Send Relief.







Region 4 (AL, FL, GA, KY, MS, NC, SC, TN)

DR-4709-FL:

• State and local governments, community, and volunteer organizations, including houses of worship, affected by the April 12-14 severe storms, tornadoes and flooding in Broward County have until June 9, 2023, to submit their requests to the state for FEMA Public Assistance funding.

DR-4701-TN:

• FEMA is seeking Tennessee residents to fill a growing list of temporary positions to assist with recovery from the March 31 to April 1, 2023, storms and tornadoes. Current jobs are based in Nashville. Click here for details and how to apply.

Region 6 (LA, OK, AR, NM)

DR-4611-LA:

- VALs have assisted applicants receive \$3,037,731.26 (NC) in additional IHP funding through case review and appeals
- VALs have received 2663 (+14) referrals; 2522 (+1) of those cases are closed and 141 (+13) are open
- VALs have received 3589 (+26) Duplication of Benefits requests from disaster case management agencies and have completed 3569 (+25) to date.
- Voluntary agencies report 975 (NC) Homes have been repaired/rebuilt and 328(+2) homes are pending home repairs/rebuilding.

- Arkansans who have applied for FEMA disaster assistance must let FEMA know about any insurance settlements or denials you received. FEMA's Individual Assistance program may cover damage that your insurance does not. However, by law, FEMA cannot provide funding to individuals or households for losses covered by insurance or other source.
- As of 5/31/2023, SBA has approved 285 loans approved for more than \$17.6 million. Survivors can contact an SBA Customer Service Representative via email at disastercustomerservice@sba.gov or by phone at 800-659-2955 for help applying. The deadlines to apply for physical damage is 7/3/2023 and economic injury is 2/2/2024.
- VALs have received 21 referrals; 14 referred to non-profits for help with immediate and unmet needs; 7 still open.
- As of 5/31/2023, there is a population of 315 residing in declared non-congregate shelters, per American Red Cross.
- Four FEMA VALs deployed and continue to provide technical assistance and support to Arkansas State VAL, Arkansas VOAD partners, and local organizations to identify unmet needs and coordinate resources for long-term recovery.

DR-4652-NM:

- The Hermit's Peak/Calf Canyon Claims Office has partnered with the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to offer landowners the opportunity to request a NRCS Conservation Restoration Plan for their property, tailored to recovering from the Hermit's Peak Calf/Canyon Fire and subsequent floods. NRCS plans will be provided to claimants at no charge and will be utilized by the Claims Office to streamline the claims review process. Payments based on NRCS plans will be made directly to the claimant. Conservation plans will address a variety of categories specific of NRCS-approved common practices, which include but are not limited to: soil erosion, debris removal, access roads, fencing, livestock wells, etc. Landowners can also visit one of two local service centers in order to request a Conservation Restoration Plan.

- Misleading information is circulating that the Hermit's Peak/Calf Canyon Claims Office announced that there is a deadline to apply for flood insurance before May 31, 2023. That rumor is not true. You can apply for flood insurance policies until May 31, 2024. If you are interested in receiving compensation for a flood insurance policy, file a Notice of Loss and a Claims Helper will contact you. The deadline to file a Notice of Loss is November 14, 2024.
- As of 5/31/2023, 1,380 applicants have been approved for assistance through FEMA's IA Program for \$7.3+ million in Colfax, Lincoln, Mora, San Miguel and Valencia counties.
- VALs have received 175 referrals with 145 cases being referred to non-profits for help with unmet needs and 30 cases pending.

Region 9 (CA, NV, HI, AZ, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, American Samoa)

DR-4715-GU:

- FEMA announced that federal disaster assistance has been made available to the territory of Guam to supplement recovery efforts in the areas affected by Typhoon Mawar beginning on May 22, 2023, and continuing. Survivors who are uninsured or underinsured can register for assistance that may include funding to repair or replace their homes, temporary housing, access to low-interest loans or other programs.
- Funding is also available to the territory and eligible local governments and certain nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency protective measures, including direct federal assistance in the territory of Guam.
- FEMA is working with local and territorial officials to determine Disaster Recovery Center locations.
- A concern is underserved communities in substandard homes with tin roofing.
- Based on shelter supplies available in Guam, such as meals, water, cots, and blankets, there is no immediate need to bring additional supplies to the island. Guam has requested distribution of a seven-day supply of meals and water for the shelter population.
- FEMA HQ and Region 9 are actively monitoring unmet language needs and coordinating a plan for translation for those who have no English speakers in the household. Language needs identified: Tagalog, Chuukish, Korean, Mandarin, Japanese, Chamorro, Micronesian, Tagalog/Filipino, Cantonese.

DR-4714-SOBOBA BAND OF LUISEÑO INDIANS:

• FEMA announced that federal disaster assistance has been made available to the Soboba Band of Luiseño Indians to supplement tribal recovery efforts in the areas affected by the severe storm and flooding March 11-16, 2023. Public assistance federal funding is available to tribal governments on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work and the repair or replacement of facilities damaged by the severe storm and flooding on tribal lands.

