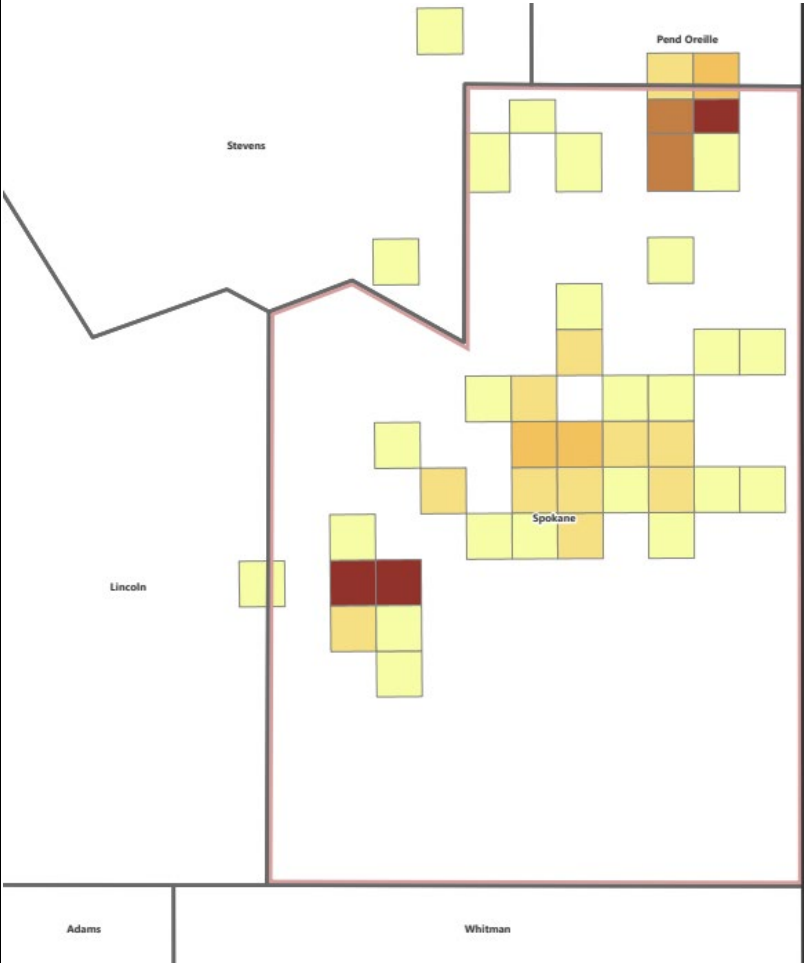

## Regional Operational Updates

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### Region 1 (CT, MA, ME, NH, VT, RI)

**DR-4754-ME:**

- Disaster Recovery Centers are now open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Closed on Sundays.

**DR-4761-NH:**

- Federal disaster assistance is available to New Hampshire to supplement recovery efforts in severe storm and flooding impacted areas from Dec. 17-21, 2023. **Public assistance** federal funding is available on a cost-sharing basis to the state, eligible local governments, and certain private nonprofit organizations for emergency work and repairs or replacements of damaged facilities in Carroll, Coos, and Grafton counties.

### Region 3 (DC, DE, MD, PA, VA, WV)

**DR-4756-WV:**

- The state-federal Disaster Recovery Centers in Boone, Calhoun, Clay, Harrison, and Kanawha counties are open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday:
  - Calhoun County: 80 Spring Run Rd. in Arnoldsburg, WV
  - Boon County: 38 John Slack Circle, Racine, WV
  - Clay County: 223 Main Street, Clay, 35043, WV.

### Region 4 (KY, TN, NC SC, GA, AL, MS, FL)

**DR-4751-TN:**

- VALs continue to identify and confirm community resources that can support recovery for inclusion into the VAL Resource Tracking System.
- VAL Unmet Needs Team has received five new cases, for a total of 22; these cases are under review for referrals and involve survivors who have received FEMA max grants and have ongoing unmet needs. The team has successfully processed 17 cases to date.
- VALs are exploring potential Long Term Recovery Group (LTRG) funding sources, such as the United Church of Christ Disaster Response and Week of Compassion for the Montgomery and Davidson LTRGs.
- The process to transform the Greater Nashville VOAD into the Davidson County LTRG is underway. Since the Information Sharing Access Agreement between FEMA and United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is in place, the LTRG disaster case management program is expected to begin shortly.



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## Region 6 (AR, LA, NM, TX, OK)

### DR-4698-AR:

- VAL is supporting Disaster Case Management and the Long-Term Recovery Groups in Pulaski and Cross Counties.
- Supporting the Direct Housing Mission DR-4698-AR resources and assistance for survivor unmet needs.

### FM-5488-TX (SMOKEHOSE CREEK FIRE) | FM-5487-TX (WINDY DEUCE FIRE):

- Several large, uncontrolled fires burning within the state.
- Several American Red Cross shelters were opened, closed and combined, resulting in two shelters remaining open.
- All response activities are being handled at the local and state level, with no request for assistance currently.

### DR-4611-LA:

- VALs have assisted applicants receive \$3,586,373.10 in additional IHP funding through case review and appeals.
- VALs have received 3205 (+4) referrals; 3166 (+3) of those cases are closed, while 39 (+2) remain open.
- VALs have received 5702 (+52) Duplication of Benefits requests from disaster case management agencies and have completed 5692 (+33) to date.

### FM-5489-OK | CATESBY FIRE:

- The fire is burning in Ellis County, Oklahoma, on state and private land in and around communities of Shattuck (population, 1.2k) and Gage (population, 433).
- The fire has burned an estimated 76,800 acres to date, with 0% containment.
- The Oklahoma Emergency Operations Center is at partial activation; all response activities are being managed at local and state levels.
- No requests for assistance with unmet needs at this time.

