Region 1 (ME, VT, NH, MA, CT, RI)

DR-4764-ME:

• President Biden approved the disaster declaration for the severe storms and flooding that occurred on January 9-13, 2024. Maine homeowners and renters in Cumberland, Hancock, Knox, Lincoln, Sagadahoc, Waldo, Washington or York counties who were affected by the January severe storms and flooding, may apply for FEMA disaster assistance.

DR-4765-RI / DR-4766-RI:

- Rhode Island and FEMA have opened two Disaster Recovery Centers, in Greenville and Coventry, to help Rhode Island residents affected by the severe storms and flooding that took place from December 17-19, 2023, and January 9-13, 2024. Hours of operation for all centers are: 8 a.m. 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturdays. Closed Sundays:
 - o Coventry Town Hall Annex, 1675 Flat River Road, Coventry, RI 02816.
 - o William Windsor Elementary School, 562 Putnam Pike, Greenville, RI 02828

Region 3 (PA, WV, VA, DC, MD, DE)

DR-4756-WV:

- VALs continue to work with the State IA Officer to assist with identifying organizations in West Virginia that can help survivors with the recovery process.
 - Supporting the State IA Officer with policy guidance and other technical support needed to address survivor needs.
- VALs are assisting with the implementation of unmet needs calls and providing Disaster Case Management guidance.
- VALs are actively identifying resources needed to address referrals for additional assistance with individual needs.

Region 5 (IL, MN, WI, MI, IN, OH)

DR-4757-MI:

- Two more Disaster Recovery Centers opened in Ingham and Wayne (Detroit) counties to help residents in Eaton, Ingham, Ionia, Kent, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland and Wayne counties continue their recovery after the Aug. 24-26, 2023, severe storms, tornadoes and flooding.
 - o Ingham County: Northeast Ingham Emergency Services Authority, 1296 W. Grand River Ave., Williamston, MI 48895
 - Wayne (Detroit) County: Samaritan Center, 5555 Conner St., Detroit, MI 48213
- The recovery centers in Wayne (Gibraltar City Hall) and Kent (Henze Community Center) counties have closed permanently.

DR-4728-IL / DR-4749-IL:

- Long Term Recovery Group Development (LTRG) and Capacity Building efforts continue.
- FEMA VALs are supporting the possibility of Asset Mapping in the areas that LTRGs are getting established, an initiative being explored in coordination with DePaul University's ABCD Institute, Serve Illinois, FEMA Interagency Recovery Coordination (IRC), and CO-AD leaders OAD leaders.
- Following the IRC Rural Recovery Exposition, VALs have conducted outreach with attendees interested in establishing an LTRG in Coles County, Illinois.
- VALs continue to collaborate with FEMA IA program specialists on cases referred by LTRG casework, resulting in appropriate paperwork being filed and FEMA benefits provided to the applicant; successful efforts also continue to refer unmet needs cases to partners including The Salvation Army and Catholic Charities.

Region 9 (CA, NV, HI, AZ, GU, CNMI, AS)

DR-4758-CA:

- FEMA VALs are supporting the San Diego VOAD providing technical guidance on the formation
 of a Long-Term Recovery Group: committees, donations, and engaging local service providers.
 Plans for getting applicants back into homes will focus on families with children, the elderly,
 and those with access and functional needs.
- The San Diego VOAD Donations Warehouse continues to receive needed donations. Latest
 arrival was pallets of Clean Up Kits provided by National VOAD Partner Agency, Church World
 Service. Kits will be distributed to local agencies, such as United Methodist Committee on
 Relief (UMCOR), Black Contractors Association, Mundo Gardens, and the Harvey Family
 Foundation, which are still engaged in cleanup.
- VALs have engaged the Black Contractors Association, which completed six rebuilds of homes
 affected by the January Flood. This is the first time Black Contractors have been involved with
 San Diego VOAD, resulting in increased operational readiness, knowledge of FEMA Individual
 Assistance, and engagement with the State VAL.
- A FEMA VAL maintains a calendar of weekly meetings via Zoom with the San Diego County and San Diego VOAD. Both coordination calls focus on work being done by Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) for cleanup and muck & gut. Weekend 'Day of Service' events are being conducted to work on cleanup and mold remediation.

