




National Weather Forecast







Severe Weather Outlook





Day 1 Tornado and Wind Outlook









April 2-6 Flash Flooding Risk



Rainfall Forecast through Sunday Night






Risk of Flash Flooding Through Sunday Night




















Risk of Flash Flooding

Severe Weather/Potential Flooding - Central/Eastern U.S.

Situation: Severe weather impacting portions of Michigan and Indiana earlier in the week, led to reports of confirmed low-intensity (EF-0 and EF-1) tornado touchdowns. There are reports of minor property damage and no reports of fatalities/injuries, due to the tornadoes. Additional severe weather led the Storm Prediction Center (SPC) to issue a High Risk of severe weather and tornadoes report today stretching from the Southern and Central Plains to areas in the Tennessee and Ohio Valleys. Isolated thunderstorms developed with reports of high wind and hail reports in Kansas, Nebraska, and Oklahoma with thunderstorm and tornado watches in effect for these areas. These storms are anticipated to move, continue, and bring excessive rainfall and severe weather threat to Texas, Arkansas, and Louisiana later today, with the potential to cause significant riverine flooding. Expansion of the risk area is likely to reach portions of the Mississippi, Tennessee, and Ohio Valleys later this week with the highest risk of excessive rainfall and flooding concentrated on the eastern Missouri and Arkansas border into southwestern Kentucky and northwestern Tennessee through latter part of the week.



Potential Flooding Impacts:

- Riverine Flooding
- Widespread flash flooding in areas not normally prone to flooding
- Flooding of creeks, small streams, and low-lying areas
- Dangerous traveling conditions
- Possible inundation of structures and roads due to moderate/major flooding
- Flood Watches and Warnings