### DR-4652-NM | HERMIT'S PEAK/CALF CANYON:

- VAL is working with the NM VOAD and Mora San Miguel (MSM) LTRG to identify state and National VOAD organizations who can assist with long-term recovery projects for home repairs and rebuilds. This is due to a severe lack of contractors and the fact that many residents live in rural areas.
- Individuals and households in Mora and San Miguel Counties who were impacted by the Hermit's Peak/Calf Canyon Fires and sustained smoke, soot, and ash damages may be eligible for compensation from the Claims Office. Residents must file a Notice of Loss (NOL) through the Claims Office to see what opportunities they are eligible to receive.
- VAL is working with the Village of Ruidoso Emergency Manager to help develop a Community Organization Active in Disaster (COAD) to enhance the community's ability to mitigate, prevent, prepare for, respond to, and recover from disasters.

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## Region 5 (IL, MN, WI, MI, IN, OH)

### DR-4757-MI:

- FEMA Disaster Recovery Centers are helping residents in declared counties kickstart their recovery. Hours: 8 a.m. – 6:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday, closed Sundays:
  - Wayne County Community College Downriver Campus, 21000 Northline Road, Taylor, MI 48180. Open until further notice.
  - Canton Human Services Building, 50430 School House Road, Canton, MI 48187. Open until further notice.
  - Chesterfield Township Fire Department Central Station, 33991 23 Mile Road, Chesterfield, MI 48047. Open until further notice.
  - Northeast Ingham Emergency Services Authority, 1296 W. Grand River Ave., Williamston, MI 48895. Closing permanently 6:30 p.m., Saturday, March 2.
  - Lansing Community College –West Campus, 5708 Cornerstone Drive, Lansing, MI 48917. Closing permanently 6:30 p.m., Saturday, March 2.
  - Gibraltar City Hall, 29450 Munro St., Gibraltar, MI 48173. Closing permanently 6:30 p.m., Saturday, March 2.

### DR-4749-IL:

- VALs continue to work with Individual Assistance (IA), identifying resources to support unmet needs. These cases include access and functional needs (AFN) concerns such as a mobile chair for an applicant, referral to a nonprofit for case work, and housing for a displaced senior.
- VAL teams continue to support the development and capacity building of the various emerging long term recovery groups (LTRGs)
- VALs have identified a four-neighborhood area in South Chicago with limited resources but approximately 130 applicants. IA and VALs have coordinated a focused effort to review applications in that area starting with seniors and those with AFN issues who may have not completed all paperwork to receive FEMA eligible benefits. VALs will collaborate with Interagency Recovery Coordination (IRC) and Hazard Mitigation (HM), as well as with the neighborhood Alderman and community leaders about additional support to facilitate long-term recovery.
- Collaboration is ongoing between VALs and IRC to support coordinated outreach and joint field days.

## Region 8 (MT, ND, SD, WY, UT, CO)

### DR-4760-ND:

- Federal disaster assistance is available to North Dakota to supplement recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe winter storms and straight-line winds Dec. 25-27, 2023. **Public Assistance** federal funding is available to state, tribal and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work and the repair or replacement of facilities damaged by severe winter storms and straight-line winds in Barnes, Cass, Dickey, Grant, LaMoure, Logan, McIntosh, Ransom, Richland, Sargent, Steele, Stutsman and Traill counties.

## Region 9 (CA, NV, HI, AZ, GU, CNMI, AS)

### DR-4758-CA:

- New VAL Group Supervisor deployed: John Chavez.
- VAL is setting up Meet & Greet sessions with partners and stakeholders.
- State VAL working with FEMA VAL on establishing long term recovery group.
- San Diego VOAD is established and engaged.

## Region 10 (AK, OR, WA, ID)

### DR-4759-WA:

- FEMA Individual Assistance is now available for residents in Spokane County affected by the Gray and Oregon Road Wildfires between Aug. 18-25, 2023.

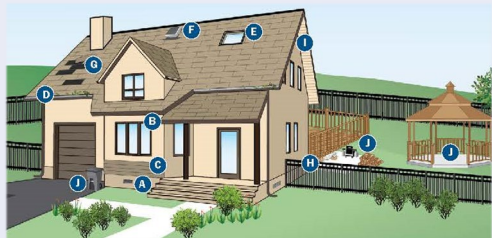

## News You Can Share: Reducing Wildfire Risk to Your Home - Infographic

Over the last couple of years, attention to wildfires has been at the forefront of natural hazards. FEMA Building Science has developed a helpful infographic titled [Reducing Wildfire Risk to Your Home](#) to assist in mitigation strategies for homes. For most single-family homes, the exterior envelope of the building – including roof, walls, windows, doors, trims, etc. – is not typically required to be fire resistant.



This means that most homes are vulnerable to ignition by embers, flames and hot gases from wildfires or other burning fuels (e.g., neighboring buildings, landscaping, sheds, vehicles) nearby. Additionally, vents and other openings, if not protected, can provide a pathway for embers to enter the house. How can you reduce wildfire risk to your home?

## Updated Overdose Prevention and Response Toolkit

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) announced the release of its updated [Overdose Prevention and Response Toolkit](#). The toolkit provides updated guidance on preventing overdoses, responding to stimulant or opioid overdoses, and offers population-specific guidance for a range of audiences.

The toolkit, designed to augment overdose prevention and reversal training, provides guidance on the role of opioid overdose reversal medications, including naloxone and nalmefene, and how to respond to an overdose. It also contains appendices for specific audiences, including people who use drugs (PWUD), people who take prescription opioids, first responders, healthcare practitioners, and others.