Disaster Distress Helpline (DDH): Overview

The DDH (call or text 1-800-985-5990; press "2" for Spanish) provides crisis counseling and support for anyone in the U.S. experiencing distress or other behavioral health concerns related to any natural or human-caused disaster. Calls, texts, and Videophone calls for Deaf or Hard of Hearing American Sign Language users are answered by a network of independently-operated crisis centers around the country, who provide psychological first aid, emotional support, crisis assessment and intervention, and referrals to local/state behavioral health services for follow-up care & support. The DDH is a program of the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) administered by the not-for-profit Vibrant Emotional Health.

Local Crisis Support Resources

The Disaster Distress Helpline is a sub-network of the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline, which is also administered by Vibrant for SAMHSA. **The Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center** (call 988 / https://gbhwc.guam.gov/) serves Guam for 988. Amazon Disaster Relief has more than doubled the capacity of its Disaster Relief Hub in Atlanta by prepositioning 2.4 million relief items ahead of the 2023 hurricane season. The items will be distributed in the wake of natural disasters to nonprofits and other aid partners that quickly help communities impacted by hurricanes or other disasters. The Disaster Relief Hub is a dedicated space within Amazon's global logistics network to store and quickly pack items that are most-needed following damaging storms and other emergencies.

Amazon works year-round with national and international relief organizations—such as the American Red Cross, Save the Children, and World Central Kitchen—to identify items that will most likely be needed after natural disasters. Data shows that more than 80% of the needed items are the same after each natural event.


FEMA Seeks Public Comments on the implementation of the Community Disaster Resilience Zone Act of 2022

FEMA has published a notice in the <u>Federal Register</u> seeking input from the public on how to implement this new legislation, designed to build disaster resilience across the nation by creating and designating resilience zones which identify disadvantaged communities most at-risk to natural hazards.

This new law amends the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Recovery and Emergency Act to use FEMA's National Risk Index to designate community disaster zones. These represent areas with the highest natural hazard risk and a relatively lower ability to withstand the impacts of these risks. This Request for Information will help the agency gain better understanding in key areas that will support an effective implementation of the Community Disaster Resilience Zone Act. This includes learning how communities identify, use and apply risk assessment tools to reduce natural hazard effects and how to achieve equity and geographic balance when designating zones.

Resilience Analysis and Planning Tool (RAPT)



Updated Resilience Analysis and Planning Tool (RAPT)

The Resilience Analysis and Planning Tool (RAPT) is a free, no-login required online web map that makes everyone a geographic information system (GIS) analyst. RAPT gives everyone access to powerful data and GIS mapping to understand potential challenges to resilience in each community, county, state and tribe. The more recent RAPT update includes the latest data from the U.S Census Bureau, an updated FEMA Community Resilience Challenges Index and a curated add-in data layer list.

RAPT helps reveal important community characteristics with preloaded layers that display:

- Population challenges to resilience this includes 22 individual indicators of resilience and a single Community Resilience Index value for counties and census tracts.
- Hazard and risk such as real-time flood gauges, live radar, active wildfires, annualized expected losses from the National Risk Index and more.
- Infrastructure schools, places of worship, electric lines, wastewater facilities and more.
- Equity race and ethnicity data, broadband access, languages spoken in the home and more.
- Future climate three sea level rise scenarios and easy import of forecasted climate data from the Climate Risk and Resilience Portal (ClimRR).

FEMA Seeks Public Comments on Proposed Changes to Increase Funding Access and Reduce Disaster Risk for Vulnerable Communities

FEMA published a notice in the <u>Federal Register</u> seeking public comment on how to apply new legislation that will designate areas with communities most at risk and from natural hazards. This notice is for the agency to gain better understanding in key areas that will support an effective implementation of the <u>Community Disaster Resilience Zone Act</u>. FEMA posted the Request for Information to learn the best ways to obtain public feedback that will help shape and inform how the agency uses the act to increase resilience efforts.

This new law amends the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Recovery and Emergency Act to use FEMA's National Risk Index to designate community disaster zones. These represent areas with the highest natural hazard risk and a relatively lower ability to withstand their impacts. Vulnerable communities often face difficulties in accessing disaster resilience funding. These communities will receive targeted support to access federal funding to plan for resilience projects that will help them reduce impacts caused by climate change and natural hazards. Targeted federal support includes increased federal cost-share for the Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities program, lessening the financial burden on communities to perform resilience-related activities. This includes a greater federal cost share adjustment and an increase in the community's ability to afford valuable pre-disaster mitigation projects.

The law will also enable communities to work across a range of federal and private sector partners to maximize funding and provide technical assistance, strengthening community resilience.

FEMA is requesting information from the public to gain understanding in key areas that will support an effective implementation of the act. This includes learning how communities identify, use and apply risk assessment tools to reduce natural hazard effects and how to achieve equity and geographic balance when designating zones.
