
# Tropical Storm Harold RADAR LOOP




# Tropical Storm Harold FORECAST TRACK



# Tropical Storm Harold 2 DAY RAINFALL








# Tropical Storm Harold PEAK STORM SURGE FORECAST




# Tropical Storm Franklin FORECAST TRACK







## Remnants of Hilary - California

<u>Current Situation:</u> FEMA and federal partners continue to support as local governments move forward with reconstitution and recovery activities following Hilary. FEMA continues to coordinate with impacted Tribal Nations to provide technical assistance and address any anticipated shortfalls.

<u>Lifelines:</u> (Post-Tropical Cyclone Hilary SLB as of 6:00 p.m. ET, Aug 21) Safety and Security:

#### CA:

- USCG pre-positioning search and rescue assets in San Diego,
   Sacramento, Forward Operation Base Mugu
- 338 (+319) NGB personnel and 130 (+122) high-water vehicles staged in California
- 10 (+7) congregate shelters in Banning, San Marcos, Crescent City, Thermal, Yucca Valley, Yreka, Tehachapi, Pine Valley, and Chula Vista with combined overnight population of 42 (+33)
- Evacuation warning issued and approximately 9k residents evacuated from affected areas

#### NV:

- 102 (+2) NGB personnel and 24 high-water vehicles staged in Nevada.
   350 additional personnel requested with projected fulfilment by Aug 23
- 2 congregate shelters in Clark & Nye counties (Pop: 3)

### Food, Hydration, Shelter:

- 17 truckloads of commodities and 3 truckloads of command-andcontrol equipment ready to deploy if requested at March Air Reserve Base
- 3 shelters in El Centro, Mission Viejo, and Redlands
- No impact to wastewater systems
- 2 community water systems impacted (1 in CA serving 139 customers,
   1 in NV serving 1,040); both systems on a boil water advisory

Catalina Island Medical Center sheltering-in-place; generator with 5 days of fuel on hand



## Spokane Co. Wildfires - Washington

<u>Situation:</u> Lifelines continue to trend upward indicating improving conditions. Scattered showers expected to fall over the fire on Tuesday with a 50 to 60% chance for wetting rains. On August 18, 2023, the Gray and Oregon Fires in Spokane County, Washington, began. The Oregon Fire is burning at the Pend Oreille County boundary and the Gray Fire is burning on public and private land near Medical Lake (pop 5,060). As fire speeds drop, better understanding of how the fires will affect the infrastructure will be available. In Spokane County, there are now 7 other smaller wildfires burning.

## **Lifelines Impacts:** (Washington State EOC Report as of 8:00 p.m. ET, Aug 21) **Safety and Security:**

- Approximately 20,170 total acres burned, 1,850 total residences threatened, (Gray, Oregon Road). 80 identified single residences destroyed. 12 damaged (Oregon Road), 185 structures destroyed (Cannon determine structure types at this time); 2 (+1) confirmed fatality
- Medical Lake evacuation reduced to Level 1
- 4 to 5k residence return access to homes
- Boil Water Advisory lifted for Medical Lake

#### Food, Hydration, and Shelter:

- Mandatory evacuations
  - Oregon Road Fire 4,000 (ICS-209)
  - o Gray Fire 1,000 (ICS-209)
- Boil Water Advisory: Portions of Medical Lake