Region 10 (OR, WA, ID, AK)

DR-4763-AK:

- A temporary Disaster Recovery Center will open April 8th in Wrangell to assist residents who were affected by the November 20th landslides:
- Location: The Nolan Center, Civic Center Room, 296 Campbell Drive
- Dates and hours of operation: Monday, April 8th Friday, April 12th, 9 am 7 pm.

Region 9 (CA, NV, HI, AZ, GU, CNMI, AS) - Continued

DR-4724-HI:

- Citizens of the Freely Associated States, collectively known as COFA citizens, may now apply
 for FEMA disaster assistance for losses caused by the Aug. 8 wildfires and high winds on Maui.
 President Biden recently signed the Compact of Free Association Amendments Act of 2024,
 which extended federal benefits to COFA citizens who legally reside in the United States.
 Among them are citizens of the Republic of Palau, the Federated States of Micronesia, and
 the Republic of the Marshall Islands. The change in the law allows COFA citizens who were
 previously ineligible for FEMA disaster assistance due to their COFA status to now apply for
 FEMA's Individuals and Households program.
- The 60-day application period began Monday, April 1, and ends Friday, May 31. To apply, eligible COFA citizens must show that their primary residence on Maui was affected by the wildfires. To apply, COFA citizens may call 808-784-1952 or visit the Lahaina Disaster Recovery Center in the Civic Center Gymnasium at 1840 Honoapi'ilani Highway. Phone lines and recovery center hours are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. HST Monday to Friday; 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. HST Saturday; closed Sundays.
- A Housing Solutions meeting, convened with the Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement (CNHA), the State Department of Human Services (DHS), Disaster Case Management (DCM) supervisors, American Red Cross, and GEM, updated case criteria and explored solutions for challenging cases. Meanwhile, CNHA announced a new rental assistance program for survivors on the Department of Hawaiian Homelands (DHHL) waitlist.
- The Ho'ola ia Mauiakama Long Term Recovery moves forward. Among recent efforts:
 - The Volunteer Committee has coordinated with Hawai'i Tourism, Kanu Hawai'i and the Visitor's Bureau for volunteer management. A Point System will be ready to pilot soon; points around home cleaning, local volunteer solutions, and volunteer housing.
 - The Funders Roundtable Committee finalized guidelines and criteria for cases to be presented to funders.







News You Can Share: Children's Building Codes Activity Sheet – Winter Edition



FEMA Building Science introduces the "Building Codes Activity Sheet: Winter Edition" activity book with real-world scenarios to educate children on the role building codes play in safeguarding our communities. By incorporating building codes into a fun fort-building activity, the kids work together to ensure their fort's durability against the various elements. This emphasizes the message that hazard-resistant building codes help prepare communities against events such as earthquakes, storms, floods, and fires.

The activity sheet follows two kids building a snow fort and discussing different construction and reinforcement strategies. It includes other activities such as snow globe designing, match-the-

snowmen, and a maze. These activities entertain and educate children on the practical application of building codes in different situations.

FEMA publishes National Incident Management System Guideline for Mutual Aid



FEMA's National Integration Center published the <u>National Incident Management System (NIMS)</u> Guideline for Mutual Aid.

Between December 2022 and February 2023, the National Integration Center (NIC) in partnership with NIC Coordination Group (NCG) members conducted biweekly meetings with a working group composed of stakeholders and subject matter experts from various jurisdictional levels to review, refine and update the draft document.

The NIMS Guideline supplements the resource management component of NIMS by providing guidance on different types of mutual aid agreements, the key elements of a mutual aid agreement, and the key elements of mutual aid operational plans used for implementation.
